Sweet Speech/Lashon Ha-Arev

SOME OF WHAT'S INSIDE

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While excavating an archeological site in Jerusalem last summer, I came across a sealed, clay vessel containing several fragments of late antique texts. The fragment which I present below is a curious example of a Talmudic *sugya*, or unit, focusing on the theme of speech. It is curious because there is a parallel *sugya* in

the Babylonian Talmud (Arakhin 15b) which is concerned with *lashon ha-ra*, evil speech, the obverse of this text's concern. Perhaps this recently discovered fragment further justifies the Babylonian Talmud's claim that scholars from the Land of Israel treated each other graciously and with respect, while scholars from Babylonia treated each other harshly and with derision (Sanhedrin 24a). The pernicious effects of *lashon ha-ra* justify the punitive measures legislated by our sages. The equally efficacious force of sweet speech, however, supplements Judaism's understanding that words so affect reality that God is described as speaking the world into existence. May the publication of this text help all of Israel reclaim the legacy of *lashon ha-arev*, sweet speech.

Come and hear: Why does the giving of the Torah happen in the portion of Jethro? Rabbi Yossi ben David says: The Torah was cut the way the Torah was cut! It just so happened that the first words of this portion included the name of the righteous gentile, Jethro.

An objection is raised by Rabba Shulamit bat Chaya: If so, why not cut eight verses earlier where it is written: "Amalek came and fought with Israel at Refidim?" (Ex. 17:8) God forbid we should name our portion after the cursed Amalek — may his name be blotted out!

Says Rabbah Rachel: It is a case of measure for measure. Just as Jethro blessed the Holy One, so did the Holy One bless Jethro by giving his righteous name to this portion, as it says, "Blessed be the LORD who delivered you from the Egyptians and from Pharaoh." (Ex. 18:10)

Rivka the Righteous refutes: If so, why did not Malkitzedek get a portion named for him? For he said, "Blessed be God most high!" (Gen. 14:20)

Further, lest you think that everyone who blesses the LORD receives a Torah portion as a reward, doesn't Eliezer say, "Blessed be the LORD, the God of my master, Abraham?" (Gen. 24:27) Yet, Eliezer has no portion of the Torah in his name.

Shaye ben Shira, suggests in the name of Rav Rachmuna: The portion in which the Holy One, the Bounty of All Blessings, reveals the Torah is named after Jethro because he accentuates the positive, eliminates the negative, latches on to the affirmative, and doesn't mess around with Mr. Inbetween.

Rabbi Tuvia responds: It is fine that Jethro accentuates the positive, for it is written, "And Jethro rejoiced over all the kindness that the LORD had shown Israel." (Ex. 18:9) But, from where do you know that Jethro eliminated the negative?

Is it not written, "Moses then recounted to his father-in-law everything that the LORD had done to Pharaoh and to the Egyptians for Israel's sake, all the hardships that had befallen them on the way, and how the LORD had delivered them"? (Ex. 18:8) What are hardships if not negative? And, yet, Jethro only rejoiced!

But when did Jethro latch on to the affirmative?

The verse says, "And he kissed him." (Ex. 18-7) Wherever there is kissing, there must be hugging, as it is written about Jacob, "He kissed them and hugged them." (Gen. 48:10) So Jethro latched on to Moses who answered in the affirmative when God called to him out of the burning bush (Ex. 3:4).

And what of Jethro's dealings with Mr. Inbetween?

That is not a difficulty. It is written, "And Jethro, Moses' father-in-law, brought a burnt offering and sacrifices for God." (Ex. 18:12) Jethro himself brought the sacrifice and not a priestly intermediary.

Rav Aryeh Dov wonders: Does accentuating the positive, eliminating the negative, latching on to the affirmative, and not messing around with Mr. Inbetween really cause the Divine Presence to dwell upon you, as was the case with Jethro?

Batya bat Kol responds in the name of Rebbi Shimon ben Yochai: "Just as a man is punished for the evil word that he utters, so is he punished also for the good word that he has the opportunity to speak but does not speak." (Zohar 3:47a) If one is punished for the good word that one does not speak, all the more is one rewarded for the good word that one does speak!

Three commandments bring the Divine Presence near and guarantee one a portion in the world that is coming: faithfully loving the LORD, faithfully loving your spouse, and enhancing life. Sweet speech is equal to them all. (cf. B. Arakhin 15b)

All those who engage in sweet speech with another, the Divine Presence dwells between them. (cf. Avot 3:3) The only difference between sweet speech and sycophancy is the intention. Sweet speech is for the benefit of the listener. Sycophancy is for the benefit of the speaker.

Kol Yisrael arevim zeh l'zeh (B. Shevuot 39a). All of Israel are responsible for one another. But arevim can also be read as "sweeten;" hence: All of Israel shall sweeten one another.

On November 17 at 3:00 PM, we will honor the musical legacies of Dr. Hazzan Charles S. Davidson z''l and his beloved wife, Frances S. Davidson z''l.

Charles Davidson served as hazzan of Congregation Adath Jeshurun from 1966 to 2004. He was one of the most frequently commissioned composers by synagogues, cantors, and Jewish organizations, as well as secular choruses across America. His acclaimed song cycle, *I Never Saw Another Butterfly*, has been performed more than 4,500 times and is featured on at least ten commercial recordings. It is also the subject of two award-winning PBS documentaries: "The Journey of Butterfly" and "Butterfly Revisited."

Hazzan Davidson distinguished himself on the Milken Archive of Jewish Music editorial board. He was one of the first graduates of the Jewish Theological Seminary's Cantors Institute (now the H. L. Miller Cantorial School), where he received his doctorate in sacred music and joined the faculty in 1977.

Hazzan Charles Davidson's influence in his home congregation, Adath Jeshurun, was unique. His musically sophisticated and yet accessible Shabbat services and Chagim became integral parts of the community's spiritual life and are regularly sung by the congregation today.

Charles and his beloved Frances were dedicated musical partners whose never-ending commitment enriched the musical culture of their AJ community. Together, they curated nearly 50 years of concerts, including adult and children's choirs, a professional choir, fully orchestrated oratorios, operas, services, children's musicals, and chamber concerts.

In Rav Hazzan's World

Filled with an Attitude of Gratitude

Yamim Nora'im. That is how we refer to the High Holy Days in Hebrew.

Yamim are indisputably days and nora'im, in this context, describes the days as being filled with awe. It is not universally the case that this can be said of every Hebrew and English word pair, but just as the word "awe" is closely related to the word "awesome," so it is to the word awful. Thus, it is perfectly reasonable that Yamim Noraim could be mistranslated or jokingly referred to (perhaps by synagogue workers dreading the season) as "the awful days."

I want to thank everyone who contributed to these holidays at AJ, some of which are yet to even take place as I am writing. From taking reservations, ordering food, identifying the spaces, and simply listening to your needs, our office and housekeeping staffs do it all. What's more, they make it appear so easy that perhaps we neglect expressing just how important they are to the *Yamim Nora'im*. We are indebted to them and, in no small measure, they define the High Holy Days, augmenting the way they can inspire that sense of awe.

The Hush of Midnight was a wonderful way to bring in the mood for the season. Working together with our corridor partner Reform Congregation Keneseth Israel, their cantor Amy Levy, and their conductor (AJ raised) Alyssa Davidson. I was so glad to have Hazzan Tilman participating as well, having expressed much admiration for the monumental and defining work of our beloved Hazzan emeritus Charles S. Davidson z'' and the poetry of Ruth F. Brin z''1.

I am thankful to the largely unsung heroes of our daily minyan who make AJ the dependable minyan to attend and place to be on Old York Road. Whether looking to say Kaddish in person or online, marking a yahrzeit or partaking in our Thursday morning breakfast followed by the session of mindfulness, our twice daily services would not happen without their dedication and hard work. I am personally in their debt for them making it possible for me to take a bit of vacation this summer and even covering my usual duties during my unfortunate bout with the dreaded coronavirus.

I am grateful to the many shofar blowers who made the "big blast" ending the Yom Kippur fast. Many of you came to the pop-up shofar blowing event that was held on the Sunday evening before Rosh HaShanah. There we learned some of the sources for blowing one's horn, what horns are and are not kosher to use, and several attained a new shofar that fit you.





We had a lovely turnout of AJers help bring a feeling of the AJ High Holy Day service to the residents of the Delaware Valley Veterans home the day before Yom Kippur on October 10. This group, Dr. Harry Lessig, Valerie Leiberman, Debbie Klinger, Karen Moses, and Ed Moses, and many other devoted congregants have joined me on Hanukkah and Passover over the years at this particular home. It was so meaningful to see their faces light up from the shofar, singing the familiar tunes, and beating our breast admitting our shortcomings. (See photo above.)

Thus far, my attitude of gratitude has described that which has already taken place. I am however tremendously grateful to the family of our beloved Charles and Frances Davidson z". They have been working diligently for months to create an afternoon of warm memories and fine music carefully curated by Ilana Davidson. I am blessed and feel truly fortunate and honored to be part of this celebration of their lives and the musical and leadership gifts they gave to our precious Congregation Adath Jeshurun over many decades. The afternoon program will feature many fine voices and musicians including yours! Yes, we will invite the congregation to participate as that was so often the *raison d'etre* to Charles' composing.

For some, <u>Hanukkah may fall</u> on the perfect date — the first candle is lit on the evening of December 25. We thought we would celebrate <u>Hanukkah early</u> and set the mood for the actual dates when many of you might be otherwise busy.

If you came to or heard about Havdalah Rocks just a few weeks ago October 26, then you already know that Havdalah can really rock! On Saturday, December 14, the sun sets pretty early, allowing us to offer a fun early evening Havdalah and Hanukkah (Let's go with Havdalukkah!) Rocks program beginning at 5:15 PM. It promises to be another fun AJ event for all ages.

My attitude of gratitude is not without its moments of longing. I pause now, thinking perhaps it is inappropriate, given all of our challenges as a Jewish people, to close this article without a recognition that not all is right in the world. Just as we break a glass at the end of a wedding to acknowledge a very similar idea, there is this caveat. We have now for over a year, fervently prayed with resolve for peace, for the release of captives and a better way forward for our people.

We can celebrate what we have accomplished, look forward to all that is planned and be committed each one of us, to our own brand of Zionism, finding our way to repair and strengthen our challenging world.

On **Saturday, November 9 following Shabbat services**, Adult Ed will be holding a **Lunch 'n Learn with Rabbi Stuart Weinblatt**. He will give us an update on the successes and challenges facing the Jewish community's relationship to Israel. Rabbi Weinblatt is the Founder and Chair of the Zionist Rabbinic Coalition. The Zionist Rabbinic Coalition fosters love and dedication to Zionism and Israel among generations of American Jews. Their mission is to promote unity, understand-



ing, and cooperation among the Jewish communities of Israel and the Diaspora.

On **Thursday, November 21 at 7:30 PM**, Rav Shai will present the first session of a **six-part series called "About Zion."**Jewish educators and rabbis have done a better job teaching Jewish values than Jewish history. This six-session course dives deep into the history of the relationship between the People of Israel and the Land of Israel. The first session will focus on the biblical period, with subsequent sessions on the rabbinic period, the Enlightenment, the Harbingers of Political Zionism, the



pre-State period, and the War of Independence. Several of our movies in "Jewsday Night at the Movies" will correspond to our curriculum. Remaining dates are January 12†, February 6*, March 23†, April 27†, and May 22*.

On **Sunday, December 8**, Rav Shai will lead a trip to Washington, DC's newest museum, the **Museum of the Bible**. Although the Museum has Christian and evangelical exhibits, their treatment of what they respectfully refer to as the "Hebrew Bible," as opposed to the Old Testament, is excellent. We have timed the trip to coincide with the corresponding classes in Ray Shai's "About Zion" series.

Field Trip to Kneehigh Produce and Flax Farm

To begin the AJ journey on "Kosher 2.0 — Is Traditional Kashrut Enough?," fifteen AJers with friends and family visited Kneehigh Farm in Pottstown, PA to meet and learn about sustainable agriculture and eating from Farmer Emma DeLong. Kneehigh Farm is seven-acre vegetable/women-run farm that is co-located on the Pickering Land Trust site which includes several other farmers and their operations raising flowers and poultry.

Emma's farming philosophy is to not use pesticides or herbicides. She rotates her crops and composts in the field to replenish the soil health and balance the soil chemistry for the next season. Her fields are minimally tilled to reduce carbon dioxide escaping from the soil into the atmosphere. Crops such as salad mix are delicate and require shading under tarps to reduce heat and sun until they are fully established. Other crops are tarped or netted to reduce insect infestations. Emma tries to use as little petroleumbased plastic as possible and opts for biodegradable plastic to protect plants in the field when biodegradable products are affordable. All the vegetables are grown from seed, started at the farm, then field planted.

Kneehigh Farm sells through Red Dog Market, close to the farm, and hosts a Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) program. CSA is when a community of individuals pays in advance of the growing season to support a farm operation; then contributors receive a share in the harvest throughout the growing season. Emma has over 100 contributors to her CSA and sells her local products to private retail stores like Riverwards in Fishtown.

The array of field crops at Kneehigh is varied, including okra, broccolini, lettuce, squash, and tomatoes and potatoes. They grow products that their customers want, including flowers and honey from their own beehives.

Did you know that there is no linen fabric produced in the United States at this time? Farmer Emma is changing that through the Pennsylvania Flax project. PA Flax is bringing flax for linen production back to Pennsylvania through organizing farmers, creating infrastructure for processing, and making American linen possible again. Flax is a climate-positive plant that's easy to grow. It requires little-to-no chemical inputs or irrigation. It protects waterways, remediates soil, and provides pollinator habitat. Flax's most valuable use is for linen production. Demand for linen grows as consumers turn away from synthetics and demand natural fibers. Flax can also be

turned into dozens of other products, making it a versatile and high-value crop. Find out how you can grow linen and be a part of the change at https://paflaxproject.com/square-yard-project!

Supporting Farmer Emma by eating products which are grown chemical-free within one hour of Elkins Park is a way of using our buying power to support local farmers producing fresh, seasonal foods and reducing our greenhouse gas emissions.



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
