The weeks since October 7 have been exhausting. It seems that fires flare up constantly demanding our intervention.

There is a piece of Talmudic Aggadah that has been in my head of late. It deals with our very first war once we crossed the Sea. Amalek, may their name be blotted out, attacked our

stragglers—the elderly and the women with children. Moses, Aaron, and Hur climbed to the top of the nearest hill, and Moses raised his hands to the heavens. When he did so, Israel prevailed. But his arms became heavy and he had to lower his hands—that's when the Amalekites turned the tables and began winning the war.

One of them had an idea to seat Moses on a rock and then Aaron and Hur could each hold up one of Moses's hands. Here's the Aggadah:

But didn't Moses have one pillow or one cushion to sit upon the rock while holding his hands aloft during the war with Amalek? Of course, he did! But Moses said to himself: Since the Jewish people are immersed in suffering while fighting Amalek, I too will be with them in suffering in the way I can be. The sages said: Anyone who is distressed together with the community will merit seeing the consolation of the community.

Only when we share the pain of our Israeli family will we share the joy.

Thirty-nine years later, the tribes of Dan, Reuven, and half of Menashe requested from Moses to settle on the east side of the Jordan River. They explained to Moses they could earn a better living there. Moses acquiesced with the following stipulations: build schools for your children and fight on the frontlines of our battles to secure the land. Just because they didn't live in the Land of Israel didn't mean they could avoid joining the fight.

As we most recently heard from the survivors of the Kfar Aza pogrom, so much remains to be done on the ground and so much trauma needs to be borne. If you

Here is a brief recap of what we've done here at AJ. We have purchased an ambulance through Magen David Adom. We have educated ourselves through the 10/7 Resilience series featuring General Shimshoni and Kobi Cooper. We have witnessed Israeli art since 10/7 with Shirel Horovitz and held a community vigil. Yet so many of us want to do more. Here are a few suggestions.

Sar-El is a volunteer program with the Israel Defense Forces. They run 2- and 3-week programs for adults of all ages. If you're interested in volunteering on a military base, consider this. Get more information at https://www.sar-el.org.

Emergency Volunteers Project (EVP) is

staffing the EVP Mass-Feeding Unit, working with Israel's Home Front Command. It trains volunteers to prepare fresh, healthy meals for IDF units and needy populations using a fleet of mobile kitchens. You can learn more about their efforts at https://www.evp.org.il.

Israel Food Rescue Mission is a joint effort of HaShomer HaChadash, Kol Israel and Brothers in Arms, in response to a war-related manpower crisis on Israeli farms. Volunteers may sign up for five or more days (paying their own way) or for a year-long stint doing agricultural work and sleeping on the farm. Find out more at https://israelfoodrescue.com.

Consider **Masa Israel Journey**'s new 6-week Israel volunteer program, designed in response to the ongoing conflict. During your six weeks in Israel, you will engage in impactful volunteer work. Choose your volunteer initiative and be part of Israel's story of resilience:

In the Cantor's Corner

Elections Will Be Held in January 2025

My title has you questioning, Is this a typo? Has there been a policy change in American elections that I missed?

Well, allow me to answer a question with a question. Are you aware of the *deep-rooted* history of our elections that always take place on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November? My italicizing of "deep-rooted" was actually a clue.

The choice of election day in the U.S. began as an effort to maximize participation by avoiding the Midwest farming seasons. Travel to the polls took longer, thus Monday was off-limits due to Sunday being the Christian Sabbath, and Wednesday was market day. Ah, but what about when November begins on a Tuesday? In this case, elections would take place on the following Tuesday to avoid conflicts with the first day of the month, when merchants were particularly busy closing their previous month's accounts.

The age-old tradition of American elections hasn't been altered, so allow me to begin again.

I recently received an email from Daniel Livingston, a young man who was raised here at AJ. Aside from Facebook, we had lost touch with each other, so it was a delight to catch up. After graduation from Rochester University with a degree in International Relations, Daniel made *aliyah* and joined the Artillery Corps, rising to the rank of Squad Commander. Since October 7, Daniel remains on reserve duty.

As a civilian, Daniel serves as the Director of External Relations for Yizhar Hess, Vice Chairman of the World Zionist Organization (WZO) in Jerusalem. Officials within the WZO represent perspectives across the political map, immeasurably influencing Israeli politics. The future for religious pluralism depends on our support. Access to the Kotel for women and gender-mixed groups wishing to pray together wearing *tallitot* and reading Torah, conversions, marriages, and divorces performed by non-Orthodox rabbis, and the recent efforts toward judicial reform are but a few reasons this is important to us as affiliated Jews within the Conservative Movement. The results of these elections not only play a major role in how our values are expressed in Israel—pluralism, democracy, and more—but impact how billions of dollars a year are spent, including funding for the Conservative programs and institutions we love.

Your vote is needed. Yizhar Hess represents Mercaz, the Zionist slate of the global Masorti/Conservative Movement. He and Daniel are spearheading efforts to increase voting in the next elections by our congregation and others. This is NOT a fundraiser. "Mercaz" is the Hebrew word for "center," and "olami" means "worldwide" or "global." Mercaz Olami is a Zionist political organization representing the global Masorti/Conservative Movement of Judaism at the World Zionist Organization, Jewish Agency for Israel, Keren Kayemeth Leyisrael, and Keren HaYesod. As one of the many organizations running for election to this democratically-elected parliament of the Jewish people, Mercaz works year-round to advance the Conservative Movement's values and interests in Israel. This includes but is in no way limited to: recognition of Conservative and Reform conversions, equal funding for Masorti/Conservative institutions, protecting the Law of Return, promoting religious pluralism, and supporting the implementation of the Western Wall compromise agreement that would allow all streams to practice freely at the Kotel, Judaism's holiest site.

Let me state again, this is NOT a fundraiser. There is a nominal administrative fee to register, which was most recently \$5. The first request of me by Mr. Hess was identifying a co-captains for this cause (their nomenclature) and I am happy to announce that Steven Strauss and Morey Smerling have accepted the position in addition to all the other amazing things they do for AJ.

Over the next year, we will have opportunities to learn more about the essential work and efforts of Mercaz Olami, the international organization for Conservative Judaism. Our focus will be largely about registering congregants to vote in the 2025 WZO elections. We all deserve to be counted and for our votes regarding Israel and her future to count. Of course, as registered voters, you can vote for the party that most speaks to you and your priorities. Think of it as driving you (figuratively) to the polls with the opportunity to register and vote either online or mail with a paper ballot.

Voting will begin on a to-be-determined date in January 2025 and conclude March 2025.

AJ Early Learning Center

Growing up at AJ I always had an affinity for Purim. Maybe it was the Hamantaschen (I do have a sweet tooth) or it could have been the opportunity to gather with friends at the *megillah* reading (which was often on a school night), but most likely it was the dressing in costume. From a very young age I liked to perform (like our preschoolers who are regularly found playing dress-up). Why not? My audience was always filled with doting grandparents and family members. Sometimes I coerced my cousins and brothers to join me. Over time we developed into a talented air band that rehearsed after holiday meals and performed during dessert to our adoring fans. Forty years later, I am proud to say that the Four *Mitzvot* of Purim are still executed at the Adath Jeshurun Early Learning Center because they encompass special lessons for everyone including our pint-sized audience.

- **1.Story telling.** Our teachers are incredible at bringing a book to life. In our youngest classes, stories are shared and children learn to listen intently. As the little learners move through our program, they learn sight words and how to find connections to the moral of the story. The *mitzvah* at Purim is to listen to the reading of the *Megillah* (the Book of Esther). One of the highlights for kids is to use a grogger (noisemaker) to drown out the name of Haman (the villain). It is the only holiday where noise is welcome and even encouraged during services.
- 2.Matanot LaEvyonim. Give to the needy. Each week the classes bring tzedakah (charity) to our Shabbat celebration. We also recently held a clothing drive for "Cradles to Crayons" that provided winter wear for children in our extended community. We donated more than 20 bags of clothing and toys. Giving to those less fortunate is a common lesson in our classrooms and a practice our population regularly engages in.
- 3. Mishloach Manot. Send food or gifts to friends. One of the greatest joys working in an Early Learning Center is to see the first friendships forming. The teachers, when speaking to the children, always refer to the group as friends. "Friends, will you please line up at the door?" don't think your friend wants to play right now." In response, the children become friends and, ultimately, so do the parents forming our Early Learning Community.
- **4.The Feast.** What's a preschool without food?! Snack and lunchtime stories are the best! If items in one child's lunchbox are more abundant than another child's, the teachers have to think quickly to find a reason why. "Well, you have less grapes, but your grapes are bigger." The best part of these moments is the group connection.

Take a lesson from AJ's little ones, listen intently, make holy noise, give generously, build community, and eat together. *Hag Purim!* (a)



Passover Reminders

The Fifth Question: Passover and Palestine, with Professor Jonathan Zimmerman and Dr. Sion Segal

Tuesday, April 9, 2024 at 7:45 PM (in person and via Zoom)

The master narrative of the Jewish people, rehearsed daily in prayer and annually at the Passover Seder, is the redemption of the Israelites from oppression in Egypt. This year, in a small strip of land adjacent to Egypt, the Israel Defense Forces are fighting against an Islamist terror organization that refuses to acquiesce to Israel's existence.

As we retell our story, we are obligated to see ourselves as if we had come out of Egypt. In America and in our families, there is conflict around the question of who is the oppressor and who is the oppressed. Is Hamas the Pharoah who does not recognize Joseph and seeks to eliminate his people? Are the Israelis guilty of persecuting the Palestinians by not recognizing their right for a national home or even their basic human rights?



Professor Jonathan Zimmerman (left, top), a professor of the history of education at the University of Pennsylvania, and Dr. Sion Segal (left, bottom), a psychologist specializing in conflict resolution, will focus on the dynamics around the seder table. Were the plagues against Egypt collective punishment? Was God's slaying of the firstborn genocide? What should we learn from our common texts, how can we apply those lessons today, and how can we engage one another in a spirit of compassion that avoids the plague of darkness where, according to the Torah, "no one could see his brother"?

KNOW EVERYONE BY THESE PRESENTS: That I, the undersigned, do hereby make, constitute and appoint Rav Shai Cherry (hereafter, Rav Shai), my true and lawful attorney to act in my place and stead, for me and in my name and in my behalf to sell all HAMETZ owned and possessed by me (knowingly or unknowingly) as stated in the TORAH and defined and interpreted by the SAGES OF ISRAEL (e.g., HAMETZ that tends to harden and to adhere to a surface of inside of pans, pots, or other cooking or eating utensils, of whatsoever nature, and all kinds of live animals that have been eating HAMETZ or mixtures thereof, and to lease all places wherein the aforementioned HAMETZ owned or possessed by me may be found), especially in the premises located at the following address(es): [PLEASE WRITE OUT]

This authorization includes the sale of any and all HAMETZ that is in my possession on the morning of April 22 of this year at the time of sale, and transit goods that may be delivered to me during the period of April 22 to April 29 of this year, whether owned by me wholly or in part, or through shares of stock in corporations which own or deal in HAMETZ. All the aforesaid HAMETZ is to be sold to a non-Jew of Rav Shai's choosing, at any time during the time legally allotted for the sale of HAMETZ. The buyer has free access to the HAMETZ acquired by him. The place where the HAMETZ is located may be rented to the buyer for the period from 10:00 AM, April 22 to April 29, 2024 after sunset, and the rabbi is authorized to act as the agent for such rental.

The exact assessment of quantity and value will take place at any time agreed upon between Ray Shai and the purchaser, even after the Passover holiday. The buyer's deposit is to be paid to Rav Shai with the balance due on April 22, 2024. Should the buyer not remit the balance of the purchase price by sunset on April 22, the sale will be deemed null and void.

RAV SHAI CHERRY has the full power and authority to assign or appoint a substitute or substitutes to act in his place and stead with all the same powers and authority that I have invested in him, and I do hereby ratify and confirm all that my said attorney, or his substitute or substitutes, shall lawfully do or cause to be done by virtue of these presents.

This authorization is effected by my signature to this document.



AJ's January B' Mitzvah

Leilah Spina

Leilah Spina is 12 years old and attends Jack M. Barrack Hebrew Academy. Her hobbies are drawing, crafts, playing the piano, and learning more about Judaism. Leilah has also won multiple top prizes at music competitions. Leilah aspires to be a doctor when she grows up.

D'var Torah | Beshalah 2024 (January 27, 2024)

Good morning and Shabbat Shalom! I am filled with joy to see everyone here today—whether I know you or not, your presence here is very special to me. My name is Leilah Spina.

My Torah portion is Beshalah and contains "Shirat Hayam," or "Song of the Sea." Moses leads the Hebrews out of Egypt in an effort to escape Pharaoh after being released from slavery. Moses remembers that Joseph's dying wish was to be buried in Israel so, according to the Midrash, Moses goes to the Nile River searching for where the Egyptians had sunk Joseph's coffin. Here, Hashem performs a miracle by magically lifting Joseph's coffin out of the water. Moses and the Hebrews pack up Joseph's bones, grab their *matzoh*, and start making their way out of Egypt!

As the Hebrews approached the Sea of Reeds, Hashem instructed Moses to reach out his hand and a strong wind would come to split the sea waters. The rabbis came up with a Midrash that explains how the sea didn't automatically split when Moses lifted his hands. To show his faith in Hashem, an Israelite named Nachshon walked into the sea until his eyes were submerged, and then the sea split. Anyways, upon reaching the other side, Moses lifted his hand again and the waters crashed on the Egyptian army, killing them all and delivering the Israelites to safety. The Israelites feared and loved Hashem for his awesome power, and Miriam led them in song to praise Hashem.

The Israelites reached a land called Etham and began their 40 year journey through the desert. They immediately started searching for water and food and quickly lost faith in Hashem after being unable to find water for what felt like a very long time. Moses cried out to Hashem for help, and Hashem delivered.

As I think about the importance of this Torah passage in my life, there are a few themes that caught my attention: sense of identity, faith and hope, and struggles of a post-slavery life.

As a Japanese-American, I have a multi-ethnic background that is filled with historical conflict. My great-grandmother (Oki-Baba) and late great-grandfather (Oki-Jiji) lived through World War II in Okinawa and to stay safe, they constantly moved from hiding place to hiding place. Oki-Baba would tell me stories about how she lived in caves, the jungle, and even cemeteries! She was very scared of ALL soldiers on every side for their horrible treatment of civilians.

Moses also had a bit of an identity conflict. Being raised as an Egyptian prince under the Pharaoh who was torturing the Israelites, Moses struggled with his identity once he found out that he, too, was an Israelite, and ran away to explore his identity. It was once Moses came to terms with his identity that Hashem chose him to lead the Israelites out of Egypt.

As I mentioned earlier, Moses fulfills his people's ancestral promise to retrieve Joseph's bones before escaping Egypt. Why is this important? Well, Joseph always correctly interpreted the will of Hashem through his ability to interpret dreams. I guess we can call him "Dream literate?" Joseph *knew* that one day the Israelites would return to the promised land, and that it would just be a matter of getting them there without quitting. By making the children of Israel (aka, his brothers) promise to one day bury his bones in

the promised land, he was giving the Israelites hope that one day they would return home. His bones served as a material reminder of the promise Hashem made, and no matter how hard the test, to never lose faith in Hashem. The first test was to escape from the Egyptian army by splitting the sea, and the second was to overcome hunger and thirst.

"Out of the frying pan and into the fire" is a perfect saying to describe freedom from slavery. I don't know if you can, but try to imagine with me what life is like after slavery. No home, no job, no food, only the tattered clothes on your back, and racism and hatred towards your people still exist vastly throughout the land... but at least you have your freedom, right!? For 400 years (that's 20 generations!), the Israelites were fed and clothed by their Egyptian masters, then all of a sudden they were expected to take care of themselves? Like animals being raised in the zoo and then released into the wild, they just didn't know how to fend for themselves. Towards the end of my Torah portion, one can truly feel the struggles of the now-freed Israelites when hearing them kvetch to Moses about the bitter water and lack of sustenance. Many of them desired to return to slavery because they felt it was the better alternative to struggling in the desert.

While I was doing some research on the topic of post-slavery struggles, I learned that in the U.S. post-civil war era, hundreds of thousands of freed slaves died from diseases and hunger. The main contributors that led to the starvation of these former slaves were the lack of leadership in society to help integrate the former slaves and the lack of economic opportunities for freed slaves. The end of my reading is only the beginning of the many more struggles that Israelites faced later in the Torah, but one thing is for certain. Without the help of Hashem, the Israelites would've suffered a similar fate. In the U.S. and around the world, hunger and poverty still exist today. Luckily, with the help of technology, we are able to easily provide support to those in need. In the spirit of my Torah reading, I focused my *Mitzvah* Project on putting together a food drive. With the help of family, friends, and our community, I was able to raise almost \$400 and 431 lbs of food!

I would like to thank my great-grandmother for making this beautiful tallis, my parents for supporting me in all that I do, and my brother for helping lead us in some prayers today. I also want to thank everyone who supported my Food Drive *Mitzvah* Project! Finally, I would like to thank Rav Shai, who helped me understand the meaning behind my Torah portion, and Rav Hazzan, who helped me prepare the Torah/Haftarah portions and lead some prayers today. They have all been incredible mentors for me in life and I am truly appreciative.

As we reinvigorate our campus-wide recycling efforts to reduce waste, we need the grown-ups among us to join in with the synagogue and the ELC. It's meaningful and a *mitzvah* to take care of the Earth...and it's easy to do! Please take the time to recycle properly. AJ's L'olam Committee hosted an amazing environmental fair in the fall. Scholar-in-Residence Weekend

Undoing the Knots, with Prof. Maureen O'Connell Friday, March 29 — Kabbalat Shabbat: 6:15 PM, followed by Shabbat Dinner



Prof. Maureen O'Connell's most recent work. Undoing the Knots: Five Generations of American Catholic Anti-Blackness, is a personal and historical examination of White Catholic anti-Blackness in the U.S. told

through five generations of her family, with a call for meaningful racial healing and justice within Catholicism. The evening's program is based upon her book.

Maureen H. O'Connell chairs the Department of Religion at La Salle University where she is also a professor of Christian Ethics. She holds a B.A. in history from Saint Joseph's University and a Ph.D. in theological ethics from



Boston College. She authored *Compassion:* Loving Our Neighbor in an Age of Globalization (Orbis Books, 2009) and If These Walls Could Talk: Community Muralism and the Beauty of Justice (The Liturgical Press, 2012), which won two prestigious book awards in 2012.

"Synagoga and Ecclesia in Our Time" — **Expressing in Art the New Jewish-Catholic** Relationship, with Dr. Phillip Cunningham

Saturday, March 30 — Shabbat service: 9:30 AM; Lunch and Learn: 12:30 PM



Meaning "Synagogue" and "Church" in Greek, Synagoga and Ecclesia are a pair of female figures found in medieval Christian art that personified Judaism and the Church. Ecclesia was portrayed as a majestic, crowned, and

triumphant figure, far superior to Synagoga who was depicted as defeated, uncrowned, her staff broken, and her vision blinded. This contemptuous contrast was repudiated by the Catholic Church in 1965 with the Second Vatican Council declaration Nostra Aetate ("In Our Time"). To mark that document's 50th anniversary, Saint Joseph's University commissioned a new artwork to reflect Catholic teaching that both communities can learn about God by exploring their sacred texts together, effectively studying as chavruta partners. This presentation will narrate the development and meaning of this historic sculpture, created by local sculptor Joshua Koffman, and personally blessed by Pope Francis during his visit to Philadelphia in 2015.

Dr. Philip A. Cunningham is Professor of Theology and director of the Institute for Jewish-Catholic Relations of Saint Joseph's University in Philadelphia, PA. He specializes in theologies of the Christian and Jewish, and especially the Catholic-Jewish, relationship. He is the author or editor of over a dozen books and dozens of articles or book chapters.

Antisemitism x Antiracism: At the Intersection, with Prof. Susannah Heschel

Sunday, March 31 — Brunch and Learn



Prof. Susannah Heschel will be discussing newer methods of analyzing antisemitism that include considerations of the emotional and spiritual consequences of anti-Jewish hatred and draw on recent

scholarship concerning anti-Black racism and enslavement in the U.S.

Susannah Heschel is the Eli M. Black Distinguished Professor of Jewish Studies at Dartmouth College. Her scholarship focuses on Jewish and Protestant thought during the 19th and 20th centuries, including the history of biblical scholarship, Jewish scholarship on Islam, and the history of antisemitism. Her numerous publications include Abraham Geiger and the Jewish Jesus (University of Chicago Press), which won a National Jewish Book Award; The Aryan Jesus: Christian Theologians and the Bible in Nazi Germany (Princeton University Press); and Jüdischer Islam: *Islam und Deutsch-Jüdische Selbstbestimmung* (Mathes und Seitz). Innocence Project, with Marissa Boyers Bluestine

During Shabbat lunch, congregant Marissa Boyers Bluestine will discuss her work with Innocence Project. In addition to identifying and litigating cases for the convicted innocent, the Pennsylvania Innocence Project works to improve the criminal justice system to prevent innocent people from being convicted. Marissa Boyers Bluestine is an Assistant Director of the Quattrone Center for the Fair Administration of Justice at the University of Pennsylvania Carey Law School. Bluestine has repeatedly been recognized for her important work, receiving the Andrew Hamilton Award from the Philadelphia Bar Association and the Woman of Distinction Award from

the *Philadelphia Legal* Intelligencer.

INNOCENCE **PROJECT**

Mass Incarceration, with Robert Lankin

In another Lunch-and-Learn, Robert Lankin, a mass incarceration expert, will talk about the incredible number of Pennsylvanians in prison, the real cost to taxpayers, and alternative approaches to probation and bail that can dramatically reduce the size of Pennsylvania's prison industrial complex.

Bob Lankin has been an activist and a supporter of a wide variety of causes, focusing on the scourge of mass incarceration in the United States. He has been a volunteer at the State Correctional Institution at Phoenix, located in Montgomery County, Pennsylvania, for more than thirty years. He serves as the outside coordinator of a small group of Jewish prisoners there. In addition, Bob serves on the policy committee of the Pennsylvania Prison Society and is a member of the corrections committee of the Pennsylvania Bar Association.

Anti-Judaism Series

10/7's Empirical Insights: Blame, Responsibility, Conspiracy and the Future of Antisemitism, with **Prof. Ayal Feinberg**

Prof. Ayal Feinberg will review new data underscoring changes in antisemitism following the terrorist attack of 10/7. He'll will explore what we know about underlying mechanisms through which 10/7-specific

antisemitism has manifested—blame, responsibility, and conspiracy. Then he'll close with a discussion on how 10/7 is likely to permanently impact antisemitism and alter the identity of the diaspora moving forward.

Formerly Assistant Professor of Political Science at Texas A&M University-Commerce, Ayal Feinberg joined Gratz College in the spring of 2023. As the Director of the Center for Holocaust Studies and Human Rights, he oversees the largest Holocaust and Genocide graduate program in the world. His research has been widely featured in leading journals and media outlets and is frequently utilized by practitioners and policymakers concerned with the insecurity of marginalized groups and the perseverance of the Jewish community. He is an expert in contemporary antisemitism, and among a small group of scholars seeking to better understand the phenomenon through event-count analysis and survey experiments.

On January 28, several of us AJers volunteered at Mitzvah Circle in Norristown. Mitzvah Circle services the needs of families in crisis across all



Philadelphia counties. It started 12 years ago in the garage of its founder, Fran Held, to meet the needs of a neighborhood family in crisis. There was an overwhelming community response, and since then Mitzvah Circle has evolved into an organization that has 215 partner agencies and packed 16,872 care packages in 2022 to families in need. Items include clothing, books, toiletries, diapers, feminine hygiene supplies, incontinence supplies, shoes, coats, socks, and underwear. It is a deeply personalized process where each family is interviewed about the needs of the whole family.

We arrived, received a short orientation, and then set to work, shopping for two families. Each family member had a list of needed items. We each chose a family member and carefully and thoughtfully chose their items. Selections were extremely well organized and well stocked. It was the most joyful shopping I had done in years.

Over the past year we hosted a toiletry drive for Martin Luther King Jr. Day and more recently a winter coat drive. Witnessing the volume and selections, it was wonderful to see how important the contribution process is to Mitzvah Circle success.

I look forward to having AJ participate with Mitzvah Circle through item drives and on-site volunteerism. Change to Yahrzeits Announcements

At Congregation Adath Jeshurun, we have followed the relatively unusual practice of announcing on Shabbat those yahrzeits that occurred the week prior rather than the more common practice of announcing the yahrzeits that will occur in the forthcoming week. Increasingly, we have fielded requests to reverse our practice aligning our congregation with what is the more customary system. There is no halacha on this matter to consult; it is simply a common tradition in congregational life that yahrzeits, the anniversaries of our loved ones' date of death, are announced in some manner.

As noted in the November/December *AJ News*, we are now following the more customary practice. The yahrzeits read on Friday evening and Saturday morning will be those yahrzeits that occur between that Saturday evening and the following Friday morning.






