It has come to my attention that people really enjoy the holiday of Purim. They get silly and put on costumes and even consume some tasty adult drinks. But isn't there a deeper essence to this holiday? It can't really all just be about dressing up and getting a little tipsy? I do enjoy that myself, but I want to understand this holiday on a deeper level.

Dear Curious Gal,

Thank you so much for writing. Purim is such a fun holiday — one of my favorites, in fact. But part of my love for the holiday stems from the deep and rich mitzvot that are highlighted on this day. Don't get me wrong — Mojitos can be fun — but so can all of these other wonderful aspects of the holiday that have pretty deep meaning.

- 1. Hearing the Megillah We are commanded to hear the Megillah, which is that story of how Esther and Mordechai were super-courageous and triumphed over the wicked Haman. We learn from this that there are times in life when we are all scared. Really, really scared. Bravery means pushing through anyway, despite the fear. We also learn that the *good* can (and must) win! And we work to make sure that happens in our time.
- **2. Seudah** On Purim afternoon, we are instructed to enjoy a big meal with our friends. This is a great way of celebrating and building community.
- **3. Mishloach Manot** We send gifts to friends. These gifts are in the form of food, and are meant to add to our seudah and our enjoyment of the day. It's ideal to send these gifts through another person thus enabling more people to meet and talk and engage. (The messenger can have a conversation as she delivers the gift.) We are instructed to give gifts to at least one person; many have the custom of giving many more.

4. Matanot L'evyonim — Gifts to the poor. We give money or food to people who are needy on Purim. These gifts are meant to be used to make each person's Purim seudah brighter. The mitzvah of bringing gifts to the poor enables every single person to enjoy a Purim meal. In this way, on Purim we experience the society we all dream of — where everybody has food to eat. We are instructed to give gifts to at least two people in need on Purim day. And while at other times of the year it is thought of as best to give anonymously, on Purim we are ideally supposed to put our gifts directly into the needy person's hand. Why? So that we really see them. Although we wear costumes, we don't hide our faces or mask the fragility and imperfections that exist in our society. We see each person, knowing that we are all deserving of joy and Purim celebration.

So there you have it! Thanks so much for inquiring, "Curious Gal." Looking forward to your next question.

Connecting Purim and Pesah

So, as always, there are many things that are happening at AJ these days and much that we can point to and be proud of. I am remiss that my time at AJ generally means preparing for, attending and conducting meetings instead of being a part of AJ's ruach. But for now, that's the way things are.

This article gives me the opportunity to tap into my AJ spiritual side as opposed to my AJ "meeting" side. This edition of the AJ News is focused on Purim and Pesah, so I wonder if there are any connections between the two holidays?

On the face of it, it doesn't seem that the holidays have a lot in common. For starters, one is in the Torah and one is not. One may be termed by some as a modern-day Jewish April Fools' Day and the other is one of the most meaningful, inspirational holidays in our calendar. But there must be a common thread that we can find. Our traditions and rabbis have always been able to find the link between two seemingly different things, right?

Imagine the Jewish holidays as a circle beginning with Pesah in Nisan and ending with Purim in Adar. If the holidays were in a straight line, Purim and Pesach would be the furthest from each other. But in a circle they are next to each other. According to my

sources, Rashi writes that the people of Israel experienced days of miracles on Purim and Pesah. And perhaps in the circle of the holidays, it is appropriate that we finish and start the calendar with two of our great redemption stories.

While the upcoming Pesah seems far removed from the exodus that occurred thousands of years ago, the miracles of the exodus strengthened our relationship with God. This special relationship is continued throughout time and throughout the year until we come around to celebrating Purim.

A properly celebrated Purim rejuvenates us and guides us to a renewed acceptance of Torah. And our relationship with Torah inspires us to be the best people that we can be. In short, the Torah is always the link.

My Thanks to All

I want to express my deep-most gratitude to everyone who was able to attend the Torah Fund brunch on January 7, that truly honored me. I want to share with you my remarks that day and a few pictures, courtesy of **Baruch Schwartz**.

I so appreciate what you have all done today simply by coming out in this balmy weather. It is a beautiful honor to be recognized by the AJWA Sisterhood and to see you all on this splendid morning.

I do wish to acknowledge the hours of preparation, the cooks and the planners — volunteers who made today happen. As I write this, I am hopeful that **Violet** and **Robin** have named everyone individually, so please, accept my collective thank you.

There are far too many people to thank really, and I am sure I will leave someone out but, nothing ventured, nothing gained, so, here goes. I will speak first of those who are no longer with us physically, but whose absence I feel particularly at this time.

First, my parents, of blessed memory, **Everett and Helene Glantz** z"l. My father, who taught me never to make anyone a "silent singer" from his own elementary school experience, and my mother, who loved to harmonize Birkat Hamazon and always sat right up front at AJ, oftentimes with **Helen Fox** z"l and her friends.

It is natural for me to think of the teachers, professors, classmates, hazzanim and rabbis who have taught and influenced me over the years. From childhood to the present they continue to teach me valuable lessons. I'll mention but a few whose examples ring for me often in my daily life and in my service here at Congregation Adath Jeshurun.

Rabbi Stanley Kessler and Cantor Moshe Lanxner from Beth El Temple in West Hartford where I was raised and the staffs of the Camps Ramah I attended. My adoptive family in Mevaserrett Tzion, the Maimons and Martzianos, whose generosity and warmth literally changed the direction of my life. Rabbi Alfredo Winter, Cantor Larry Vieder z"I, Rabbi Efry Spectre z"I, and Rabbi Daniel Nevins, all of whom worked with me in former congregations I served in Port Chester, NY and in Farmington Hills, MI.

And right here at AJ. **Rabbi Seymour Rosenbloom**, **Hazzan Charles Davidson** and **Rabbi Rachel Kobrin**; your presence is much appreciated today. Rabbi Rosenbloom, whose visit with **Cindy** to Farmington Hills in 2002, for a mutual friend's bat mitzvah celebration, kicked off a search for a congregation where I could continue to grow

musically and spiritually. He particularly helped me appreciate the uniqueness of AJ and adapt my vocal proclivities to the style that Uncle Charles assured me — it will seem — I quote, "like another planet."

Uncle Cantor is one of the few people who calls me Howie and I seem to love the nickname the older I get. Charles is a Cantor's cantor, a giant among colleagues with a soft and understated presence I so admire. He is my go-to and friend. At this time, the expression, "I succeeded so and so," fits far more than "I replaced so and so," because truly, if I succeed, it is because of him.

And I owe a debt to Rabbi Kobrin, who has celebrated my successes, sung my praises, and accepted my errors and limitations. She has given me credit well beyond merit on numerous occasions. I appreciate her passion and commitment to heartfelt values and I admire the steadfastness she has for her priorities as a rabbi, as a teacher and as a community leader.

For me to have **Alisa Pomerantz-Boro** here to speak and sing today is also a great honor. She is both my friend and colleague from across the river and Alisa is a trailblazer for what a "Hazzan" means in this era of our modern synagogue.

Robert Friedman and the **entire staff of AJ** who make things tick here are the unsung heros for so much that happens. Robert helps me to laugh at times of frustration and he has a way of saying funny things that take a minute to understand. Like when he speaks about two people who actually have enmity for one another, he'll say:

There isn't a thing he wouldn't do for her And there isn't a thing she wouldn't do for him Therefore, they do nothing for each other!

And that, (you'll see why) brings me to my dear friend and colleague **Hazzan Eric Wasser**. What are the chances that two hazzanim who are also mohalim, would both be able to have time on a Sunday morning? He is an ear upon whom I rely — he embodies for me the lines from a treasured song of Randy Newman:

You've got a friend in me You've got troubles, and I've got 'em too There isn't anything I wouldn't do for you

My friends from West Hartford who made the trek despite a storm that dumped on Connecticut far more than it did here in Philly. **Lewis and Debby Cohen** and their daughter **Deena**, truly bless me with their presence here today, but really with these past 30 years of friendship. For us, they are friends that are more like family. Dayna knew them both before I did, and I love and treasure them all even though Lewis got to take Dayna to her high school prom! And look at what they arranged — to quote Paul Simon, I'm "on the cover of Newsweek!"

My mother-in-law, **Elaine Nepiarsky**, had been looking forward to this moment and wanted so to be with us here today. It's not being able to say anything about any of it because you're terrified of being shunned, bullied, attacked, or worse.

It's never truly being at home because it feels like you're renting your own skin.

It's constantly being a work in progress.

It's catching a glimpse of your reflection in the mirror and saying "...oh...so that's what I look like."

The disconnect between my brain and my body is suffocating, and yes, sometimes it can feel like I'm trapped.

Seeing myself naked produces a sense of distance rather than a sense of pride.

I feel like I exist outside my own body.

I'm not who I am in my own mind.

I'm not who I am on the outside.

and I will never be who I am on the inside.

That's the definition of dysphoria.

From Despair to Hope — A Personal Perspective

This past year has been a very difficult year for all of us at AJ. There were many losses in the congregation. A number of these people were such a big part of AJ. I want to focus on three individuals who touched me deeply.

In January of last year we lost Debra Strauss. Deb was more than just a past president of AJ. I would suggest that she was the "face" of AJ. Always a warm welcome, always a smile with grace and elegance, and always made you feel at home. Deb was the first to invite a visitor for a Yom Tov meal and one of the first to greet a stranger visiting AJ.

Deb did so many things behind the scenes. When I started as Executive Director, Deb could tell I was a little overwhelmed. She would call me and say, "Robert, I will take care of such and such. You don't have to do a thing." She was right. She would take care of it right down to the last detail. I learned so much from Deb. I just hope I am a better person because of her.

Only a few months later, Steve Sussman passed away. He, too, was a past president of AJ. Not too many lay people were as knowledgeable as Steve when it came to Judaism. I still remember Rosh HaShanah 2008, when Rabbi Rosenbloom was not able to conduct services due to a detached retina. Steve stepped right in and he, along with Hazzan Glantz, led a beautiful and meaningful Yom Tov service. He and his wife, Sima, taught at AJ even before they were married. What great role models. Even at the time of Steve's death, he and Sima were chairs of AJ's Adult Education Committee. They brought many thought-provoking speakers to AJ. Adult Ed flourished under their leadership.

Steve, too, was a mentor for me. When I was hired as executive director, Steve was the current president. Steve and I spoke every day on the phone, most days more than once. We discussed many different issues. We had our share of disagreements as to how things should be done,

(not a bad thing), but either he or I would explain why we wanted things done in a certain way. Sometimes I could persuade Steve that my approach would work better, but most times Steve persuaded me. That was OK. He taught me his logic and I try to solve things using his wisdom. I believe I could not have continued in this job if it weren't for Steve being my first boss. Like Deb, Steve cared deeply for AJ.

Finally, on the last day of 2017, we lost Leslie (Levin) Weiss and her husband Mitch, and their children, Hannah and Ari, in a tragic plane accident. Although no longer a member of AJ, Leslie grew up here. When

Leslie was 10, she became a Torah reader and I was her teacher. I didn't know then what a great Torah reader Leslie would become, but it didn't take me long to find out. AJ has had many great Torah readers throughout the years at AJ but Leslie was one of the best. She was dedicated to AJ, often getting up early to read Torah on a Monday or Thursday morning and, of course, when she got older, on Shabbat mornings as well. She succeeded Meryl Sussman as Head Gabbai when she was in high school and she handled the job with ease.

Leslie was very committed to Torah and we as a congregation were lucky to have seen her talents. I think about the early days of the Torah Club (now

the Bernstein Torah Reading Academy) and I realize how much it meant to us. For many, this was the first vehicle into Jewish communal life. In fact, Leslie was one of those people. Leslie moved to Florida over 20 years ago with Mitch and she had been very active in the Jewish community since. I know that Leslie and Mitch instilled that love for Judaism in their children as well. I will miss Leslie's infectious laugh and my heart goes out to her parents, Sandy and Ed.

Debra Strauss, Stephen Sussman and Leslie Weiss all died way too early. But I feel extremely lucky to have known and cared about them. I believe any of us that have known any or all of them are better people for having them in our lives. I know AJ is richer for having them. May their memory be an inspiration to all of us.

Al Pi Darcho

February is Jewish Disabilities Inclusion and Awareness Month. In honor of this month I thought I might share some of the ways we try to teach each child "al pi darcho:" according to his/her needs. As part of our JQuest B'Yachad registration process we ask parents to identify learning styles of their children (auditory, visual, or kinesthetic), as well as how they do or do not need support socially when working in groups or in new settings. Through this information teachers are able to construct groups for projects and ask students specific ways to participate based on their strengths. Teachers are able to see how their students learn best and try to tailor their lessons in this way. In JQuest we try to support all of our students, regardless of diagnosis or disability.

We do recognize that some students need more. We know that fair is not equal and our job is to give each child what they need. For students who do need special supports, we are lucky to have our site supervisor Holli Goldenberg who reaches out to parents to check in with how we can best support children in our setting. We have special needs professionals and teens trained by the Jewish Learning Venture who provide one-on-one and itinerant

support for students. We also group all students in small Hebrew learning settings so that they can get the individual attention they need without feeling social pressures. This year we have also tried to introduce behavior reward systems and fidget toys, trying to be more proactive to help our students learn best.

When I was a child, most of the kids in our religious school looked the same. For students who needed accommodations or extra help, there were not great alternatives, so the synagogue space was often a place where we did not see children with disabilities. I am so grateful to work in a setting where inclusion is a priority and part of our core mindset. If you are reading this and think we can be doing more to include a child or a family who needs support, I hope that you will reach out to me. As an educator I believe strongly that it is our religious obligation to support and care for each child and try to bring as many children as possible into our building in a way that they feel comfortable and supported so that they can learn and grow and thrive Jewishly. So here's to Jewish Disabilities Inclusion and Awareness Month!





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
