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Defining Terms from Antisemitism to Zionism

The definition I offered of antisemitism at the beginning of our series on antisemitism was the one I learned at Yad Vashem's course for educators: antisemitism is hating Jews too much.

Genocide would be an extreme example of antisemitism, and it is remains mind-boggling that several

university presidents, including a Jew, was unable to identify such threats as severe enough to run afoul of university free-speech codes.

On the U.S. State Department's website, it provides examples of antisemitism which include:

"Denying the Jewish people their right to self-determination, e.g., by claiming that the existence of a State of Israel is a racist endeavor."

In other words, anti-Zionism is antisemitism.

That claim should not be controversial if we can agree on the definition of Zionism and anti-Zionism. According to all the dictionaries I have ever seen, as well as President Biden, Zionism is defined by the support for the existence of a Jewish state in Zion, i.e., Israel. That's why you can be a Zionist who does not live in Israel; you can be a non-Jewish Zionist; you can be a left-wing Labor Zionist; you can be a right-wing revisionist Zionist; you can even be an Arab Zionist. Zionism has no more to do with supporting the policies of a specific party or government than being an American patriot has to do with aligning yourself with a particular political party.

Since Zionism is about supporting a state for the Jews in Israel, anti-Zionism is about rejecting a state for the Jews in Israel. Whether the anti-Zionist rationale is racism or colonialism, denying the legitimacy of the State of Israel as the Jewish expression of national self-determination is antisemitic. President Biden, at this year's White House Hanukkah party, offered one reason: no Jew would be safe in the world without the State of Israel. Another reason is that denying Jews, and only Jews, a right exercised by all other people, national self-determination, is antisemitic.

There are three more terms that many people seem to misuse. Apartheid is the first term. The term is associated with the minority rule of South African whites over the majority black population. An apartheid system is a racist system that gives the minority population control over the majority.

Israelis and Palestinians are both Semites — this is a national/religious conflict, not a racial one. More importantly, even if you add up all the Palestinians in their three distinct jurisdictions (Israel, Gaza, and the West Bank), they do not constitute a majority from "the River to the Sea." But what really matters is that within Israel, Israeli Arabs have full (albeit imperfect) equality with Jews. They serve in the Army, they attend universities, they are medical doctors, attorneys, judges, journalists, and news broadcasters. There is prejudice, to be sure — but it's prejudice without apartheid.

The Palestinians in the West Bank live under a different legal jurisdiction until final status negotiations can take place. But even in the West Bank, the Israeli presence is usually felt along its borders rather than inside the cities. And as for the 2+ million Gazans, Israel withdrew its troops and legal authority from Gaza in 2005. There is minority rule in Gaza because Hamas is a theocratic dictatorship.

Another canard against Israel is that they are committing genocide. Genocide is a word created by a Jewish refugee from Nazi Europe to describe what the Nazis did to the Jews in the Shoah. It has two components: intention to destroy a people and actions that have led to the death or sterilization (as the Chinese are doing to the Uyghur) of a great number of innocent civilians.

Were Hamas to surrender and the hostages be returned, the Israeli war against Hamas would be over. There would be no more killing of Palestinians. That means Israel has no intention to wipe out the Palestinian people. The Jews in the Warsaw Ghetto couldn't surrender to save their lives—that's why it was considered a genocide. What's occurring to Palestinians in Gaza is horrific. It's war; but it's not a genocide.



As I have reminded many Americans of late, after the surprise bombing of Pearl Harbor by the Japanese, the United States would accept nothing short of unconditional surrender even though it necessitated the carpet-bombing of Tokyo and dropping atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki, costing the lives of 300,000 Japanese. That was *after* the United States placed 120,000 Japanese Americans in internment camps. War is horrific.

The final charge frequently levelled against Israel is that it is a colonial enterprise. Again, a dictionary would help. Colonialism involves a country establishing a colony for the home country's advantage, usually economic and/or military. The United States began as colonies of several European countries. But, you can't colonize your homeland! We started out in the Land of Israel three thousand years ago. That was over one thousand years before the name "Palestine" got attached to our homeland by the Roman colonists who exiled our ancestors. The Romans changed the name, after two unsuccessful Jewish revolts, to sound like our ancient enemies: the Philistines. Syria-Palestina became the name of the Roman Empire's administrative province in the kingdom where King David reigned and King Solomon built the Temple.

People whose primary sympathies lie with the Palestinians are still bound by historical facts and dictionary definitions. Although my primary sympathies lie with Israeli Jews, I am still heart broken by the suffering of so many Palestinians. Our hearts should be big enough to have two breaks. And our hearts can be broken without resorting to the abuse of language or the distortion of history.

In the Cantor's Corner

I was already acutely aware of the relentless occurrences of medical tragedies, natural disasters, and despicable abuses worldwide. It was an unsettling realization that I had no entitlement to complacency or the assumption that the surge in openly anti-Jewish rhetoric and actions would merely subside or dissipate. Although we took action — protests, buttons, letters to representatives — we never fathomed the magnitude of what lay ahead.

In the aftermath of that fateful day, forever etched in Jewish history, my thoughts turned to Purim. Yes, I know that seems odd, but given my hand in the annual shpiel, I started to rethink my plans. We are commanded to mark Purim in a festive way, but it seems to me that we are in a deep albeit vicarious, state of mourning. It seemed unlikely at best, that by Purim this March, neither the military operation would be concluded, nor the fate of all hostages revealed.

I was born in 1963 which, for me, meant that my parents were already adults when flower power of the 60s was taking over the young culture of the United States. Nonetheless, it was the music of that period that influenced so much of my early years. We didn't have to live on a commune or drive a turquoise Volkswagen bus to experience the message of the music that defined the period and lingered long after.

I can feel the emotions build as I'm writing, when I recall that, on day 41 of the aftermath, it dawned on me that we could all use some of the positive and hopeful messages of that period. This will bring a unique shpiel little if any need to parody these songs; they should largely be presented as is. When was the last time you heard "Blowin' in the Wind" or sang "What the World Needs Now"...come on, what comes next? I think most of you know — Love, Sweet Love.

There are many more deserving songs that could possibly be used. This is not necessarily the final list of what we will sing on Purim, simply my initial selections, and the background of these songs I hoped you would find interesting. This is also about giving you ample time to grow your hair longer and alter your bell-bottoms.

"Both Sides Now," by Joni Mitchell. First recorded by Judy Collins, then on Mitchell's album *Clouds*. Mitchell has said that "Both Sides, Now" was inspired by a passage in *Henderson the Rain King*, a 1959 novel by Saul Bellow.

"Turn Turn Turn (To Everything There Is a Season)," by Pete Seeger. Written in 1962 and based on the Book of Kohelet — Ecclesiastes. The Byrds' recording of the song in 1965 made it an international hit.

"I'd Like to Teach the
World to Sing," by Roger
Cook and Roger Greenaway.
This song was originally a
1971 British pop song
titled "True Love and
Apple Pie," sung by Susan
Shirley. You may be more
familiar with the rewritten

version for lyrics were rewritten as a jingle for The Coca-Cola Company when it became "Buy the World a

Coke."The aesthetically appealing ad featured a multicultural collection of teenagers on top of a hill and portrayed a positive message of hope and love.

"Blowin in the Wind," by Bob Dylan (Robert Allen Zimmerman). Written in 1962, it has been described as a protest song and the refrain, "The answer, my friend, is blowin' in the wind" is diversely interpreted. "Blowin' in the wind" might mean the answer is elusive,

but if it is blowin in the wind it is also right in front of one's nose.

"Feelin' Groovy," by Paul Simon. "Feelin' Groovy" was released in 1966 on Simon & Garfunkel's album *Parsley, Sage, Rosemary and Thyme*. In a 1967 *New Yorker* article, "On the Road With Simon & Garfunkel," Simon responds to a question regarding the meaning of this song, "I don't want the listener to think beyond it being a happy song."

"What the World Needs Now," a 1965 pop song of the composing duo Hal David and Burt Bacharach. It was offered first to Dionne Warwick, who initially found it to be too country and preachy and turned it down, though she did record the song and it became a staple of Warwick

"Imagine," by John Lennon. Written in 1971, "Imagine" is widely considered to be his signature song.

"Let the Sunshine In," - This 1967 song is actually a medley from the musical Hair by James Rado and Gerome Ragni (lyrics), and Galt MacDermot (music), listed as "Aquarius/Let the Sunshine In," "The Age of Aquarius," or "Let the Sunshine In." It was a big hit for the singing group, The Fifth Dimension.




John Lennon and Paul McCartney. This song was on the Beatles 1967 album, *Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band*. Joe Cocker made it a hit in 1968 and became an anthem for the Woodstock era.

"This Land Is Your Land," by Woody Guthrie. Guthrie wrote the lyrics in 1940 as a counterpoint to "God Bless America." The melody is taken from "When the World's on Fire," by the Carter Family.

"Everyday People," by Sly Stone (Sylvester Stewart). Sly & The Family Stone recorded this song in 1968. The group was one of the earlier integrated bands in rock history. Sly described this song as a plea for peace and equality between differing races and social groups, a major theme and focus for the band.

A Tribute to the Late Hazzan Charles Davidson, of Blessed Memory

In the law, we speak of someone very special as "sui generis" — Latin for "one of a kind" — and that description certainly fits our late Hazzan Charles Davidson. What made Charles so unique?

His resonant baritone voice elegantly and musically phrased whatever he sang. We marveled that his voice grew stronger as the day grew longer, particularly on Yom Kippur.

He had an enduring personality. When he smiled from the *bima*, many in the congregation firmly believed that he was looking directly at them.

He worked faithfully side by side with two very strong willed Rabbis — Ya'akov Rosenberg, of blessed memory, and Seymour Rosenbloom—and managed to make it look easy.

His davening on Shabbat and Yom Tov raised many of us to spiritual heights not ordinarily achieved. He succeeded in skillfully blending traditional *nusach* with creative musical innovation. Who can resist toe-tapping or swaying while singing Hayom or *El Norah Alilah*?

My five children, who were youngsters when Charles came to AJ, found it very difficult to daven in the various shuls to which they belonged since so much of the *nusach* they were familiar with is unique to AJ, and so much more musical than the Eastern European folk tunes one usually hears. They told me that their rabbis and cantors all knew of Charles and his music and were in awe that the kids grew up with him. Every once in a while, their cantor would introduce a new melody to their congregation, and the kids immediately recognized it as one of Charles' from their days at AJ. We don't fully appreciate the impact that Charles made on cantorial music outside of our congregation.

He spent countless hours training youth and adult choirs, leaders of daily minyanim, and Torah leaders. Our Torah Reading Academy that Charles created was the envy of many other congregations. Just think of how many lives Charles touched and impacted in helping youngsters and adults learn Torah and Haftarah *trop* for chanting

on Shabbat and Yom Tov, or helping them to experience the thrill and joy of singing in harmony with others.

Charles created a Hebraic Arts Series in which various soloists and chamber music groups performed for the benefit of the congregation and the community at large. He established a string quartet competition funded by the Braemer Foundation, awarding a prize for a composition based upon Hebraic themes, selected by a jury of eminent composers. The winning quartet compositions were performed by members of the Philadelphia Orchestra and myself as part of the series.

Charles originated a number of productions and concerts at AJ over the years, many of which featured his compositions—the Hasidic Service, the orchestration for the 125th anniversary and, of course, "I Never Saw Another Butterfly," which has been performed by orchestras and choirs all over the world.

Continuity and renewal are catch-phrases most frequently bandied about these days attempting to renew, preserve, and pass on our traditions to future generations. To accomplish this, we need Jews to have a feeling of *ruach*, spirituality, and a sense of community when they participate in prayer.

Charles Davidson, by the force of his personality and his integrity as a gifted musician and leader, inspired us, our children, and grandchildren, to feel a sense of collective spiritual contagion, and a feeling of renewed community when we joined together in joyous song.

He made us more fully appreciative of the heritage which is ours, and helped us insure that it will not be lost for future generations.

Charles, you will be sorely missed by all.

As I hear more about Rav Shai's exploration of "Awe," I started thinking of things that make me awe-struck. As I commute to work each morning, I have observed many natural beauties including rainbows, double rainbows, and magnificent sunrises. I have also witnessed fascinating man-made inventions like bridges, high rises, and airplanes. I try not to miss a single opportunity to be inspired by the wonders around me. However, my greatest daily joy is seeing the world through the eyes of a child.

Children have the innate ability to learn from everyone and everything. As little ones hit each developmental milestone, their world opens a little bit more. I observe these milestones regularly and never grow tired of seeing an infant figure out the best way to cross the classroom or the child who has been working for weeks on writing their first name finally achieve success. Watching a classmate helping their friend finish a project still warms my heart.

It is important in these challenging times that we practice self-help. What better way to do this than by following the lead of our early childhood students. Here are a few lessons I learn every day from them:

In keeping with our Adult Education series, November 14 was truly *awe*-inspiring.

Tens of thousands of people joined the rally in Washington, DC, to voice solidarity with Israel, fight against Hamas, and condemn antisemitism. There were Jews from Orthodox to Reform; there were young people and elderly; there were Christians, Korean, and Mexican people, all supporting Israel. I met people who spent 18 hours on a bus to attend the event. There were so many people, including many students who came from Florida, Texas, South Carolina, and elsewhere. The unity was amazing.

My husband Art and I could not get close to the stage so we watched and listened to the speakers on one of many large screens on the National Mall. Seeing the Capitol Building at one end and the Washington Monument at the other end, along with listening to speakers from both the Republican and Democratic parties, made me feel proud to be an American. For the first time since October 7, I felt safe and comforted.

We are constantly hearing all the negative stories about antisemitism but rarely do we hear about the people who do care and support us.

My first concern is the release of the hostages. I think about them and their loved ones all the time and pray for them and for their physical and mental health. I then think about this world and how we will be leaving it to our children and grandchildren.

I think back to the many different people I met at the National Mall and I feel there is hope.

AJ Adult Education Committee

It's been an extremely busy fall and early winter for Adult Education at AJ, and we've begun a number of the programs that correspond to our major themes for the current year.

One of our themes is **anti-Judaism and antisemitism**. Our exploration of the world's oldest, and ongoing, hatred began in October and November, respectively, with Rav Shai's sessions on the origins of anti-Judaism in the New Testament, and its continued expression and amplification in the Middle Ages culminating in the Protestant Reformation. Class participants had these things to say about these sessions: "Stunning teaching," "Both sessions were terrific," and "Rav Shai presented material I thought I knew with clarity and insight. Turns out I didn't really know much!"

Rav Shai will complete his series with an examination of "Jews and the Third Reich" on February 22, and for the remainder of the spring we've invited a number of other scholars to offer their own insights on the topic. These include, in April, Dr. Ayal Feinberg, Director of the Center for Holocaust Studies and Human Rights at Gratz College, and for our Scholar in Residence weekend in late March, Dr. Philip Cunningham, Professor of Theology and Director of Jewish-Catholic Relations at St. Joseph's University, LaSalle University Professor Maureen O'Connell, and Dr. Susannah Heschel, Eli M. Black Distinguished Professor of Jewish Studies at Dartmouth College.

In response to requests over the years from many AJers for classes designed to introduce and reinforce Hebrew skills, in early December we held our first-ever **Hebrew Jumpstart** for adults. Jerusalem-based Hebrew Educator **Rabbi Peretz Rodman** taught a Level 1 session on Zoom from Israel for those wishing an introduction to the Aleph-Bet and Hebrew decoding. **Rav Shai**'s Level 2 class focused on translation, grammar, and comprehension. Those who took Rabbi Rodman's class considered it "excellent," and comments from Rav Shai's Level 2 group included "mentally stimulating," and "I enjoyed it immensely and learned a lot."

For Level 1 students, **Rav Hazzan Glantz** will follow up in **January** with a series of supplemental sessions to advance and solidify the concepts learned in the initial class. And for those who were not able to make the sessions in December, we'll hold another **Hebrew Jumpstart** starting on **Sunday, February 4**. This time, we'll present the material over three

two-hour sessions for each level, continuing on February 11 and 18. To register, go to https://www.adathjeshurun.info/form/hebrew-jumpstart.html or scan the QR code.

In mid-December we began to explore our **four-part series on Awe** with a visit to the Holodec virtual reality arcade in Fishtown. Meant to offer a virtual look at the topic in the natural world — and beyond! — adults and teens from AJ's Kikar program got together for a terrific few hours. Everyone had a blast!

Subsequent sessions on the theme will include **Musical Awe**, with AJ's **Jamie Clark**, a professional cellist; **Artistic Awe** at the **Rodin Museum** in Philadelphia with AJ's Director of Programming and New Initiatives **Beth Shapiro**; and **Literary Awe** with **Rav Shai**. Keep an eye out for more information about dates, times, and registration.

Finally, the theme of **Crimes and Consequences** will be explored from a variety of perspectives. Two **Shabbat lunch and learn sessions**, on **March 9**, and **April 6**, respectively, will feature Al's **Marissa Boyers Bluestine**, focusing on her longstanding commitment to Philadelphia's Innocence Project, and an examination of the topic of mass incarceration with expert and activist **Robert Lankin**.

But we'll begin our theme of Crimes and Consequences in conjunction with teens in the Kikar program on Sunday, January 21, from 10:00 AM to 1:00 PM, with a tour of Eastern State Penitentiary (ESP), an iconic Philadelphia landmark. Built in 1827, in operation for 144 years and once considered the most famous prison in the world, ESP now

stands in ruin but offers a haunting perspective on techniques of incarceration and rehabilitation that were considered progressive in its time. Remarkably, ESP houses a chapel once used for services for Jewish inmates. All of this and more can be appreciated in person and promises to be a fascinating experience. Change to Yahrzeits Announcements

At Congregation Adath Jeshurun, we have followed the relatively unusual practice of announcing on Shabbat those yahrzeits that occurred the week prior rather than the more common practice of announcing the yahrzeits that will occur in the forthcoming week. Increasingly, we have fielded requests to reverse our practice aligning our congregation with what is the more customary system. There is no halacha on this matter to consult; it is simply a common tradition in congregational life that yahrzeits, the anniversaries of our loved ones' date of death, are announced in some manner.

As noted in the November/December AJ News, we are now following the more customary practice. The yahrzeits read on Friday evening and Saturday morning will be those yahrzeits that occur between that Saturday evening and the following Friday morning.




