Overcoming Pediatric Judaism

I'm a student of the history of Jewish thought and theology. One of the observations that my colleagues have made, and that my own research has borne out, is that a very common response to trauma is to make Judaism childish.

The sophisticated Jewish philosophy that emerged in the 12th and 13th

centuries went into hibernation for hundreds of years after the Spanish exile in 1492 — and that's precisely when the most racist forms of Jewish mysticism emerged.

In 1648, the Khmelnytsky Pogroms in Ukraine claimed tens thousands of Jewish lives. Shortly thereafter, in 1665, a heretical version of Jewish mysticism was promoted by the messianic pretender Shabbatai Zvi in an aborted attempt to return to the Land of Israel.

In our own lifetimes, in the aftermath of the Shoah, we witnessed one of the most spiritually sensitive forms of modern Judaism, Chabad, turn into a heap of messianic hogwash. When an Orthodox sociologist, David Berger, shouted from the rooftops that Chabad had done to Rebbe Menachem Mendel Schneerson what Christians did to Jesus, he titled his 2001 book, *Rebbe, the Messiah, and the Scandal of Orthodox Indifference*.

Is it any surprise, therefore, that so many of our young people think Jewish theology is a joke? Here are two excerpts from the 2020 Pew Survey of American Jews:

Overall, about a quarter of U.S. Jewish adults (27%) do not identify with the Jewish religion: They consider themselves to be Jewish ethnically, culturally, or by family background, and have a Jewish parent or were raised Jewish, but they answer a question about their current religion by describing themselves as atheist, agnostic, or "nothing in particular" rather than as Jewish. Among Jewish adults under 30, four-in-ten describe themselves this way.

There are even bigger gaps when it comes to belief in God. A majority of all U.S. adults say they believe in God "as described in the Bible" (56%), compared with about a quarter of Jews (26%). Jewish Americans are more

inclined to believe in some other kind of higher power — or no higher power at all.

For me, the most startling statistic in the above excerpts is that a quarter of American Jews think they believe in the God "as described in the Bible." Who are these Jews? Where are they? Have they ever read the Bible?

That 40% of American Jews under 30 don't consider themselves religiously Jewish I believe. That 26% believe in a biblical God — not a chance! Even if all 10% of the American Jews who identify as Orthodox think they believe in a biblical God, who are those other 16%? Like God, it's a mystery.

Surveys are blunt instruments that ask unnuanced questions. I don't believe in the biblical God. I do believe in "some other kind of higher power." But I'm Jewish so I call that higher power "God." If you're an evangelical Christian, the biblical God is God. Paul Tillich, on the other hand, a Protestant theologian, enjoyed identifying himself as an atheist precisely because he didn't believe in the biblical God. That was 70 years ago! Unless you're reading contemporary theology, what we tend to see in the news is theology for children, what I call pediatric theology.

You should know two things. The first is that there is plenty of sophisticated Christian theology. The second thing you should know is our sophisticated theology. Being a person of the Jewish faith is not an intellectual embarrassment. But we rabbis don't talk or teach much about God. I tried a few years ago, during the High Holidays, to talk about God. My attempt was not appreciated by all. *Continued on page 6*

A Long-Distance D'var Torah from Mervin Hartman

In view of the flagging interest in Conservative Judaism and its institutions, it may well be time to consider an alternative theology or *raison d'etre* for beliefs and practices that would retain and convince the importance of our heritage.

Conservative Judaism is, in reality, a pale imitation of Orthodoxy and for many years has been unwilling to incorporate modern scholarship in its approach.

Many of us believe in the existence of an infinite presence, we define as God, because we cannot or are unwilling to accept without greater knowledge and understanding that the universe and mankind are the result of random gaseous explosions and single cell evolution. Scientists claim to know the origins, the building blocks of life, but as yet have been unable to duplicate it.

However, after 3,000 years of persecution, dispersal, pogroms and, ultimately, the murder of six million, the God of the Torah, who appeared so concerned about the fate and welfare of the ancient Israelites, is more likely unknowable, indescribable, and not definable.

Applying modern scholarship to core beliefs, it is clear from a critical analysis of the Torah text that it is a composite of oral traditions that were reduced to writing at various times, and ultimately edited and redacted approximately 700 years after the alleged events occurred, at the time of Ezra. It is a disjointed narrative with textual inconsistencies.

It is therefore problematic that it is the word of God or even the will of God. I believe that the best we can say is that the text represents our perception of God's interventions in the affairs of man.

In addition, the Torah does not appear to be a reliable historical document.

Modern scholarship and archeological excavations raise serious doubts as to the origin of the Jewish people as set forth in the Torah.

Merneptah, son of Ramesses the Great, was the Pharaoh in Egypt who reigned, together with his

father, during the 13th Century BCE. It was during this period that it is generally believed that the Exodus of Israelites slaves took place.

However, an inscription on the Merneptah Victory Stele, presently in the Cairo Museum, states, "Israel is laid waste and his seed is not." Israel, obviously a player in the region of Canaan during Merneptah's reign, is defeated and its grain storage destroyed.

This appears to be contrary to the Biblical narrative of the Exodus, the ultimate conquest of Canaan, and division of the land among the tribes.

Also, there is no archeological evidence to support a path of destruction by Joshua in conquering Canaan. In fact, there is no archeological evidence of early settlement in the Jordan valley where the Israelites allegedly crossed the Jordan River and entered and settled in the Promised Land.

Well then, if as I believe the Torah does not represent the Word or Will of God, what is the basis — the rationale — for religious belief and practice? *Shabbat, Yom Tov, Kashrut, Tallis, T'filin, Pesah*, etc.

Because we would not label them as divine commandments does not mean they have no significance. Their observance and recognition have been responsible for the cohesiveness of the Jewish people these many millennia. They are a structured commitment to a way of life. They are our heritage.

However, ritual is not an end in itself but serves as a constant reminder of who we are and what is expected of us as Jewish human beings.

It is therefore my belief that the ultimate purpose of Judaism for non-traditional Jews is not the carrying out of the questionable Will or Word of God, but the day-to-day striving for refinement of human conduct and character, and our heritage operates as a foundation for achieving this goal.





In the Cantor's Corner

Gratitude.

In many ways, the experience of gratitude is similar to other emotions we encounter, such as sadness, loneliness, happiness, or pride. There are moments in our lives when certain events can evoke these emotions with overwhelming intensity. And not just a fleeting feeling but a deep and lasting sense of appreciation for the blessings and positive aspects of our lives. From this, we can absorb the goodness that surrounds us and a new awareness that we are all interconnected.

Five years ago, during my first rabbinical school retreat in November 2018, an incredibly moving and profound experience unfolded. It was a moment when the faculty and senior fellow students came together to create a powerful symbol of support and love for the newly accepted rabbinical students — a wall of *tallitot*.

Dwelling in this loving yet vulnerable *sukkah* of fabric and *tzitzit*, I was overcome with a wave of unexpected emotion flooding to the surface from within me. Recalling it even now, the familiar moistness forms but just shy of overflowing. In the moment itself, I didn't try to "pull myself together" or brush it off as if I had allergies. I basked in both the safe, spiritual embrace and the firm hugs that preceded the pandemic. Many of the faculty and students I was meeting in person outside of Zoom for the very first time. Yes, I Zoomed before the pandemic!

My Jewish comfort zone is firmly within the Conservative Movement. The time I have spent at the Academy of Jewish Religion (AJR) is precious to me and filled with meaning. The Conservative synagogues, summer camps, and educational institutions in New York and Israel laid the foundation for my Judaism. That notwithstanding, the time spent with Jewish leaders, teachers, and fellow students whose backgrounds and preferences differ from mine has been at once both exhilarating and challenging. AJR is an authentic and serious Jewish community without borders that refuses to put a name brand on Torah.

All the while, here at our AJ, as each trimester followed, the sails of my learning were buffeted by your inquiries and expressions of interest. Through all the deadlines and "comps" — oral and written comprehensive exams you rooted for me to succeed and Rav Shai listened with keen interest to the specifics of what I was learning. Your enthusiasm served as constant encouragement and empowerment that carried me through to the Academy for Jewish Religion *Semikha* ceremony this past April 20. For all of this and more, I was and I remain deeply grateful to AJ and AJR.

Semikha, the Hebrew term for rabbinic ordination, is easily mistaken for simcha. Semikha is a version of the word for "happy" or "celebration" (שמרח – sameach or manna – simcha), which is a delightful association when considering the occasion of naming a rabbi (and happens to be the cherished Hebrew name of Skip Atkins and surely a few others). But the term semikha actually derives from the Hebrew של – lismoch, meaning "to lean or rely on," which aligns all the more with the role of a rabbi by connecting us to the end of Moses' life (Numbers 27:18), when Moses appointed Joshua as his successor.

Each rabbinic candidate, was charged with choosing a rabbi of the AJR faculty as סומך *— somekh* and two more faculty rabbis as סומך *— eidim* (witnesses). Rabbi Matthew Goldstone has helped see me through this process from early on and his dedication to Jewish text has been an inspiration to me and many others. In his work outside the classroom, Matt has tackled difficult and controversial subjects with critical acclaim for his research and culminating works. As mentor for my master's thesis, *An Argument for Proactively Eliminating Metzitzah b'Feh*, I worked closely with Matt, honing my goals and aspirations for the project, and felt he was the obvious choice as *somekh*.

My *eidim* (witnesses) were AJR professors in a sea of influential and valued teachers to whom I feel a debt of gratitude. Rabbi Jeff Hoffman taught my earliest classes in Talmud. His patience and preciseness made Talmud both accessible and engaging. Outside the classroom, Rabbi Hoffman has written extensively on prayer. Of particular importance to our shul is his deep research into the *Aleinu* prayer and the peer-reviewed article, "The Image of The Other in Jewish Interpretations of *Aleinu*."

Rabbi Deborah Orenstein served as my professor for two enlightening classes: homiletics and meditation. Through both courses, she skillfully pushed me beyond my comfort zone, challenging me to learn, grow, and continually better myself. Her invaluable volumes titled *Lifecycles* grace my bookshelf, serving as valuable resources, while her meditative recordings have provided me with profound quidance and inspiration. Notably, Rabbi Orenstein shared a close bond with the late Rabbi Zalman Schachter Shalomi, the esteemed founder of the Jewish renewal movement. For fourteen years, they co-officiated at High Holidays, fostering a profound connection and collaboration that enriched the spiritual experiences of many.

As if all those choices weren't enough, I was tasked with choosing a presenter, as were all the rabbinical and cantorial candidates. Here come the tears again welling up. The older three Rs (Rafi, Remy, and Rose) agreed they would contribute to the piece that the fourth R would write. Rory has since graduated from what is known as the Joint Program, a double bachelor's program with Columbia University and the Jewish Theological Seminary.

Among my favorite lines from Rory's piece are the following:

- My siblings and I are proud to be known as "PKs", growing up with both *Birkat HaMazon* and Harry Chapin...
- ... As I was on my own academic Jewish journey, Dad and I bonded over deciphering Rashi script and debating the perspectives of *Beit Hillel* versus *Beit Shammai*.

And unlike most rabbinical schools, each graduate was asked to offer a brief *d'var Torah*. It is important to me that we reprint this much:

Unthwarted, I am trying a different platform. Join me for the Sizzling Summer Lecture Series on Contemporary Jewish Theology. (Find out more on page 14.) I am neither a prophet nor the son of a prophet, but I don't see Judaism continuing in the Diaspora without its religious component. I think the Pew statistics support my claim. I think pediatric theologies, whether Jewish or not, support my claim. If contemporary Jews don't know what past Jewish theologians have expressed about the nature of God and God's relationship to creation, then we are abandoning Jewish theology to those purveyors of naarishkeit (juvenile thinking) whom we and our educated children and grandchildren rightly reject.

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Our May B' Mitzvah

He is also well on his way to becoming a formidable pickleball player. He is also probably old enough now to know that Zorthos is neither "flourishing" nor returning. His summers revolve around weekends in the Pocono Mountains, fishing, swimming, and hanging out with friends. During the summer of 2023, Owen is very excited to make his first trip to Israel to watch his brother Simon play in the Maccabi games. Eli will be hovering close as well as he will be on a BBYO trip to Eastern Europe and Israel. Owen's family cannot be prouder of his recent Bar Mitzvah accomplishment and the constant joy he brings to his family.

D'var Torah | Vayikra 2023 (March 18, 2023) INTRODUCTION

Shabbat Shalom.

While discussing my Torah portion with Rav Shai, he asked me if I would prefer to write about a prayer and a poem, *Modim* and *El Adon*, respectively. The *Modim* is the first of the three blessings in the final section of one of Judaism's most important prayers — the *Amidah* — a daily prayer to God acknowledging the beauty of his creations and praise for his power. *El Adon* is not quite a prayer — it is a *Piyut*. *Piyutim* are songs or poems meant to be sung or recited in synagogue. The best example of a *piyut* that most of you would know is *Adon Olam*. Both of these beautiful works have a lot in common in terms of praising Hashem and celebrating his works. *El Adon* is the more specific of the two, and focuses on a specific set of God's creations, namely, the heavens and the wonders of space.

PART 1 — MODIM

How do we thank GOD every day for his love and protection? How do we praise him for his creations? One way is by reciting the *Amidah* every day. I don't know if it's sacrilegious to call the *Amidah* a "catch-all" or "kitchen sink" prayer. But also — I didn't ask. And I could have — because I've been coming here twice a week for last forever months. So, let's go with catch-all prayer. I am joking, of course, because it's a very brief and beautiful prayer. To quote a short part of it, we are praising G-D for "...miracles that are with us every day, and for your wonders and good deeds that are with us at all times: evening, morning, and midday." So this part of *Modim* is not about thanking G-d for a specific act. Instead, it thanks him for "everyday" miracles.

But if there were miracles every day — wouldn't we hear about them — every day — on the news? I guess then that we have to figure out what a miracle is. And probably, miracles are subjective — different for everyone. For example, some people might consider miracles to be: nature itself, animals, newborn babies, or the underdog team winning the big game. For some it might be one more day with a sick loved one. My opinion now, as a 13-year-old Bar Mitzvah boy, is the Earth and the possibilities of

space and the unknown beyond. So while the *Modim* asks us to be mindful of the miracles around us every day, *El Adon* looks at a specific set of G-D's wonders.

PART 2 — EL ADON

Perhaps a middle-aged rabbi in the second century or so was looking up at the dark sky one night while thinking about the *Modim*. He had to get out of the house; the kids are at each other's throats, his wife is making comments about how Yitzhak Glickstein, the local butcher from the next *shtetl*, over has a shiny new donkey and four teeth — pure mayhem. So, he climbs onto his roof and looks at the sky.

Maybe he was trying to notice G-d's daily miracles around him. And maybe that inspired him to wrote the *El Adom*. To quote *El Adom*:

He endowed them with energy and power To dominate within their sphere of the universe Full of splendour, they radiate brightness Their brilliance adorns the universe

When the author writes "He endowed 'them' with energy and power," he is referring to the stars and planets above. *El Adom* is about the beauty and splendor of the universe above us. It specifically addresses the mysteries of the heavens (but not heaven itself), the planets, the stars, and even the moon's phases. And remember, this was during a time in human history when people believed that sneezing gave the devil a chance to jump into your body. True story. Google it. It's messed up. So, while *Modim* asks us to look at miracles all around us, *El Adon* asks us to do the same — but while looking up.

The theme of my Bar Mitzvah is space and science fiction. I like these things so much because of the suspense and mystery of the unknown. Instead of reading or watching something about things that happened, will happen, or people's lives — space and science fiction gives me new possibilities. And hopefully it's something I haven't seen or thought of before. The hardest part is covering my tracks after I've watched something Rated R or TV-MA.

PART 3 — MY PERSPECTIVE

My takeaway from this is we are always worried about new things. Our fears and anxiety that are with us in everyday life make it easy to forget that G-D has our back. And that every day we not only forget to appreciate the miracles that G-D made for us, but we fail to recognize them; like running water, food, pets, school being over soon, and, most importantly, — our families. Maybe if we were able to recognize these "miracles that are with us every day" and wake up in anticipation of these miracles, you would never be bored because the mundane becomes extravagant.

Every day I wake up and put my clothes on, then eat, brush my teeth, and go to school. I assume most of you have the same routine: waking up, getting dressed, eating, working, and coming home to eat and sleep. See because we are all living in Groundhog Day. But if every day you were to wake up and look at the stars, sunrise (which is one of the gods' greatest creations), nature, the bounty in front of you, and those you rely on when times are hard, you might break that loop. And no, Mom, waking up to see the sunrise isn't one of my many excuses for waking up early. YES — I LIKE TO WAKE UP EARLY. But one of the challenges is being able to peer into our routine to appreciate the beauty and complexity of every single thing that we see every day. Like family members and relatives all the way to every little grain of sand, but all in all, the main idea of this is to appreciate the big things and to appreciate the small things equally.



So while we agree that we can get wrapped up in our daily lives and forget to take a moment to appreciate the miracles around us, what prayers were given to us to try to help us remember? The Amidah and El Adon! I said it, like, a dozen times, 30 seconds ago. Stay with me... We are supposed to recite the Amidah every day and chant the El Adon on Shabbatot. Two reminders of our bountiful miracles. And where are we to do this — usually? In shul. In your synagogue; the focal point of Jewish life in our community. Reciting these prayers can also be bland and repetitive just part of a service that (like our daily lives) started in one place and ends somewhere different. Or again, can we take a moment and feel the word and truly absorb their meaning, and take part of it with us after we've left the chapel, turned in our *kippot*, and had our coffee. Can we leave this place, go out into the world, and remind ourselves "things in my life might be good, things in my life might be bad, but at least these miracles are the constant that hold tomorrow's promise"?

I was told it's mandatory to mention some really important people that helped me be where I am today.

I'd like to thank my Mom who helped me through thick and thin and worked her *tuchus* off to make all of this possible. And I'd like to thank my erudite-though-loutish, eloquent Dad who definitely didn't help with this speech. But anyway, my Dad is always there if I needed an opinion or help with anything. And I would like to thank Rav Hazzan Glantz and Rav Shai who are responsible for preparing me for this day, and any of the Hebrew that came out of my mouth during this service. Eli and Simon are here as well.

AJ Adult Education Committee

We recently completed a very successful season for Adult Education at AJ, with most of our programming dedicated to our theme of "The Year of the Woman." How do we know it was successful? Because you told us so!

At the conclusion of our programs, the Adult Ed committee surveys our participants, and we derive a lot of useful feedback. Here are some examples of what people told us.



Our Fall Scholar program featured a four-week series on the Psalms, conducted jointly by Rav Shai and **Professor Elaine James** of the Princeton Theological Seminary. Eighty percent of those attending the class told us they loved it; here's what one person said: "Loved the dual approaches to the same material. Please keep these educational evenings ongoing. Education should be forever a part of our lives."

In January, we hosted scholar and author **Kathleen Balgley**, who spoke about her personal journey of Jewish self-discovery as depicted in her powerful book *Letters to My Father: Excavating a Jewish Identity in Poland and Belarus*. By all accounts a fabulous evening, here's some of what people said: "The program exceeded my expectations,""The program inspired me to buy her book," and, especially: "Kathleen



Balgley's personal journey of Jewish discovery, her profoundly moving and beautifully written book, and her generous manner and evocative narrative style during the program made [it] one of the finest that the ... Adult Education Committee has yet organized."

Here are some comments we received for Rav Shai's three-week class on prayer, also in January: "The class could have been twice as long — it was wonderful,""I've been waiting for Rav Shai to offer a class on this topic for a long time. He didn't disappoint," and "Rav Shai's multi-layered deep dive into prayer ... was profoundly absorbing. His background as a Judaic scholar was on full display."

And here's what someone told us about Rav Shai's recent class on "The Fiddler's Fractures: Conservative Judaism and the Other Denominations": "I enjoyed the enthusiasm that Rav Shai exuded. He could make watching paint dry seem enjoyable." (We didn't make this up!)



Our Scholar-in-Residence weekend this year featured **Judy Klitsner** of the Pardes Institute of Jewish Studies in Jerusalem, who received a lot of acclaim from those attending. Focusing her talks on what Klitsner calls "the 'vibrant conversation' that takes place between the Bible's parallel stories," one person said: "Everything about the weekend was a resounding success. Judy is an exceptional educator: knowledgeable, accessible,

warm." Another called her an "Animated, insightful teacher," and someone else called the weekend "Well organized and presented. Showcased the synagogue programming. And good food!!" (And we all know it's hard to miss when a program features good food!)

We've already started planning next year's programs and our first is scheduled for this month. Following a tradition Rav Shai started last summer with a series of midweek lunchtime classes, this year's three-session "Sizzling Summer Series" will begin on Wednesday, July 12 and feature "The Last Century of American Jewish Theology: Mordecai Kaplan, Abraham Joshua Heschel, and Arthur Green." (See sidebar for more information.)

And we have more on the way, including, for example, a series of day-long intensive sessions on Hebrew, at both beginner and intermediate levels. And there's much more to come, so please keep an eye out, and please join us as we look forward to this coming season's successes!



Join us for some summer learning on three Tuesday afternoons in July, either in person in the Strauss Chapel or on Zoom.

In 1934, Mordecai M. Kaplan published Judaism as a Civilization. His was the most honest assessment of the role of Judaism in the modern world. Kaplan brought the mind of a sociologist to traditional Judaism. Abraham Joshua Heschel, on the hand, brought eyes filled with wonder. As Arthur Green, one of his star students, put it, Heschel recast Hasidism for moderns. Finally we'll look at the theology of Green, himself, an heir to both Kaplan and Heschel, who describes his theology as mystical panentheism.

The series will take place on three Tuesday afternoons at noon: July 11, 18, and 25. The first class will start with an Adult Ed-sponsored lunch, followed by the first class. For the subsequent classes, tables will be set up in the Sanctuary lobby for those who want to bring a dairy or parve lunch to eat before class begins at 12:00 PM.
