Many people whom I've met, both current AJ members and former AJ members, tell me that their mug shot hangs on our preschool walls in the Confirmation Class of (fill in the blank.) After hearing the claim to fame so many times, I went downstairs to tour our past.

The photos begin in 1902 with Rabbi Ehrenreich. There were 10 students in that class. By 1944, AJ hit its peak with 58 students!

But for the next twenty years, there was a steady decline. By 1964, AJ was back down to 10 students.

Rabbi Rosenberg, z"I, had come on board in 1960 after Rebbe Klein, z"I, retired. The next five were years were ones of transition for AJ during which the shul relocated from Broad and Diamond Streets to our current location and hired Cantor Charles Davidson, z"I.

Those changes brought about a dramatic improvement in the numbers of our confirmation students, quickly reaching a high point in 1970 of 47 students. But demographics began working against the shuls on the Old York Road corridor. By 1982, enrollment began to steadily decline. Last year, there were six students in our Confirmation Class and this year we have none.

There's another trend, however, that is important to recognize and accommodate. At the end of February 2025, the Pew Research Center published its 2023–2024 Religious Landscape Study. The Study focused on American Christians but offered insights into American patterns of religiosity in general. Here are a few to consider.

Seventy-five percent of all Americans born since 1980 attend services a few times a year at most. The percentage of those who attend monthly has dropped from 54% in 2007 to 45% in 2018. "Jewish Americans are among the most likely of the religiously affiliated groups studied to say religion is not too important or not at all important in their lives — though 27% say it is very important" (p. 159). Even though 43% of American Jews say that religion isn't so important to them, they are still affiliating with Judaism. On the other hand, 24% of American-born Jews say they no longer consider themselves Jewish.

As we saw at AJ in the 1960s, trends can be reversed, but it involved both changes in geography and personnel. What is it that keeps 43% of American Jews Jewish if it's not religion? And whatever it is, can we promote it at AJ to attract them to our community? Or would it be mission creep because we are, ostensibly, a religious institution?



While we mull over these questions, I'm trying to resuscitate our confirmation program. Can you help? If you know of any teenagers, regardless of their affiliation with AJ, who want to spend a year learning about Jewish ethics while getting college credit, send them my way. And what did the Pew Religious Landscape Study say about how Jews make decisions about right and wrong? By a depressingly wide margin, Jews are the least likely of all religious Americans to consult our rich tradition of ethics when making decisions (p. 282).

I leave you with a parable from the Talmud (Brachot 61b).

The Sages taught: One time, after the Bar Kokhva rebellion, the evil empire of Rome decreed that Israel may not engage in the study and practice of Torah. Pappos ben Yehuda came and found Rabbi Akiva who was convening assemblies in public and engaging in Torah study. Pappos said to him: Akiva, are you not afraid of the empire? Rabbi Akiva answered him: I will relate a parable. To what can this be compared? It is like a fox walking along a riverbank when he sees fish gathering and fleeing from place to place.

The fox said to them: From what are you fleeing?

They said to him: We are fleeing from the nets that people cast upon us.

He said to them: Do you wish to come up onto dry land, and we will reside together just as my ancestors resided with your ancestors?

The fish said to him: You are the one of whom they say he is the cleverest of animals? You are not clever; you are a fool. If we are afraid in the water, our natural habitat which gives us life, then in a habitat that causes our death, all the more so.

The moral is: So too, we Jews, now that we sit and engage in Torah study, about which it is written: "For that is your life, and the length of your days" (Deuteronomy 30:20), thus if we proceed to sit idle from its study, which is our life, all the more so will we fear death.

I am so happy to know each one of them and I hope you will come to any or all three of the Shabbat services in which they will participate on May 9 and 10.

I love my regular sessions with these conversion candidates. Each has come to their decision to convert to Judaism by way of a unique path. It brings meaning to their path by acquiring the liturgical vocabulary to participate in an authentically Jewish manner. Thus, our immediate goal is to work on their execution of some of the nuts and bolts of our Jewish liturgy.

We started with Shema, the proclamation of Gd's Oneness which appears early in the morning Shacharit service, as well as the evening Ma'ariv service, reflecting the injunction in its continuation commanding us that these very words we must have in our hearts and teach our children should be on our lips when we lie down at night and when we rise up in the morning. They have also mastered the aliyah blessings, so that they can take hold of the Torah poles, the *atzei chaim*, the branches or trees of life attached to which are the Torah scroll parchments so carefully hand-scribed. They physically take hold as they spiritually grasp and accept the commandments therein.

It is a tall order and we have much to review. Still, it isn't unusual for our conversations to veer from 'tachlis' to more broad and reflective territory. In a recent conversation, one of my students shared the overwhelming feeling they had with the vast diversity within our Jewish umbrella. The student listed the many movements, organizations and perspectives within our community, each with their own passions and unique positions and yet, they expressed quizzically, they are all considered Jewish?? It is especially this aspect of the Jewish community that is an adjustment to the newcomer and it is often described as K'lal Yisrael — כלל ישראל.

This not only distinguishes us as Jews — it is also a source of deep pride. Of course, the picture is far from perfect. Significant divides exist between different groups, and at times, these rifts are so deep they suppress open dialogue, discourage collaboration, and make even the thought of praying together feel impossible.

I'm reminded of the vision Carole King evokes in her song "Tapestry" — "of rich and royal hue," an "everlasting vision of the ever-changing view." Similarly, while the tensions within the Jewish world are real and must not be overlooked, the vast majority of Jews remain united by a shared loyalty to foundational principles of Jewish and Zionist identity. Together, we form a beautiful, complex, and ever-evolving quilted whole.

L'olam Committee



Balancing Our Health and Welfare at AJ

We gather at synagogue, we run into one another at the market, or in line to pick up a friend at the train. We schmooze with friends about what brings us joy, pride, and hope. We also share about the things that bring us anxiety, sadness, or stress. Sometimes, that part can be a bit more difficult to do. Honoring and understanding all of these conflicting emotions can help us live balanced lives. Some days it can be easier to notice the things that are difficult in our lives than to notice the things that are going well. This is where our friendships make the difference.

We've learned that by remembering, sharing, and revisiting the good in our lives, we strengthen the memories. We know from research that revisiting pleasant memories releases dopamine, serotonin, and oxytocin. These are known as "happy hormones" because they are associated with feeling pleasure and a sense of well-being and can help us make social connections. Over the past 25 years of research, it has become clear that strong bonds of friendship and family are so important to our sense of safety and security. People who have life partners and good friends they see regularly live longer and suffer less from sickness.

The past six years have been particularly tumultuous. Ongoing stress can accumulate, causing the immune system to work overtime. It can also increase the risk of a host of ailments. Trauma and chaos, including the pandemic, global conflict, racism and racial injustice, inflation, climate-related disasters, and 10/7 are weighing on our collective consciousness. This is where the place you choose to make social connections matters.

Spending time at Adath Jeshurun can provide excitement, joy, curiosity, connection, and even solace. We can't totally ignore or hide from stressors. However, sharing our concerns over coffee after Havdalah, in the kitchen while cleaning up, or before a speaker begins can lighten our burdens. Think about what you can do to create more joy in your life and in the lives of those you love! AJ is a warm space. A heartfelt conversation with Rav might remind us of what we have to be grateful for. Rav Hazzan's beautiful praying can help us feel the connection as we daven with our fellow AJers. Numerous experts agree that making time to engage in activities that divert your attention and bring you joy can not be underrated! At this chaotic time in history, the benefit of connection to AJ and to your fellow AJers is a gift of calm in the storm.

Sit and engage in a mindful meditation, deep, healing breathing or gentle movement for 30 minutes. Meet us in the Strauss Chapel immediately after minyan breakfast. Come as you are, come from home or work or from minyan. Join your friends or bring a friend for a moment of mindfulness, calm, and community! No registration is needed. Because each moment matters!

We read and we listen to the news to stay informed. Reducing anxiety involves balancing all of the information coming at us every day. Our brains are wired to pay attention to potential threats, so when we're constantly exposed to distressing news, it can trigger our stress response. All of this can weigh on our hearts and minds. If you are feeling powerless to change the negative situations reported, you may be experiencing meta anxiety, which is anxiety about having anxiety. Creating boundaries around your news consumption or talking about the chaos you are experiencing might help your frame of mind. You don't have to totally ignore the reality of these times. As I said earlier, that would be nearly impossible to do. Instead, put parameters around what you choose to listen to or read when you consume your social media, and schedule in social time, mindfulness time, and family/friend time. Ensure you get sufficient doses of what brings you joy, safety and pleasure.

In our last newsletter, I suggested getting involved in a committee or helping out at AJ. Today, I am asking you to bring a friend with you to share the AJ experience. Increase your joy, and share the comfort that walking through our doors brings you. If you have an idea for an activity, a trip, or an event, call me. I will do everything I can to make it happen! I sincerely believe in community as an antidote to loneliness and despair. Come dwell in this warm place with deep roots and wide arms. Adath Jeshurun is a place of welcoming and care. I hope to see you and a friend at AJ soon.



And if not now, when? Those are words that I live by, aspire to and want to live by every day."



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
