Why Were We Enslaved? Or, What's Judaism's Cardinal Transgression?

In the Hebrew Bible, Abraham went down to Egypt.

In the Christian Bible, Jesus' parents went down to Egypt.

In the Hebrew Bible, Pharoah placed a death sentence on Israelite baby boys.

In the Christian Bible, King Herod placed a death sentence on Judean

baby boys born in and around Bethlehem.

This recycling of motifs happens within the Jewish Bible, as well. Abraham passed his wife off as his sister, and so did Isaac. God "finished all his work" in creation, and the same language is used at the end of Exodus when Moses finishes all the work in creating the Tabernacle. This recycling is a literary convention that ancient authors used to highlight similarities and differences.

Ancient authors used other conventions, too, to preach to their audience. In the Hebrew Bible, the theology of "just deserts" infuses the narrative of the text. When people do bad things, they deserve bad stuff to happen to them. And vice-versa. The Hebrew for that convention is called midah k'neged midah, measure for measure. The Rabbis noted several examples (Mishnah, Sotah, Ch. 1, end):

With the measure that a person measures, he is measured with it. Samson followed his eyes, therefore he was punished measure for measure, as the Philistines gouged out his eyes, as it is stated: "And the Philistines laid hold on him, and put out his eyes" (Judges 16:21). Absalom was proud of his hair, and therefore he was hanged by his hair (II Sam. 18:9).

And the same is so with regard to the reward of good deeds; a person is rewarded measure for measure. Miriam waited for the baby Moses for one hour at the shore of the Nile, as it is stated: "And his sister stood afar off, to know what would be done to him" (Exodus 2:4). Therefore the Jewish people delayed their travels in the desert for seven days to wait for her when she was smitten with leprosy, as it is

stated: "And Miriam was confined outside of the camp seven days; and the people journeyed not until Miriam was brought in again" (Numbers 12:15).

The Mishnah seems to be stretching things a bit for Miriam, but my point is that they recognized this literary device. Check out what RaMBaN, Rabbi Moshe ben Nachman (c. 1250, Barcelona), did. RaMBaN charged Abraham with causing the Israelites' slavery in Egypt because Abraham had gone to Egypt to avoid the famine. According to RaMBaN, Abraham should have just trusted God.

What RaMBaN did was to combine the intergenerational recycling convention with the principle of measure for measure to arrive at the following: the Israelites were punished with slavery in Egypt for Abraham's sin of leaving the Land of Israel for Egypt during the famine. The Israelites were punished for the sins of their ancestors.

Here's what it says in the Decalogue:

For I, Adonai, your God am an impassioned God, visiting the guilt of the parents upon the children, upon the third and upon the fourth generations of those who reject Me.

And it was Abraham's third and fourth generations who returned to Egypt to avoid yet another famine.

The psalm that we repeat beginning in the month before the high holidays concludes by telling us to "only put your trust in the Lord!" No thanks. The Talmud tells us not to rely on miracles — that's my mantra. The idea of relying on God, exclusively, to save us is Biblical, and that's what RaMBaN finds fault in Abraham for ignoring.

Not me. I think Abraham was absolutely correct in getting his household somewhere where there was food. Nevertheless, I do think RaMBaN was right that Abraham, and Sarah, did something that caused their children to become enslaved in Egypt. Our ancestors were enslaved because of how Abraham and Sarah abused their Egyptian slave, Hagar.

When God tells Abraham about his children's future enslavement, this is God's language:

And [God] said to Abram, "Know well that your offspring shall be strangers [ger] in a land not theirs, and they shall be enslaved and oppressed four hundred years.

Fourteen verses later, we hear a chilling echo: Abram said to Sarai, "Your slave woman is in your hands. Deal with her as you think right." Then Sarai oppressed her, and she ran away from her (Gen. 16:6).

The Egyptian Hagar (the same letters as ha-ger), the quintessential stranger/other, was oppressed directly by Sarah who was enabled by Abraham; and the children of

Israel suffered the oppression of four hundred years of slavery in Hagar's Egypt because of it.

Once we were redeemed, this was the cardinal mitzvah:

When strangers (*gerim*) reside with you in your land, you shall not oppress them.

The strangers who reside with you shall be to you as your citizens; you shall love each one as yourself, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt: I, Adonai, am your God.

This is our opportunity to repair the deeds of our ancestors and protect the strangers in our midst. *Hineinu*.

Innovative Ways to Give to AJ

Israel Bonds. You can help both Israel and AJ when you buy an Israel bond and donate it to AJ. This may result in a tax deduction for you.



In Rav Hazzan's World

Don't Let the Light Go Out!

Last month, my article was titled "Filled with an Attitude of Gratitude." Now, I am still feeling an immense sense of gratitude but far be it from me to deprive you of a new title! You may be familiar with the phrase "don't let the light go out" as it is the refrain of the song "Light One Candle" made popular by the folk group Peter, Paul and Mary. The song was written in 1982 by Jewish trio member Peter Yarrow. It was performed, for the very first time in public, at their concert that same year in Carnegie Hall.

I chose to use this refrain because of the bright warmth I still feel from November 17's full house at our concert titled, "A Tribute to Charles and Frances Davidson z''!: A Musical Legacy."

There were more people who contributed to making this event happen than can possibly be listed here so I think it's best to simply say, you know who you are and you are amazing! You are what makes AJ the kind of place that so many have called their spiritual home for over 166 years.

When I first arrived here in Elkins Park in 2004, Hazzan Davidson z"/ shared a story about his own arrival. He said it felt as though he had been dropped from a spaceship onto an entirely different planet. But he quickly reassured me, promising that, over time, I would come to embrace the music and traditions so deeply that I'd miss them whenever I visited another shul. And he was right — especially about the "gradual" part. It took time.

I can track some of these new-found senses of appreciation to specific experiences. When my mother died in 2010, I visited other synagogues for Kaddish from time to time and while I felt welcomed, the services (usually on weekdays) were far longer and led with less of a commitment to *nusah hat'fillah*, (the traditional musical modes of worship) that Charles taught and inspired here at AJ.

When the first occurrence of Yizkor came at Shavuot, I better understood the value of Rabbi Max Klein's z"I use of the tziduk hadin prayers in the English hymn we sing, "Righteous Art Thou." Rabbi Klein arranged it into poetic form and set these verses to a simple yet lovely repeating sequence of melody (see pg. 451 in the 2008 edition of Seder Avodah or page 869 in the Mahzor Seder Avodah). Reading and chanting these words, or listening to the choir do so, continues to provide me with a sense of warmth and comfort that I cherish. I am reminded of my own good fortune when I read the line between the sung stanzas, "When blessings bring sunshine to our heart..."

I truly believed I was finished. I thought my gradual acclimation to AJ had finally reached its conclusion. But then, there I was, standing on our bimah, singing excerpts from the Charles and Frances Davidson z"I collaboration, The Story of Purim in Song and Verse, and something clicked. I got it. I might even confess that I regretted not understanding it sooner. Still, I wasn't entirely certain until I received these responses — and more — from the people I reached out to.

From Pam Yohlin: Drive him around (la la la), repeat, etc. I see Aunt Frances conducting with her glasses on the bridge of her nose, and can feel the warmth of having dear AJ friends singing along with me. That warmth I experienced was a constant throughout my childhood at AJ, and has persisted throughout the decades.

From Marlena Kleit:



AJ Early Learning Center

Did you know that all of the Adath Jeshurun Early Learning Center classes are named after colors? Colors are an important concept in early learning. They aid in cognitive development by creating a connection between visual perception and language. Colors also support memory and association by linking objects to specific colors (e.g., red/strawberry, yellow/rubber duck). Additionally, vibrant shades enhance sensory stimulation.

Teachers use colors as directional tools since children can easily discriminate between them as toddlers. "Stop on the blue line. Head to the orange cones!" echoes through the school hallways. We also use red stop signs on the exit doors to remind children that they cannot leave the door without a grown-up.

Our adorable one-year-olds are in the Yarok class, which is the Hebrew word for "green." Green is often associated with nature, and Kermit the Frog once famously sang, "It's not easy being green." In fact, Sheldon Low and Rick Recht also identified it as the color of broccoli in their "Rainbow Song," a Shabbat favorite. At this time of year, green is a key part of our celebration of Tu B'Shevat.

The teachers do a wonderful job of highlighting the importance of trees in our world. The older students learn about the parts of a tree and how to create a greener world, while our littlest learners celebrate the tree's birthday. This holiday also provides another connection to Israel. While the winter weather in Pennsylvania may not allow for the tree-planting custom, it is happening in Eretz Yisrael.

Whether you celebrate Tu B'Shevat with fruit from a tree or a birthday cupcake, may it be sweet!





Exploring Judaism, with Rabbi Shai Cherry, PhD

Intended for non-Jews and/or interfaith couples. For those interested, these sessions will prepare such individuals for conversion to Judaism.

So much of what non-Jews absorb about Judaism is from popular culture where the priority is not accuracy. If you or someone you know would like something holistic and comprehensive, taught by an expert, *Exploring Judaism* is for you. Whether you're thinking about Judaism as a way of life for yourself, or you're just interested in learning more, *Exploring Judaism* offers 21 sessions divided into three trimesters focusing on belonging, behaviors, and beliefs. You can begin at any point in the trimester cycle.

Should you wish to pursue becoming Jewish, this course satisfies the educational requirements of conversion.

On November 10, 2024, author
Sue Fishkoff spoke to an AJ
audience about her book and
research, Kosher Nation —
Why More and More of
America's Food Answers to a
Higher Authority. Congregation
Adath Jeshurun is spending
2024—2025 exploring our
synagogue and personal kashrut
policies and practices. For our
work at AJ, we will be discussing
and wrestling with many of the core
themes covered in Sue's presentation. Please join
our conversations as we consider the following:

The Unique American Experience of Kashrut

- Cultural Integration: American Jews, more integrated into mainstream culture, have a unique approach to kashrut.
- Selective Kashrut: This includes practices like "kosher style" eating at home and adhering to dietary laws only on holidays.
- The Bagel and Lox Jews: A cultural identity tied to specific Jewish foods.
- **Return to Jewish Food:** A resurgence of interest in traditional Ashkenazi and Mizrahi cuisine.

Until the 21st century, *kashrut* has not changed. Now, the Modern *Kashrut* Movement is expanding the foundation of *kashrut* to include other ethical Jewish practices:

- Ethical *Kashrut*: A growing concern for ethical and sustainable food production.
- Heksher Tzedek: A movement promoting ethical and socially responsible kosher certification.
- Eco-Kashrut: A focus on environmentally-friendly food choices.

The Three Pillars of Jewish Ethical Eating

- 1. *Baal Tashchit:* Avoiding waste and unnecessary consumption.
- 2. *Tza'ar Baale Chaim:* Kindness to animals, including humane slaughter practices.
- 3. **Shmirat HaGuf:** Caring for one's body through healthy and ethical food choices.

The Future of Kashrut

- Mindful Eating: Kashrut as a comprehensive system of conscious food consumption.
- Balancing Tradition and Modernity: Navigating the tension between ancient laws and contemporary ethical concerns.
- The Role of Organizations: Groups like Hazon and Teva are leading the charge in promoting ethical and sustainable kosher practices.

Discussion Points:

- The Impact of Technology: How do advancements in food technology and biotechnology affect kashrut?
- Global Food Systems: How can Jewish consumers make informed choices about the global impact of their food consumption?
- The Role of Religious Leaders: What is the responsibility of rabbis and other religious leaders in promoting ethical kashrut?
- Consumer Power: How can consumers influence the food industry through their purchasing decisions and activism?

By exploring these themes, we can gain a deeper understanding of the evolving nature of *kashrut* and its potential to shape a more just and sustainable future.



The AJ Social Action Committee continues to work for the good of our congregation and community at large. This fall, we collected toiletries for the Mitzvah Circle and sent approximately 60 postcards to bolster the vote prior to the election.

As we plan for 2025, we have renewed our participation with Kulanu, part of the ADL, with the emphasis on addressing antisemitism. Upcoming events include a **Lunch** 'n **Learn with Abby Krain, our local Kulanu representative** in **January**. The specific date has yet to be determined.

In 2023, Isabel Wilkerson of *The New York Times* published a provocative book with the title: *Caste: The Origins of Our Discontents*. Later that year, film director Ava Duvernay produced the movie "Origin" based on the book. Wilkerson looks at antisemitism, African-American racism, and the treatment of the Untouchables in India through the prism of caste. She identifies eight pillars of caste that illuminate the connections among those three prejudices. On **Monday**, **January 20**, for **Martin Luther King, Jr. Day**, we will screen the movie, and then we'll discuss her ideas and its implications for us. It is a powerful movie that shouldn't be missed. Stay tuned for details.

In addition, we hope to do a **follow-up with our teens and college students** about their experience
of antisemitism on campus and the blurring of lines
between anti-Zionism and antisemitism. We hope to
tap into the resources available through **Project Shema**.

Kulanu means "all of us" in Hebrew. The Kulanu organization seeks to create an inclusive Jewish world. Founded in 1994, they support isolated, emerging, and returning Jewish communities around the world. Some are discovering Judaism for the first time, others reinvigorating a forgotten practice, but all have experienced some kind of disconnection from global Jewry. They raise awareness and support to assist these groups with their desire to learn more about Judaism and connect with Jews beyond their community. They say, "connections we forge — through education, research, networking, fundraising, sustainable development, and publications — help 'all of us' to enrich our Jewish lives." 
