Gentiles and Rabbinic Standards

One might be a fluke, but two is a trend.



This month, the Hebrew College Rabbinical School announced that it no longer requires its rabbinical students to have Jewish partners. The Reconstructionist Rabbinical College blazed that trail several years ago. It's really hard for me

to imagine wanting to join a shul in which the rabbi is intermarried. What about you?

Every once in a while, people ask me if I am willing to officiate at an intermarriage. I explain that were I to do so, the Rabbinical Assembly would toss me out, as they have to others who have violated that standard. Sometimes the questioners drop it, other times they forge ahead, sensing lack of full disclosure. "What if the Rabbinical Assembly were to change its rule?"

I don't think intermarriages are good for the Jews. Harold Schulweis used to say that most interfaith marriages today are really interfaithless. That's where I can be helpful. For gentiles who think of Judaism as a religion akin to Christianity and who consider themselves to be "Godless," I can show them how comfortable Judaism might be for them. I can share with them traditional models of Jewish thought that might open up a pathway for conversion. I'm actually running such a class, beginning right after Passover, called "Exploring Judaism."

This spring, I will be officiating at a baby naming for a baby who is not halakhically Jewish. The gentile mother was a student of mine at Vanderbilt twenty years ago in an Introduction to Judaism course. She ended up marrying a Jew from Philly, though they still live in Nashville. When she asked if I would consider officiating, I was honored, and I immediately responded in the affirmative.

The Reform and Reconstructionist movements long ago accepted patrilineal descent — the baby is Jewish even if only the father is Jewish. (It was good enough for Moses'

boys!) For now, this family belongs to a Reform Temple in Nashville. Should the baby boy one day decide to formally convert in order to be recognized as Jewish by all Jews, the procedure is quick and easy. I know because I've done it.

I was my parents' third boy, and they had me circumcised in the hospital and not on the eighth day. When I found out, I had a very quick "drop of blood" ritual and I was good to eat the middle matza at the seder. (Really!) Our baby boy in question will also need a *mikveh* not a high hurdle.

If someone wants a Jewish/Hebrew name, send them my way! I couldn't care less if they're halakhically Jewish because I believe it's something that I can do that's good for the Jews. This baby will have a cool name—Avishai Yosef—and a life-long, positive association with me. G!d willing, when he comes to me in 25 years and asks me to officiate at his wedding, I'll tell him to drop his drawers and go skinny-dipping because I don't officiate at intermarriages.

Avishai Yosef, *boychik*, you want to live a full Jewish life? You won't need to sit in classes, you won't need to pass a test—you've been living as a full Jew all your life. (That's my assumption for the purposes of this article, anyway.) There's just this Jewish ritual that is required to seal the deal. There are so many Jewish rituals—that's part of what we love about Judaism. Embrace it. Let's turn it in to a *simcha*.

Since I've been at AJ, we've had a b' mitzvah boy who endured the ritual just before his b' mitzvah because he couldn't have an aliyah at AJ without it! And I'm currently guiding a patrilineal Jewess to her mikveh before her chuppah. We're using the opportunity to do some learning and add to the simcha.

Jewish continuity keeps me up at night. I don't think letting rabbinical students have gentile partners, or slashing academic requirements for rabbinical students (as Ziegler has recently done), is good for the Jews. I am often a proponent of loosening the yoke of *halakhah*. But if you lose the yoke altogether, what's left?



What's on the Horizon? Or Should I Ask, on the Verizon?

Jewish music encompasses a wide range of musical styles and traditions from various regions and time periods, making it difficult to define in a concise manner. The music reflects the cultural and historical experiences of Jewish communities, from the Middle East to Europe to America. It includes liturgical music from the synagogue, *Ta'amei HaMikra*, the trope symbols used to chant our ancient texts. But it was the cause of freeing Soviet Jews that took over their hearts and their minds. Besides traveling to the Soviet Union several times, they become leaders in the local and national movements. They each became co-chair-persons of Philadelphia's Soviet Jewry Council. Bernie became the national leader of the national committee that briefed visitors to refusniks in the USSR. Lana became the co-chairperson for Philadelphia's March on Washington in 1987.



These activities led them to become involved in the Jewish Federation of Greater Philadelphia. Bernie has served on the Allocations, Community Outreach, Fund Raising and Israel committees. He served as co-chairperson of the Partnership 2000 Committee, which linked Philadelphia to Netivot, Israel. Lana became President of the Women's Leadership Board and then a vice president of the JFGP. She also co-chaired Federation's Israel 50 Committee. Professionally, Bernie has been active in organized dentistry. He served as President of the PA Dental Association; and Chairman of the Board for Health Link, a volunteer-driven free dental clinic. He is currently an Attendant Dentist at Abington Hospital's Dental Residency Program and is a member of the Board of Visitors at Temple University's Kornberg School of Dentistry. Lana has been an elementary school teacher, as well as a Publisher's Representative for The Wright Group Publishing Company. She is a long-time member of the JFCS Board and was a vice president of HIAS. She is currently a member of Women of Vision.

In 1973, the Dishlers joined Congregation Adath Jeshurun and found a spiritual home. Bernie was a co-chairperson of several search committees, including for Hazzan Glantz and Rav Shai. He became a vice president and now is the Chairman of the Board of Trustees. Lana was also a vice president of the Congregation. KNOW EVERYONE BY THESE PRESENTS: That I, the undersigned, do hereby make, constitute and appoint Rav Shai Cherry (hereafter, Rav Shai), my true and lawful attorney to act in my place and stead, for me and in my name and in my behalf to sell all <u>H</u>AMETZ owned and possessed by me (knowingly or unknowingly) as stated in the TORAH and defined and interpreted by the SAGES OF ISRAEL (e.g., <u>H</u>AMETZ that tends to harden and to adhere to a surface of inside of pans, pots, or other cooking or eating utensils, of whatsoever nature, and all kinds of live animals that have been eating <u>H</u>AMETZ or mixtures thereof, and to lease all places wherein the aforementioned <u>H</u>AMETZ owned or possessed by me may be found), especially in the premises located at the following address(es): [PLEASE WRITE OUT]

This authorization includes the sale of any and all <u>H</u>AMETZ that is in my possession on the morning of April 5 of this year at the time of sale, and transit goods that may be delivered to me during the period of April 5 to April 12 of this year, whether owned by me wholly or in part, or through shares of stock in corporations which own or deal in <u>H</u>AMETZ. All the aforesaid <u>H</u>AMETZ is to be sold to a non-Jew of Rav Shai's choosing, at any time during the time legally allotted for the sale of <u>H</u>AMETZ. The buyer has free access to the <u>H</u>AMETZ acquired by him. The place where the <u>H</u>AMETZ is located may be rented to the buyer for the period from 10:00 AM, April 5 to April 12, 2023 after sunset, and the rabbi is authorized to act as the agent for such rental.

The exact assessment of quantity and value will take place at any time agreed upon between Rav Shai and the purchaser, even after the Passover holiday. The buyer's deposit is to be paid to Rav Shai with the balance due on April 12, 2023. Should the buyer not remit the balance of the purchase price by sunset on April 12, the sale will be deemed null and void.

RAV SHAI CHERRY has the full power and authority to assign or appoint a substitute or substitutes to act in his place and stead with all the same powers and authority that I have invested in him, and I do hereby ratify and confirm all that my said attorney, or his substitute or substitutes, shall lawfully do or cause to be done by virtue of these presents.

From Desert to Oasis: Optimizing Water Conservation in Israel Sunday, March 12, at 12:00 PM (via Zoom)

Join Adath Jeshurun's L'olam Committee to understand how Israeli water innovation overcame water scarcity and has led to water abundance. This program will be presented by Dr. Clive Lipchin of the Arava Institute, live from Israel via Zoom.

Clive serves as the director of the Arava Institute for Environmental Studies' Center for Transboundary Water Management where he oversees research and development projects, workshops, and conferences that focus on transboundary water and environmental problems facing Israel, Jordan, and the Palestinian Authority. His specialty is in water resources management and policy. Clive has conducted research for a number of international water agencies such as the World Bank, EU, UNDP, and USAID and has been involved most recently with the European Union's Water Initiative project for the Mediterranean region and the USAID Conflict Management and Mitigation (CMM) program and the Middle East Regional Cooperation (MERC) program. Clive, a native from South Africa has been living in Israel for over twenty years. He received a BSc degree in zoology at the University of Witwatersrand, South Africa; a BSc Honors in wildlife management from the University of Pretoria, South Africa; an MSc in desert ecology from the Ben Gurion University of the Negev, Israel; and a PhD in resource ecology management from the School of Natural Resources and Environment, University of Michigan.

TTF Watershed Partnership Receives Growing Greener Grant to Improve Stormwater Management at AJ

On January 20, 2023, Tookany/Tacony-Frankford Watershed



Partnership, Inc. (TTF) announced it was awarded a \$260,788 Growing Greener (GG) grant from the Pennsylvania Department

of Environmental Protection (PA DEP) for a stormwater retrofit project at AJ. This watershed improvement project is one of ten Growing Greener projects in the Southeast Region that were awarded a total of \$2,119,504 to aid in protecting waterways and watersheds.

The Congregation's campus slopes toward Leech's Run, a Tookany Creek tributary, which flows through the property's eastern edge at the end of the parking lot. Through the Growing Greener grant, TTF will implement a set of features around the building, including the retrofit of an inlet in the parking lot to include a bioretention parking island, impervious reduction, subsurface storage, and a rain garden.

This Growing Greener project is being implemented in partnership with Cerulean Environmental and Grist Engineering consultants, both small business enterprises in the greater Philadelphia area. Susan Harris, Principal Owner of Cerulean and TTF Project Manager, will lead implementation.

Stormwater runoff is the primary source of water pollution in Southeastern Pennsylvania. TTF's retrofit at AJ will reduce runoff volume, decrease infiltration, improve water quality, and assist with future flood prevention.

"We're excited to be working with Congregation Adath Jeshurun, a new partner, to protect our shared waterways through this Growing Greener grant. Every project provides an opportunity to manage more runoff to benefit our waterways and educate the community about the possibilities of nature-based solutions. It is wonderful that AJ is joining the local faith leaders who are already partners in stewarding our Earth," said Julie Slavet, Executive Director of Tookany/Tacony-Frankford Watershed Partnership.

Stormwater runoff is the primary source of water pollution in Southeastern Pennsylvania. TTF's retrofit at AJ will reduce runoff volume, decrease infiltration, improve water quality, and assist with future flood prevention. While the project will reduce stormwater infiltration into the AJ Early Learning Center, it will also filter and treat the water before it flows into Leech's Run, ensuring that cleaner water flows into Tookany Creek.

"In 2021, Congregation Adath Jeshurun began a journey toward more sustainable practices for our building, operations, and personal behaviors. We assembled a group called *Lolam* (meaning "forever" and "for the world" in Hebrew). We signed up with Hazon: The Jewish Lab for Sustainability to qualify for the Hazon Seal of Sustainability, which we were awarded in 2022 for our implementation of sustainability and climate-centered projects in our community that will lead to a more healthful, equitable, and sustainable world for all," stated Rav Shai Cherry, Rabbi of Congregation Adath Jeshurun.

The proposed features around the Congregation's building will mitigate stormwater runoff in addition to representing a high-visibility project with community participation that can be replicated throughout the region.

"We completed an LED lighting upgrade, qualified our Early Learning Center as an Eco Healthy Endorsement by the Children's Environmental Health Network, planted a

pollinator garden, and re-activated our recycling. L'olam has sponsored educational programs for climate change science, the purchase of renewable energy, and water conservation in Israel. Rav Cherry said, "AJ is excited about this project because it will reduce the infiltration of water into the lower level of our building, eliminating the potential for mold and structural damage. Managing the volume of stormwater from our property will reduce erosion along Leach's Run, and contribute to the overall health of the Tookany/ Tacony-Frankford Watershed."

TTF connects watershed residents to their creeks. Through hands-on education, stewardship, restoration, and advo-

AJ Adult Education Committee

It's been a busy and successful 2023 for AJ Adult Ed so far. In January, we hosted author and scholar Kathleen Balgley on Zoom for readings from and discussion about her deeply moving memoir, *Letters to My Father: Excavating a Jewish Identity in Poland and Belarus*. The program was attended by nearly fifty AJers, and the feedback from our survey of participants was exuberant:

- "The quality of the presentation and the speaker herself were outstanding."
- "Kathleen Balgley's personal journey of Jewish discovery, her profoundly moving and beautifully written book, and her generous manner and evocative narrative style during the program made the latter one of the finest that the AJ Adult Education Committee has yet organized."

This was followed shortly thereafter by Rav Shai's first class of the year, "Prayer: For Those Who Don't Know How to Pray and For Those Who Pray but Don't Know Why." Like the Balgley program, the class, held on three consecutive Sunday mornings, generated considerable acclaim among participants:

- "The class could have been twice as long it was wonderful."
- "Rav Shai's multi-layered deep dive into prayer, from historic, *halakhic*, spiritual, and personal perspectives, was profoundly absorbing. His background as a Judaic scholar was on full display."

The month of March will offer AJers a smorgasbord of programs by various committees and constituent groups, including some important ones from Adult Ed. Continuing our year-long theme of the "Year of the Woman in Judaism," our annual **Scholarin-Residence weekend**, revived last year after a long hiatus, will be held on **March 17 through 19** and will feature master educator **Judy Klitsner**. Klitsner is senior lecturer on



Bible study at the Pardes Institute for Jewish Studies in Jerusalem and has lectured extensively throughout the world at universities and synagogues. An author of several books, including *Subversive Sequels in the Bible: How Biblical Stories Mine and Undermine Each Other*, she lends her accessible and engaging interactive style of presentation to an exploration of the "vibrant conversations" that take place between the Bible's many parallel stories. Throughout the weekend, including sessions on Friday evening with dinner after services, Saturday lunch and afternoon, and Sunday morning brunch, Ms. Klitsner's topics will include: "The Dueling Stories of Noah and Jonah: How Similar Stories Say Opposite Things About Human Transformation," "Brothers Crying Out from the Ground: The Biblical Origins of Our Divided Society," and "The Patriarch and the Priest: Why Do Jewish Leaders Have Non-Jewish Mentors?" (You can find more detailed information on page 11.)

On **Wednesday, March 22**, Hazzan Glantz will cover many of the texts, songs, and traditions of the Passover Seder. It will begin at 6:15 PM and can continue after the evening minyan if there is interest. You can get started by going to tinyurl.com/Pesah-Playlist and listening to the Pesa<u>h</u> playlist Hazzan Glantz compiled, or scan the QR code at the right.

March will also see the revival of a time-honored AJ tradition, **Pesa<u>h</u> University**. Most recently planned for March 2020, the event was shelved due to our early pandemic lockdown, but we're bringing it back on **Sunday, March 26**.

After morning services and breakfast, two separate time slots will offer a choice of two sessions each. Rav Shai will teach "Secrets of the Haggadah" and "Women of the Haggadah." And, as a special feature of Pesah U this year, we'll be welcoming back to AJ a special quest, Dr. David Bernat. Dr. Bernat, who holds a doctorate in Biblical and Ancient Near Eastern Studies from Brandeis, is the author of Sign of the Covenant: Circumcision in the Priestly Tradition and co-editor of Religion and Violence: The Biblical Heritage. Dr. Bernat, whom you may remember as a visiting scholar last year at AJ, will offer a session entitled "What's Love Got to Do With It? Song of Songs as Erotic Poetry for Pesah." This one will be taught during both time slots and is sure to generate a lot of interest! approach to interpreting Jewish textual tradition through a woman's perspective.


