you to drive politely out of the parking lot or shoot you the Evil Eye when you were talking during my sermons — unless you forgot to mute! There were no problems with the sound in the back of the sanctuary or the thermostat settings. As much as we yearn to return, we are hesitant to relinquish all those silver linings.

For me, the guests from in town, down the shore, in Florida, in California, and all the way from Israel have been the thickest silver linings. We'd love to find a way to keep those folks with us without sacrificing the physical intimacy of the congregation. It has also been fun, and I hope educational, to have access to videos, graphics, and polls during my *divrei* Torah. Can we preserve those silver linings upon our return to the brick and mortar so we can have the best of both worlds?

The evolution of prayer over the past two thousand years involved a steady accumulation of add-ons that were not strictly necessary from a *halakhic* viewpoint. For instance, there is no *halakhic* requirement for the prayers for our country and Israel. If we have a virtual guest from Israel, we could theoretically ask them to lead the prayer for Israel from Israel. The Amidah and Torah service, on the other hand, would always need to be done entirely in our physical space with a minyan in physical attendance.

Congregations have been live-streaming services for years — and I imagine we'll also be doing that. But,

wouldn't it be wonderful, periodically, to include our virtual visitors in our services? That would require some sort of screen or monitor in the sanctuary or chapel. Regardless of what is *halakhically* permissible, such a change would be a dramatic aesthetic change.

Frankly, this feels like too much change in a relatively short period of time. These changes, however, were not on anyone's agenda; they were thrust upon us by COVID. We might call these COVID silver linings "sticky." Just because the initial reasons for virtual services will disappear with COVID, many folks want the unprecedented benefits to stick around. Over the next year, we'll have to revisit our practices as we balance our value of inclusivity against our value of maintaining tradition. Among other considerations, might we introduce a virtual membership for congregants, around the world, who want to maintain their connection to AJ but can only do so via Zoom?

The AJ New Way Forward didn't account for a global pandemic. But the same process of introspection, articulation of self-identity, and visioning for the future will be necessary as we open up our doors to the future. Over this past year, we have demonstrated the creativity, flexibility, and good will that bode well for us to continue enjoying the best of our virtual experiences even after we reclaim in-person gatherings where we hug, sing, and enjoy Kiddush as in days of old. As Rav Kook said one hundred years ago, "The old shall be renewed, and the new, sanctified; together they will become torches that illuminate Zion."

In the Cantor's Corner

lt's Not All Junk Mail

I might have thrown it directly into the recycling bin but the canceled postage stamps with German writing looked authentic. German...vicariously, for my mother z"l, I felt my skin begin to crawl. If she came home from work and saw "Hogan's Heroes" on TV...well, to her it wasn't a comedy. One *achtung* or *jawoll* and she was right back on the public bus ride home from school, when she nurtured miraculous daydreams that could never come true.

I opened that legal envelope and the pages fell out. Most were copies of old, official-looking documents and there was a cover letter from one Jana Cakovan.

Dear Mr. Glantz,

My name is Jana Cakovan and I am a student at the Goethe-Gymnasium-Bensheim in Germany. We are researching the history of the former Jewish students of our school. We want to know what happened to them during the Nazi Regime and WWII. In 2022 we will mark the 150th anniversary of our school and we wish to lay Stolpersteine for the students and their families in front of their last place of residence.

I already knew a bit about Stolpersteine. German artist Gunter Demnig conceived of the idea in 1992 and to date, over 75,000 stolpersteine have been installed at residences in over 2,000 locations. Brass plaques are hand-inscribed with the names and life dates of victims of Nazi extermination or persecution. They are then installed into the cobblestone, bricks, or sidewalks of the last known residence...the last known residence the victims were free to choose.

I reluctantly read on. I assumed I knew all we would ever know about my grandmother and the fate of her parents Ferdinand and Rosa Löb.

Your grandmother Ruth Löb Scherz was a student at our school. In memory of her and her entire family, we wish to lay Stolpersteine at the home in which she was raised together with her older brother Max Löb at Postgasse 7 in Bensheim.

The letter stated they do not wish to pry into our family's history against our wishes but that part of her school project is to learn about the survivors and what ultimately happened to my great-grandparents, Ferdinand and Rosa Löb.

What did I already know?

I knew that by the fall of 1937, my mother and her parents safely arrived at Ellis Island. That was quite late already for German Jews, but my grandfather, Edward Scherz, was born in Austria. Just six months later, German troops took only three days to incorporate all of Austria into the German Reich in what became known as the Anschluss (annexation). From that moment on, Austrian citizenship afforded no special privilege to fleeing Jews.

I also knew that my grandmother, Ruth, pleaded with my grandfather for over a year in their well-appointed Munich home. His answer was typical of the many who became victims. He was earning well, he insisted that things will improve or at least change. Had my grandmother taken no for an answer; had she not dared to talk back to her husband; had she, as a newlywed young mother, 'stayed in her lane,' the story would have ended

> there. But my Oma, Ruth Scherz, at just 22 years old, had seen enough and she threatened my Opa. He believed that she would take my then nearly two-year-old mother and leave him if he didn't act right away.

> As a child, we frequently visited my Opa and Oma in their small Providence, Rhode Island apartment. Always an apartment, never a house. My grandfather never recovered a sense of financial success and security as he had, albeit temporarily, in his Munich textile business. Not owning real estate made for fewer complications should they ever again need to leave quickly.

> In their apartment, I gazed at beautiful paintings. My toy cars rode along the intricate designs of their Persian rugs and my little fingers traced the curvy lines on the legs of their heavy furniture. They looked so regal, especially compared to the formica counters and shag wall-to-wall in my childhood home. With time, however, I learned the darkness in these furnishings. These were, in fact, constant reminders of what and whom they left behind in Munich, in Frankfurt am Main, and in Vienna. Most of these were purchased only because they were advised to obtain items they could sell quickly should it become necessary.

Many survivors grew up without grandparents.

My mother was taught to be thankful for what she had, but she saw the sadness in her mother's eyes especially. Ruth had no way of knowing if maybe, just maybe, her parents Ferdinand and Rosa Loeb survived. (Given the absence of the *umlaut* in English, we have spelled Löb as Loeb since arrival.) Could it be by some miracle, that they, like others, were scouring Jewish newspapers for any evidence of their children's whereabouts?

My mother told me about that daydream she nurtured. It wasn't the kind of story that got embellished as it was retold. Just to think I am about to retell it, my eyes begin to water. She was on that public bus home from school and imagined a very old lady approaching her. The frail woman spoke with the same thick German accent her own parents labored constantly to eliminate. *RIGHT: These two paintings and a small Persian rug are my* yerusha *(inheritance) and constant* zikaron laShoah *(reminder of the Holocaust).*

The question came from the old German lady, "Little girl, I am looking for my daughter named Ruth Scherz. We were separated in the war. . . ." Then my mother would be the hero and miraculously bring home to her mother, her own mother, about whom she knew nothing after 1937.

Information was submitted regularly to the offices at Yad Vashem and the appropriate agencies both here and in Germany, but nothing definitive was forthcoming. That is, nothing until this German high schooler poured her energy into this Stolpersteine project for her school's forthcoming 150th anniversary.

We have been corresponding regularly by email since that first large envelope arrived. Jana's perseverance proved fruitful. Here are some excerpts from her lengthy and extremely detailed findings.

I found a document that showed that Ferdinand Löb was arrested in Bensheim during the November 1938 pogrom and sent to the concentration camp Buchenwald.

Then came more heartache as an explanation for one of the documents Jana found with my great-grandparents' names.

You may wonder about the names: You find Ferdinand I. Löb and Rosa S. Löb on the list — the same with the other names. This is because in the beginning of 1939 Jewish people were forced to take a second, "typical Jewish" name as another means of stigmatization and discrimination. Men had to take "Israel", women "Sara". "I." and "S." are abbreviations for Israel and Sara.

Jana's discoveries continue.

In November 1941, the mass deportation from Germany "in den Osten" (to the East) started. The German army made fast progress at the eastern front in the Soviet Union and it was followed immediately by killing-units, the so-called "Einsatzgruppen", who started killing the Jewish population where they found them. Then Jews from the "Reich" were deported to ghettos to be murdered later on or they were shot directly after their arrival. That was the case for the deported Jews from Frankfurt, among them Ferdinand and Rosa Löb. 991 Jews had to board a train to Kowno/Kaunas in Lithuania (not Riga as presumed in the list) on November 22, 1941 which arrived in Kowno/Kaunas three days later. The same day, they were murdered at the infamous Fort IX outside Kowno/Kaunas together with other deported Jews from Berlin and Munich, altogether 2,934 people.

The coronavirus pandemic complicates matters, thus no date has been set for the laying of the Stolpersteine at Postgasse 7 in Bensheim. I wrote this column on Yom HaShoah and in one week, I will mark my mother's 11th yahrzeit. Somehow I hope this information makes its way to her soul and those of my Oma and Opa. So it is my turn to daydream.

I dream that this information is making its way to them and I pray it gives comfort. Perhaps comfort enough from knowing that Jana Cakovan and her classmates are making such efforts. For me, there is both horror and comfort in possessing the tragic but definitive knowledge of what actually took place and how Ferdinand and Rosa Löb's lives were taken.

Remembering Harold ("Hank") Strauss

With the passing of Harold "Hank" Strauss, AJ lost a devoted congregant, member of the Board of Trustees, and generous benefactor. He died on February 24 in Florida where he has lived for almost thirty years.

For many in the Congregation, Hank is best known for the "Strauss Torah" which was dedicated in 1995, and the Strauss Chapel, which was dedicated in 2001. They will remain as continuing legacies of the Strauss family's devotion to Congregation Adath Jeshurun for generations to come.

Hank's devoted wife Eleanor, who passed away in 2006 following a long cancer-related illness, grew up at AJ. Her parents, Bert and Cecelia Miller, joined AJ in 1939. Eleanor was confirmed in 1945 and her class picture is in the Confirmation Walk pictures displayed in our Religious School building. Her love for AJ, its service and music, and its members overflowed to Hank to help enhance and preserve the synagogue's mission in the community for the future.

The Strauss Torah is unique. The impressive silver case appears to be a Sephardic Torah. But that is deceptive. In a classic Sephardic Torah the scroll is sewn onto the rollers, which are part of the case (known as a *tiq*). When such a Torah is read, it is placed upright on the reading table. But the Torah within the Strauss Torah case is an Ashkenazic scroll which can be removed and placed flat on the reading table, as we are accustomed to reading the Torah. Designed by Michael Strauss Silversmiths in New York, the *tiq* is replete with symbolism. Among the representations are an image of the Ten Commandments with the "Crown of the Torah," a skyline of the Old City of Jerusalem, and the seven fruits of the Land of Israel. The scroll was written in Israel expressly for AJ, for placement in this magnificent *tiq*. It is used primarily for the High Holy Day Torah readings.

The Strauss Chapel is primarily our daily chapel. It is used for smaller Shabbat and holiday services as well. It is a rededication of the space formerly known as the Daroff Chapel. The renovation of the room transformed the space into one filled with natural light that is uniquely inviting for worship. The reading table is on the floor level, and in the center of the worshipers in classical synagogue style, where the service leader stands among the congregation. There is a ramp which makes the low bima handicapped accessible. The chairs are movable and can be arranged for different program needs. The room incorporates elements from the synagogue's Sanctuary at Broad and Diamond Streets in Philadelphia, which was used from 1910 to 1963.

Hank Strauss was born in Lewistown, PA, and was the youngest of the six children of Abraham and Lena Strauss. The Great Depression greatly reversed the family's fortunes.

But in Horatio Alger style, they regrouped. They relocated to Western Pennsylvania where they ran a chain of shoe stores. Hank came to the Philadelphia area and built a small metals business into a successful enterprise that allowed him to retire at age 52.

Hank and Eleanor loved their family, travelled the world, and were generous in their philanthropy. Throughout their 48 years together, they were devoted to each other. Hank cared for Eleanor selflessly as she battled cancer, and gave her every ounce of love, protecting her dignity to the last breath.

Hank is survived by their children, Debra and her husband Dr. David Stern, and Michael Strauss. In addition, Hank and Eleanor were blessed with four grandchildren: Cara, Barrie, Melissa, and Arianna. Three great-grandchildren, Evie, Micah, and Sydney, were the crowning glories of Hank's life.

Hank Strauss was an American original, and a precious member of AJ. His philanthropy has made AJ and many other institutions stronger through his visionary generosity. Through his deeds of charity, and with children and grandchildren who remember him with love, his impact will continue to be felt.

AJ is better because of the Strauss family. May the legacy of both Hank and Eleanor Strauss continue to bless our congregation. May they be remembered for blessing and with gratitude.

The challenges of working in a COVID-safe environment have not deterred us from celebrating every Shabbat and every holiday and, in doing so, we have found more creative ways to find joy and meaning in the experience. Purim is usually a time when we have a school-wide parade of children in costumes, gather the school together for a fun carnival, bake hamantaschen, and prepare baskets of *mishloach manot* to share with other community members. This year, the children and staff dressed in costume, baked and ate hamantaschen, prepared a basket of *mishloach manot* for their own family and enjoyed carnival games one class at a time. Each class was able to celebrate as a small class community and many of our families attended the drive-through Purim Carnival sponsored by the Old York Road Kehillah.

The children in the pre-k and kindergarten classes counted the cans and we added our collection to the AJ food collection project. For Passover, we can surely ask, "Why is this year different than all other years?" And we answer, "In all other years, we gather for seder as a school community, but this year we celebrate as a classroom community." My deepest appreciation and admiration for the outstanding and creative ways that each of the classroom teachers planned and celebrated Passover. Sometimes when we are forced to take a detour, we find beauty in places we never would have imagined or experienced. The children retold the *maggid* (the story of our exodus from slavery to freedom) through artistic creations, dramatic interpretation, and scientific investigation. Yes, that is correct. Making dough and watching it rise to bake challah, and then mixing dough and baking it within 18 minutes to make matza — that's scientific!

Returning from Passover/Spring Break brings our focus to flowers and planting, to preparing our vegetable and herb garden, and then onto celebrating Yom Ha'Atzmaut and Shavuot. Our children and staff embrace all the holidays and welcome the opportunities to share our history and traditions in ways that provide personal meaning for our children and their families.

Then, in the blink of an eye, it will be summer. The summer program, Camp Kitov, begins on Monday, June 14 under the direction of Onit Zisserman. Camp provides exciting and engaging activities for the children including sports, music, art, water play, and outdoor games. 
