The Kabbalah of the Potato Pancake

So used are we to what has been called Jewish cuisine that often we fail to see that in the very ingredients of the food we eat are hidden mysteries. So with the humble latke: grated potato, finely chopped onion, a beaten egg, salt, and olive oil. As a kid I remember our Hebrew school Hanukkah pageant featuring Mrs. Judah Maccabee (she did not have her own first name) mixing latkes to feed the hungry Maccabees as they came home

from battle. How surprising it must have been to discover that the potato, indigenous to the Chilean Archipelago, did not make it to Europe until 1546. So why potato latkes on Hanukkah? Cheaper than cheese.

The Middle Ages featured two heroes on Hanukkah: Judah Maccabee and Judith, the pious widow featured in the apocryphal book that bears her name. Both won impressive military victories and both were included by Christian artisans on hanukkiot (Hanukkah menorahs) created by members of the Christian silver and metal guilds for Jewish clients (since it would seem that Jews were not included in their ranks). Then, Judith's story was well known:

In the city of Bethulia, there lived a pious Jewish woman whose husband was killed in the battle with the Greeks. Her name was Judith. One day, a Syrian general, Holofernes, besieged her city and was ready to destroy it and kill all its inhabitants. Judith asked permission from the elders of the city to try to save the people and, at the same time, to avenge her husband's death. In the evening, she took some wine and cheese with her, stole out of the city, and appeared before Holofernes. She offered to help him conquer the city. Holofernes, not suspecting anything, and thinking

that Judith was willing to be a spy, agreed to this. She then offered him some of her strong wine, as well as some of her tasty cheese. Holofernes drank the wine and ate the cheese with gusto. This made him very drowsy, and soon he fell asleep. Then Judith cut off his head with his own sword, tucked it under her arm, and entered the city. In the morning, the Syrians saw their commander's head on the top of a pole at the gates of the city. They became very frightened, and the people of Bethulia attacked the confused Syrians and defeated them.

To honor the brave Judith, it became a custom among Jews to eat dairy dishes on <u>Hanukkah</u> to remind us of the cheese which Judith fed Holofernes. So why potatoes? Tevye could

barely make a living as a cheese monger, cheese was expensive and quickly spoiled if not properly tended to. The potato solved the problem, and the oil came to be seen as the connection to Hanukkah's account of the miraculous cruse of oil. Simultaneously, the potato was innocuous, passive, and humble. By no stretch of the imagination could one have seen the latke as the embodiment of Jewish strength, courage, and valor. With the rehabilitation of the Maccabees in

the 19th century as the name selected for European Jewish sporting clubs, the name later being adopted for the Jewish Olympics (which will be hosted in Atlanta this summer), perhaps it is time to rehabilitate the cheese pancake as one of the meals of choice on Hanukkah. In addition to the jelly donut and the potato pancake, this year, for the lactose tolerant, serve up some cheese latkes as the candles are burning bright within your homes. (Find the recipe for cheese latkes and other Hanukkah favorites on page 9.) Hag ha-urim sameakh! Happy Hanukkah! Enjoy the Feast of Lights.



Kindling the Hanukkah Lights

Kindling Hanukkah lights is the most important Hanukkah custom. It commemorates the victory of the Maccabees, religious freedom, and the miracles that remind us of God's presence in history.

Difficulty: Easy **Time Required:** 10 minutes

Here's How:

What to Light

Buy or make a <u>H</u>anukkah menorah (called a <u>H</u>anukkiah). The <u>H</u>anukkiah should have eight candle holders in a row and a separate candle holder for the "Shamash." The Shamash candle is used to light the other eight candles since it is forbidden to use the <u>H</u>anukkah lights for any purpose other than viewing.

Where to Light

To best publicize the miracle, the <u>H</u>anukkiah should be lit in a window facing the public thoroughfare. If the menorah cannot be lit by the window, it may be lit inside the house on a table.

When to Light

The \underline{H} anukkiah should preferably be lit immediately at nightfall. If necessary, however, the menorah can be lit late into the night. It is best to wait until all members of the household are present to light the \underline{H} anukkiah. The \underline{H} anukkiah should remain lit for at least 30 minutes after nightfall. On Friday afternoon, the \underline{H} anukkiah should be lit before sundown and before lighting candles for Shabbat.

How to Light on the First Night

On the first night, place one candle in the <u>H</u>anukkiah's far right (as you face the <u>H</u>anukkiah) candle holder. Another candle is placed for the *Shamash* (helper candle). Say the below blessings and then light the candle using the *Shamash* candle.

First Blessing to Recite

Barukh Ata Adonay Eloyheynu Melekh Ho-olom Asher Kiddeshanu Be-mitsvoytov Ve-tsivanu Lehadlik Neyr Shel khanuka.

Blessed are You, Lord our God, King of the universe, who has sanctified us by His commandments, and has commanded us to kindle the lights of Hanukkah.

Second Blessing to Recite

Barukh Ato Adonay Eloyheynu Melekh Ho-olom She-asa Nissim La-avoteynu Ba-yamim Ho-heym Ba-zzman Ha-zze.

Blessed are you, Lord our God, King of the universe, who wrought miracles for our fathers in days of old, at this season.

Third Blessing to Recite (only on the first night of Hanukkah)

Barukh Ata Adonay Eloyheynu Melekh Ho-olom Shehekheyonu Ve-kiymanu Ve-higqi'anu La-zzman Ha-zze.

Blessed are You, Lord our God, King of the universe, who has kept us alive, and has preserved us, and enabled us to reach this time.

How to Light on the Second through Eighth Night

The second night, place two candles in the <u>Hanukkiah</u> far right (as you face the <u>Hanukkiah</u>) candle holders. Another candle is placed for the *Shamash*. Say the first two blessings above and then light the candles using the *Shamash* candle. Light the left-most candle first and then light in order, from left to right. Follow this procedure for each night of <u>Hanukkah</u>.

Hanerot Halalu

While lighting the candles themselves, *Hanerot Halalu* is traditionally recited.

Maoz Tzur

Once the candles have been lit, *Maoz Tzur* ("Rock of Ages") is traditionally sung.

Tips:

- Allow each child to light his or her own Hanukkah menorah. Even three- and four-year-olds can light candles with help. Line the table on which the menorahs stand with aluminum foil. It is really beautiful to have a group of Hanukkiah menorahs all lit together, especially on the eighth night.
- Sing Maoz Tzur and other Hanukkah songs together after lighting the candles.
- Play the dreidel game together after lighting.
- Eat <u>H</u>anukkah food, like latkes and donuts, together after lighting.
- Invite relatives and friends to light the menorah with you, and celebrate together with <u>H</u>anukkah songs, games, and food.







The September 2000 issue of *Epicurious* magazine contained this recipe by Joan Nathan, specifically written to include children in the preparation of this Hanukkah favorite!

1 scant tablespoon (1 package) dry yeast 4 tablespoons sugar

3/4 cup lukewarm milk or warm water*

2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour Pinch of salt

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

2 eggs, separated

2 tablespoons (1/4 stick) butter or pareve margarine, softened* Apricot or strawberry preserves

Sugar

Vegetable oil for deep-frying

*Use butter and milk if serving at a milk meal, and water and pareve margarine for a meat meal

Child: Mix together the yeast, 2 tablespoons of the sugar, and the milk. Let sit to make sure it bubbles.

Child: Sift the flour and mix it with the remaining sugar, salt, cinnamon, egg yolks, and the yeast mixture.

Adult with Child: Knead the dough until it forms a ball. Add the butter or margarine. Knead some more, until the butter is well absorbed. Cover with a towel and let rise overnight in the refrigerator.

Adult: Roll out the dough to a thickness of 1/8 inch.

Child: Cut out the dough into 24 rounds with a juice glass, or any object about 2 inches in diameter. Take 1/2 teaspoon of preserves and place in center of 12 rounds. Top with the other 12. Press down at edges, sealing with egg whites. Crimping with the thumb and second finger is best. Let rise for about 30 minutes.

Adult: Heat 2 inches of oil to about 375°F. Drop the doughnuts into the hot oil, about 5 at a time. Turn to brown on both sides. Drain on paper towels.

Child: Roll the doughnuts in sugar.

Cheese Latkes

Makes 16.

These light-as-air, pillowy cheese pancakes are made with farmer cheese — essentially strained cottage cheese.

2 cups salted farmer cheese
 4 eggs
 2 cup all-purpose flour
 2 tablespoons sugar
 Vegetable oil for frying

1/2 teaspoon salt

Heat 1/2 inch of oil over medium heat in heavy skillet to approximately 350°F. Place farmer cheese in bowl with eggs, sugar, vanilla, and salt. Mix well with wooden spoon. Add flour and mix until all ingredients are well blended. Spoon 1/4 cup batter into oil; fry until golden brown on both sides, approximately three minutes per side. Drain on paper towels. Serve hot with sour cream, jam, fresh berries, or maple syrup.

Potato Latkes

Makes 12 to 16.

What is the secret to making great latkes? The December 2000 issue of *Gourmet* magazine found that the starchier the potato, the crisper the latke. They tested baking potatoes (the starchiest), Yukon Golds, and boiling potatoes (the least starchy) and liked the flavor of them all. You can easily double this recipe for a crowd.

1 pound potatoes1/2 teaspoon salt1/2 cup finely chopped onion1/2 to 3/4 cup olive oil1 large egg, lightly beatenSour cream and applesauce

Preheat oven to 250°F.

Peel potatoes and coarsely grate by hand, transferring to a large bowl of cold water as grated. Soak potatoes 1 to 2 minutes after last batch is added to water, then drain well in a colander.

Spread grated potatoes and onion on a kitchen towel and roll up jelly-roll style. Twist towel tightly to wring out as much liquid as possible. Transfer potato mixture to a bowl and stir in egg and salt.

Heat 1/4 cup oil in a 12-inch nonstick skillet over moderately high heat until hot but not smoking. Working in batches of 4 latkes, spoon 2 tablespoons potato mixture per latke into skillet, spreading into 3-inch rounds with a fork. Reduce heat to moderate and cook until undersides are browned, about 5 minutes. Turn latkes over and cook until undersides are browned, about 5 minutes more. Transfer to paper towels to drain and season with salt. Add more oil to skillet as needed. Keep latkes warm on a wire rack set in a shallow baking pan in oven.

Cooks' notes:

- Latkes may be made up to 8 hours ahead. Reheat on a rack set over a baking sheet in a 350°F oven, about 5 minutes.
- Grating the potatoes, soaking them briefly in water, and then squeezing out the liquid (as we've done here) keeps the batter from turning brown too quickly.

A Conversation with Rami Tal, Israeli-based Journalist and Editor

From 1975 to 1977, Rami was a teaching assistant in the political science department of Bar-Ilan University. In 1977 he started to work at *Yediot Acharonot* newspaper as a news editor. From 1989 to 1993 he was *Yediot Acharonot*'s Washington correspondent. Returning to Israel, he worked mainly at *Yediot Acharonot*'s publishing house, as the head of the political and security division, and as a member of the editorial staff. In that capacity he has edited books by Benjamin Netanyahu, Shimon Peres, Ezer Weizman, Moshe Arens, Yossi Beilin, Moshe (Bogi) Ya'alon, Dan Halutz, Uri Sagi, Avraham Burg, and others. The most recent book edited by Rami was written by former head of the Mossad, Shabtay Shavit.

Retired from *Yediot*, Rami is currently the publication editor of the Jewish People's Policy Institute, an independent think tank, its mission being professional, strategic thinking on issues of primary importance to world Jewry.

A Note of Thanks from AJ New Way Forward

The AJ New Way Forward (AJNWF) leadership team would like to offer a most sincere "thank you" to the over 300 AJ members who shared their thoughts, feelings, and ideas for the future of our synagogue through their participation in the membership-wide AJNWF survey. When it closed on October 5, the survey marked the completion of the second major AJ member-driven phase of critical data gathering for the AJNWF initiative.

The initial phase was held throughout the summer, in which over 170 congregants participated in a total of seventeen parlor meetings held at individual members' homes. These offered participants the opportunity to engage in open-ended conversations on a variety of important topics concerning where AJ is now, and where it should be headed.

The sentiments expressed throughout the course of those discussions formed the basis of the answer choices for the questions posed in the AJNWF survey. In turn, robust analysis of the data compiled from the many answers that were provided will enable AJNWF to generate valuable findings regarding members' inclinations, convictions, and preferences — and which groups of members share them and

which do not. It will also inform the rabbi search committee as its members perform their due diligence in selecting our next spiritual leader.

In conjunction with AJNWF's in-depth interviews with past and present AJ clergy and administrative staff, the survey findings will foster the next critical member-based phase of the initiative. A series of Town Hall meetings will offer congregants an additional opportunity to express themselves and comment on the survey findings. Ultimately, AJNWF will present conclusions and recommendations to leadership and membership that will reflect the extensive community involvement in the process.

Again, we offer our thanks to you for what you've helped create thus far — and thanks in advance for your continued help and support throughout the remainder of the initiative, as together we chart AJ's way forward.

You can do the same at ACCT Philly (Animal Care and Control Team) at acctphilly.org, which is another wonderful shelter where her family adopted their pitbull, Cuddles, and their two cats, Oshi and Oreo.

Parshat Noah

Dvar Torah, by Iris Winegrad

My Torah portion is Parshat Noah. It is the story in which the world was lawless and Noah was the only decent person who followed G-d's commands. G-d wanted to cleanse the Earth of the bad people with a flood and Noah was responsible for building an ark and saving all life on Earth. After the water subsided, Noah created the first vineyard, as the Lord commanded, from which he became drunk and uncovered himself. While two of his sons covered him, Noah's other son, Chahm, took advantage of his drunken state by teasing and telling his brothers about their father's disgrace. Therefore, G-d cursed all of Chahm's descendants.

Generations later, the Tower of Babel occurred. At that time, the people of the Earth were arrogant and thought themselves more important than the Lord. They decided to build a huge tower to show their invincibility, which greatly angered G-d. While building the tower, these people didn't care about their friends that fell while trying to build. All they cared about was their goal of creating this monument. As punishment, the Lord confused mankind by splitting them up into different languages so they could not communicate with each other. Thus, they could not continue to build the tower.

This parshah has many lessons to be learned. From the story of Noah's Ark, I learn that it's important to be a decent person, even if everyone around you isn't. This includes conserving our natural resources and finding new ways of making the energy that we so desperately need. We must reduce pollution, save endangered species, and educate each other about these challenges.

For my *mitzvah* project, I have been volunteering my time to walk, play, and care for rescue dogs. This is my way of helping some of G-d's individual creatures who don't have homes of their own. I've committed over 100 hours over the past couple years to helping these rescue dogs. In addition to this, I plan on donating a portion of my bat mitzvah gifts to local shelters and wildlife conservations.

More lessons that I've learned are from the Tower of Babel. I learned that humankind has to be more aware of others' perspectives, just as the builders weren't aware of all the people that got hurt while building the tower. This can relate to how there is a lot of bullying going on all over the world and people need to be more aware of how they can help in these situations. Although you may not have been bullied yourself, one must be mindful that those who have experienced this are just like us, with the fact that they are kind, caring people, and that we have to help in any way we can. When someone bullies another person, they're not thinking about what their victim's hobbies are or what their favorite TV show is; all they think about is their goal of hurting this human being. One way that we can prevent this from happening is to just stand up to the bully and flat out say that this is not right. If this action is done in every school bathroom and locker room, in the hallways and outside on the blacktop, we can truly make a difference in a victim's life and make the world a little better of a place to live in.

Our Honoree: Lorna Rosenberg



On November 11, **Lorna Rosenberg** will be honored by the AJWA Sisterhood as the Torah Fund "Woman of Achievement" for 2018–19. As those who know Lorna will affirm, it is truly a fitting title.

Born in northeast Philadelphia, Lorna's family were members of the Oxford Circle Jewish Community Center which Lorna attended through high school. Lorna embraced the Conservative Movement and when her father was transferred to Richmond, Virginia in 1971, Lorna served as a *kadima* and USY advisor, staff at Camp Ramah, was active in the Soviet Jewry movement, and much more. To quote Lorna, "There I found community and purpose." Lorna attended the University of Virginia and was a Governor's Intern in environmental science. In the early 1980s Lorna moved to Baltimore and then spent a year in Israel on the WUJS program. After *ulpan* there, she worked for the Ministry of Environment.

On her return she came back to Philadelphia, and while attending Drexel University from which she graduated, Lorna worked as *kadima* advisor at Beth Hillel Beth El. She resided in Mt. Airy and attended the Germantown Jewish Center. An expert on environmental policy, Lorna has been employed by the Environmental Protection Agency since 1984. In 1987 Lorna married Murray Rosenberg, lived in New Jersey for a short while, and then moved to Elkins Park and AJ. According to Lorna, it was the Havurah that drew her to AJ. Murray is a geologist employed by Jacobs Engineering Company.

As most AJers know, Lorna is one of our resident master chefs. Love of food and cooking runs in her family — her grandmother Shull ran a luncheonette. Lorna attributes her early interest in food to the Florence Hanford Philadelphia Gasworks Cooking Show, watching when she came home from school. Here at AJ, Lorna credits her culinary involvement to Deb Strauss, z"I, who recruited her in 1995 to teach classes at our Passover University. 

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
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
