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Leave More Than a Trace

When I started learning at the Pardes Institute of Jewish Studies in Jerusalem, one of the things my Torah teacher, Aryeh ben David, pointed out was that there were many words for different shades of happiness in Hebrew, but no word for fun. (In Israel, we use kef, an Arabic word, for fun.) Here's the Rabbinic source on happiness:

There are ten words for happiness. They are: sasson (joy), simcha (happiness), gila (rejoicing), rina (joyful song), ditza (joyful dancing), tzahala (exuberance), aliza (felicity), hedva (delight), tiferet (splendor), alitza (cheer). — Avot d'Rabbi Natan 34

The English translations don't all feel spot on, but that might be because English has fewer words for happiness than Hebrew! In any case, no *fun*.

I doubt that our ancestors were unfamiliar with the phenomenon of fun. So why is there no word for it? Perhaps it was unworthy of concretizing the phenomenon with a name. As good as fun feels at the moment, it is fleeting. Fun is incidental to an experience. There's no residue. Fun leaves no trace.

Our job as grandparents, parents, aunts, uncles, educators, and clergy is to leave a trace on others. Here's some Hebrew wisdom on the topic. Respect (*kavod*) comes from the same root as heavy (*kaved*); curse (*k'lalah*) comes from the same root at light (*kal*). If you treat something with gravity, it'll be respected and leave a trace. If you treat something lightly, it'll be gone with the next breeze.

As we move into High Holiday preparation, let's remind ourselves of our priorities. What is worthy of our time, talent, and treasure? Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel wrote, "Time is life, and to 'kill time' is to commit murder."

Long ago, I decided that designing activities to be fun was missing the mark. Fun will take care of itself. As a Jew, I want to ask how will we bring more Godliness into the world?

The biblical term for God's Presence is *k'vod Adonay*, literally, God's heaviness. God's Presence, though we may feel it only rarely, leaves a trace, a long-lasting imprint. Rabbi Heschel defines faith as faithfulness to the memory of experiencing God's Presence.

We have a new Program Director, Beth Shapiro. You should stop in the office and meet her. I am excited to be working with someone who wants to leave a trace and have fun along the way. It's not only Beth, it's our entire AJ crew. We are all aligned in our mission to bring Godliness into our community. That sense of alignment and commitment to our mission makes working together fun.

Engaging in mitzvot (commandments) with a community of like-minded folks is a Jewish way to pursue the Divine Presence while positively affecting those in our sphere of activity, including ourselves. I want to experience the Divine Presence again. The tracings of my memory are becoming faint, like the jostled lines of an Etch-a-Sketch. Let's pursue Divine Presence together.

May this High Holiday season and all of 5784 bring us many experiences that leave more than a trace. ⓐ

Hotter, Weirder: Philadelphia and Climate Change

Saturday, September 9, beginning at 7:05 PM

Program

Our guest for this year's Selihot program is naturalist **Mike Weilbacher**, an environmental educator with 40 years of experience teaching through lectures, walks, newspaper essays, theatrical performances, and radio.

As 2021's Hurricane Ida showed us, climate change is already happening in Philadelphia as our climate gets hotter, wetter, and decidedly weirder. But what's the evidence for climate change locally? What are the trends in temperature and rainfall? You'll not only be surprised by the data, but motivated to find solutions. Mike will walk us through the science, carefully answering our questions while weaving in politics, pop culture, and even a pop quiz.

Meet Mike

A frequent lecturer, Mike has been traveling the Delaware Valley the last five years offering public lectures on environmental concerns. He's also been a keynote speaker and workshop leader at state and national education conferences, speaking before groups like the National Science Teachers Association, the Pennsylvania Association for Environmental Educators, the National Association of Interpretation, and the Association of Nature Center Administrators.



As an environmental educator, he has designed a diverse array of programs across the region, including family festivals, Earth Day events, town meetings, lecture series, nature walks, and much more. Over a 30-year career, he served as the executive director of the Lower Merion Conservancy, the Briar Bush Nature Center in Abington, and the Schuylkill Center for Environmental Education in Roxborough.

As an emcee and radio personality, Mike hosted Earth Talk on WHYY-FM, an early '90s newsmagazine on regional environmental concerns. Mike is also well-known as "Mike the All-Natural Science Guy" on the Peabody award-winning live children's radio show "Kid's Corner" on WXPN-FM in Philadelphia and worldwide at XPN.org, where he has been talking to children about nature and the environment for more than 30 years.

As a writer, his first book, Wild Philly, has just been released with Timber Press. He has authored weekly columns on preservation and environmental issues for two different local newspapers since 1997, where in 2006 the Suburban Newspapers of America honored him for outstanding writing. He has published articles in Green Teacher, E: The Environmental Magazine, and Learning; placed numerous book reviews and op-ed pieces in The Philadelphia Inquirer; and wrote an acclaimed regular column in Pennsylvania's environmental education journal. In the Cantor's Corner

What's in Your Wallet?

My electronic devices have "learned" a lot of the Hebrew terms I use regularly in transliteration. What I mean is, I don't usually bother changing the keyboard to a Hebrew setting to type out one word in my otherwise English notes and emails. I will write Shabbat Shalom, rather than שבת שלום. Maybe I'll miss some keys and write Shabnat Shakom, but many of my devices will suggest a change based on previous experience. Suddenly Shabnat Shakom becomes Shabbat Shalom. Amazing? Perhaps, but...

A true story illustrates both the potential pitfalls of over-reliance on technology and the serendipitous, albeit erroneous, "correction" that inspired me. Just the other day, I found myself including the word "tefillah" (prayer) in a sentence. Thankfully, before hitting "send," I reread the note only to discover that "tefillah" had been auto-corrected to "refillable."

While I was relieved that I noticed it just in time, I got to thinking... what a message! The auto-correct transformation of "tefillah" into "refillable" may not be an accurate correction, but it did make me think how everyday tasks and responsibilities are sapping our energy. Our batteries need recharging and our depleted gas tanks need refilling. Maybe prayer can help. I find it an engaging thought to consider refilling, refreshing, renewing through prayer. A means to tap into our spiritual energy and infuse that internal storehouse both unique and in common to us all.

As some of you know, I actually enjoy Hebrew mistakes because they often bring extra meaning to a text. I find these misunderstandings cause prayers to be much more personal. Just a slight change in the vocalization of word for prayer (\bar{q} , \bar{q} , #e¢ \bar{q}) transforms it to \bar{q} , \bar{q} , \bar{q} ,

meaning unsavoriness or unseemliness. It is just as easy for a new English speaker to err with the usage of *c*, ck, or k alone (don't get me started on the words that begin with KN). I considered what would cause prayer to be unsavory or unseemly. Prayer without acknowledgement and appreciation would be, to put it bluntly, well simply, asking for stuff. We do have prayers that are called "bakashot" which make requests (healing, strength, prosperity) but they usually begin some type of Divine recognition. "You Gd, Who blessed my ancestors, please. . . "

Sticking with this idea, when we misspell *tefillah* with a v — the letter *tet*—we get יְם לְּהָם, and a warm feeling comes over me propelling me forward even when I don't feel like praying. Spelling *tefillah* with a v—the letter *tet*—brings out several derivations, all of which have the sense of treatment and caregiving. I love that! Adding yet another layer to both the meaning and confusion, is that the verb for praying—לְהַתְּפַלֵּל – *l'hitpalel*—is one that is reflexive. And with all of these meanings (correct and incorrect), I get to think of prayer as a reflexive form of self-care inspired by the Divine.

So how does any of this relate to my title, "What's in Your Wallet?" Well, it should really read, "What's in Your Refillable *Tefillah* Wallet?" How do you best refill it and when does it feel the most empty or full? In the coming days, feel free to share with me your personal responses to these ideas and questions.

As the High Holy Days of 5784 approach, please accept, from my family to yours, warm wishes for *Shanah Tovah U'm'tukah*, a good and a sweet new year. May this season bring new meaning to our existence in this complicated world and may we assist one another in keeping our *tefillah* tanks and batteries filled and charged.

Shanah Tovah u'metuka. One of my favorite books is The Giving Tree by Shel Silverstein. It tells the story of the relationship between a boy and a tree. When the boy was young, the tree loved being part of the boy's life. As he got older, he had limited use for the tree. Finally in old age after stripping the tree of its apples, branches, leaves, and trunk, all that he needed was the stump that remained. This is indeed a story with valuable life lessons.

As we begin the school year, our school, like the tree, is filled with beautiful, shiny things. There are new bulletin boards, freshly waxed floors, and eager teachers awaiting their students' arrivals. The children, like the boy, are excited and intrigued by all the opportunities before them. It is wonderful to celebrate the new school year with apple-related activities, symbolizing the tradition and knowledge passed down through the generations. The classes will dip apples in honey and learn the blessing that accompanies this tradition. Our older children will dissect an apple and learn about its parts. Many classes will bake with apples and enjoy the "fruits" of their labor.

Shel Silverstein's classic is on the bookshelf in many of our classes. I encourage you to read or reread it and think about one of your favorite teachers. Many of them are likely thinking of you!

I would like to wish everyone a happy and healthy 5784!




AJWA Sisterhood Discussion with Rabbi Barbara Aiello



Kikar 2023–2024, with Rav Shai, Offers Teens College Credit for Jewish Learning

After a remarkably successful year that included seeing Broadway productions of *Leopoldstadt* and *Parade*, Kikar (formerly The Concierge Teen Experience) will return next year with the theme of "Crimes and Consequences." Due to demand, AJ will be allowing teens who are not AJ members to join our group. Teens can be in 8th through 11th grades.

The word *kikar* means square, circle, and gathering place. That's our goal: squaring the circle of Jewish teen education through gathering teens for experiential education.

Kikar mixes experiential learning, like field trips and plays, with more traditional learning to help bring out the Jewish angle. This year's theme is *Crimes and Consequences*. This coming year we'll go to Eastern State Penitentiary and discuss mass incarceration and capital punishment; determine the Talmudic accuracy of Monty Python's *Life of Brian*; explore the Jewish mafia in America; and dive into the espionage trials of the Rosenbergs and Jonathan Pollard.

As promised, Gratz College has approved this class for college credit! For those of you in 9th grade (and higher) hoping to receive college credit, your attendance is expected as it would be in any other class.

AJ Adult Education Committee

Powerful Year of Adult Learning Planned for 5784

Following the success of last year's schedule of programs, this summer Rav Shai offered his annual three-week "Sizzlin' Summer Series" on "The Past Hundred Years of American Jewish Theology." Delving into the writings of Mordecai Kaplan, Abraham Joshua Heschel, and Arthur Green, class participants experienced a fascinating, nuanced view of the minds of these great scholars and how they understood Jews' interrelationship with God, science and sociology, and the role of religious doctrine in the modern world.

Although the concepts were occasionally complex, reviews by class participants were very positive. "Outstanding content, delivery, and discussion" was what one class member said; another offered "there are a lot of smart and thoughtful people at AJ."

Meanwhile, the Adult Education Committee has been planning extensively for what is sure to be a very powerful and engaging year of learning in 5784. For a considerable time, AJers have been requesting a program designed to introduce, or reinforce, Hebrew skills. Some members seek elementary instruction; others are looking to improve upon their existing level of knowledge.

With this in mind, look for our first-ever "Hebrew Jumpstart" for adults, consisting of two levels of classes—one for pure beginners (refreshing their knowledge of the aleph—bet and "decoding" Hebrew words) and another for those with more advanced Hebrew skills—in two separate marathon Sunday sessions in December and February. Devoted primarily to assist congregants in davening in Hebrew as well as reading and comprehension, those interested in the basic level can also enroll in a class to receive follow-up guided practice sessions to hone the skills they acquire.







During the year, we will undertake an in-depth exploration of **antisemitism**. The theme will be examined from four interrelated perspectives, including early Christian anti-Judaism (Church Fathers, New Testament, Reformation), Anti-Jewish iconography and visual imagery, the Shoah, and contemporary antisemitism. We will be hosting speakers on these topics throughout the year, including, among others, **Philip Cunningham**, Professor of Theology and Director of Jewish-Catholic Relations at St. Joseph's University, and **Ayal Feinberg**, Assistant Professor of Political Science at Texas A&M University and incoming Director for the Center for Holocaust Studies at Gratz College.

Very significantly, during our Scholar in Residence weekend in the spring, we will be honored to host **Susannah Heschel**, Eli M. Black Distinguished Professor of Jewish Studies at Dartmouth College, and daughter of the great theologian and activist, Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel. An award-winning author, her works include *The Aryan Jesus: Christian Theologians and the Bible in Nazi Germany*. She will be discussing newer methods of analyzing antisemitism that include considerations of the emotional and spiritual consequences of anti-Jewish hatred and draw on recent scholarship concerning anti-Black racism and enslavement in the United States.


