A narticle caught my eye in a recent issue of *The Jewish Exponent*. The title was "A 'Long-Lost' *Shul* Gets Lots of TLC." It described the discovery of a synagogue in the Eastern State Penitentiary that was built between 1913 and 1924, and closed with the prison in 1971. Buried under a collapsed ceiling, it is now being restored at the prison which is now a museum and tourist site.

What caught my eye was the final observation in the article, that it is expected that the restoration will be completed in the Spring, by Passover, "so the synagogue can begin to receive the curious."
