SOME OF WHAT'S INSIDE

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In 1980, literary theorist Stanley Fish wrote Is There a Text in This Class? The Authority of Interpretive Communities. Two thousand years ago, our Talmudic Rabbis formed an interpretive community which, according to Fish, placed the meaning of the Torah in their control. The Rabbis acknowledge as much — which is absolutely amazing — when they answered the question, "What is Torah?" with "Midrash" (Kidushin 49a). Midrash is their recontextual-

ization of the Torah's text into their own context.

Very frequently I hear people say something like, "it's all a matter of interpretation" when they want to justify ignoring what they consider to be an inconvenient *halakhah*. They're only half right. Yes, it's interpretation; but *halakhah* is an accepted interpretation by the Jewish community. In modern times, Jews can ignore *halakhah*, but that decision places them outside of the *halakhah* jewish community. In pre-modern times, ignoring *halakhah* risked being placed outside the Jewish community by the leaders of the community.

No one should think that when the Torah commands us not to seethe a kid in its mother milk that it meant that we can't eat cheeseburgers. Similarly, no one should think that when the prophet Isaiah envisioned a pregnant young woman that she was carrying Jesus (Is. 7:14). That would be a terribly long gestation period — Isaiah lived in the 8th c. BCE!

We Jews can't fault Christians for using the method of midrash to recontextualize biblical verses to make them relevant for themselves. We do the same thing. A scholar who spent much of his career at Penn, David Stern, writes that Christians and Rabbinic Jews used the same method to read Torah but were motivated by a "different set of anxieties." Stanley Fish might argue that the same principle applies to all texts, including the United State Constitution. To extend Stern's language, "Which anxieties inform our readings of the Constitution?" There is no inherent, intrinsic meaning to that document. That document, like all writings, only makes sense in its larger literary and social context. It was drafted and redrafted by folks who shared an interpretive community and brought those shared values and assumptions to bear on what would become the foundational document for the American experiment in representative democracy. Justices on the Supreme Court who claim to hold to a legal philosophy of originalism are deceiving themselves to think that they can isolate a statement from 1789 and apply it today as originally understood. What was originally intended in 1789 was that statement in its larger context, both literary and cultural.

"An eye for an eye" may well have originally been written to dictate the physical consequence for the crime of removing another's eye. But, hundreds of years after we find the rule in the Torah, the Rabbis understood the rule as proportional punishment through monetary compensation. Proportional punishment may also have been the original intent of the author. Disproportionate retaliation was not unknown in the ancient Near East. The Torah's original historical context was proportional punishment even if the original author who wrote "eye for an eye" intended it to be applied physically in order to achieve that proportional punishment. If one holds to the philosophy of originalism, which of the original meanings does one apply — the physical consequence or the proportional punishment?

When later sages demonstrated that if the eye-removing culprit were already blind in one eye, then removing his second eye would not be proportional punishment. Since the literal application of the rule would violate the principle of proportional punishment, monetary compensation became the Rabbinic interpretation of "eye for an eye." The Rabbis interpreted the Torah in a more humane way because of their assumption that the Torah wants them to be merciful.

In the Cantor's Corner

Todah

Gratitude is central to Judaism. The original Hebrew word for Jew, *Yehudi*, is a form of the Hebrew word for thank you — תודה — *todah*.

Of course, other faiths and peoples express gratitude, but Judaism seems to overflow with opportunities to say thank you. Daily Jewish prayer opens with *Modeh/Modah Ani* — a thank you for the gift of another day. We recognize G_d's sovereignty and thank G_d for bringing us to every new moment of our lives with the *shehecheyanu* prayer.

This Fall column is usually an article filled with the many thank you's that I wish to express. So many of you make tremendous efforts that contribute to each High Holy Day season being meaningful and special. Of course, this year is different; in fact, it seems everything is different. In fact, this article will be different because I will mention no names. I think this year, more than any other, it is enough sometimes to just be okay. Oh, and if you are not okay, to PLEASE tell someone. Tell us!

Expressing appreciation takes me back to the very beginning of the pandemic and the first holiday affected — Passover. Among the best known songs of Pesa<u>h</u> is "Dayenu." Perhaps because it is the early part of the seder, likely before the moans of "When do we eat?" But I think it is also well known because of the extraordinary way that the text expresses gratitude. We don't express appreciation by saying, if my car started but didn't move forward, it would have been enough. We certainly don't thank the plumber for taking the toilet apart, but if he/she didn't fix it and put it back together, it would have been enough.

"Dayenu," by its very nature, teaches that we don't simply say, "Thank you G_d for taking us out of Egypt.""Dayenu" identifies fifteen steps that make up '*yetziat Mitzrayim*,' our exodus from Egypt, and offers gratitude for each one. This is not a blanket generalized thank you as we need to do sometimes for fear of leaving someone out. This is a thank you in which I sincerely hope that every one of you read yourself in. Yes, you are appreciated for just being. I am purposely not listing people because if I did, I would have to list every one of you and, ultimately, the only Entity to Whom any of us truly owes gratitude is the One and only G_d. It is extraordinary that the appreciation in "Dayeinu" does not wait for the problem to be fully solved. Each small step along the way is worthy of being appreciated. What really punches me in the gut is that we then say "and even if G_d hadn't done x, i.e., solved the next problem, gave us a day of rest... given us Zoom, or as on these past High Holy Days... given us the possibility of our own YouTube channel.

It is true that we would have had some sort of Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, and Sukkot observance. Would that have been enough? I was simply overwhelmed by the outpouring of our lay leadership and volunteers and by the steady professionalism and dedication of my fellow staff members. It would have been enough, *dayeinu*, if they had simply fulfilled a basic expectation, but they all went above and beyond.

As yet, gratitude has not been found to provide immunity from COVID-19, so keep wearing a mask when you should. That said, scientists have discovered all sorts of positive outcomes from practicing gratitude: improved physical health and even immunity against some disease. Studies have shown that expressions of gratitude lead to fewer expressions of toxic emotions such as resentment, frustration, and regret. It can help us achieve better sleep, more self-respect, and more satisfying relationships.

As our new Jewish year 5781 is in full swing, may we all continue to enjoy and refine our sense of gratitude and our ability to clearly express that gratitude. TODAH — THANK YOU.

I write this column in the days leading up to the national election, and I fear for the future of our national experiment in representative democracy. Legal texts will be consulted and interpreted by different interpretive communities. Let's not deceive ourselves that the nation's leaders and judges will be arguing over texts — values regulate an interpretive community. Please, remember how I explained Judaism's three operating principles over Rosh Hashanah: freedom, dignity, and inclusivity. For Jews, legal disputes are exercises in optimizing those principles.



Getting Back to School!

On Sunday, October 4, our families were treated to a virtual tour of Sukkot in Israel and on Sunday, October 1, we went through the Torah and heard about the Torah portion from this year that was closest to each of the students' birthdays.

The official start brought reviews of Hebrew, tefillah, and new Judaic studies, with experiential learning and one-on-one Hebrew instruction. The Etgar staff and I are looking forward to a wonderful year of interactive learning, both online and, if conditions permit, in the classroom as well!

I'm sure you're familiar with the expression, "When life gives you lemons, you make lemonade." We didn't actually make lemonade from the unwanted conditions that came our way, but we did turn those challenging times into happy and fun experiences for our children. Yes, working in a COVID environment has changed the way we gather as a school community and made us more aware of cleaning, sanitizing, disinfecting, and handwashing. The classes remain self-contained, rarely interacting with one another, but we still know that we are all part of the AJ community.

During normal times, we would gather altogether for Shabbat or in the sukkah to celebrate Sukkot, but this year, it was different. Hazzan Glantz leads us in Mesibat Shabbat virtually — one class at a time. The same is true for Amy Jo Rosenthal, our music specialist, and Sue Jacobs, our storyteller. Yoga is viewed via YouTube as the children follow along on their mats. When the synagogue decided to innovatively create a "drive-thru" sukkah experience, we were once again challenged to include our children they don't even drive! So, thanks to Calvin Thompson and Jason Roe, they were able to repurpose some old sukkah parts and create a sukkah just for our kids. It was situated opposite the drive-thru sukkah and enabled each class to enjoy a snack in the sukkah, shake the lulav and etrog, and experience the mitzvah. The children creatively decorated the sukkah and we added some pumpkins, gourds, haybales, colorful corn, and corn stalks to create

an inviting atmosphere. Luckily, it didn't rain during Sukkot and we enjoyed our booth all week long.

COVID-19 looms over us every day and, unfortunately, we did have one child who had a positive test result. According to the Department of Health and other agencies, we needed to close only the one class. However, in consult with Rav Shai, Judy Izes, and Amy Devine-Stretch, we examined the threads that connected that child, the teachers, and siblings, and decided that we would close the entire center for two weeks of quarantine in order to mitigate the spread of the virus. During the quarantine, all staff and families were asked to test for the virus and report the results to us. I am pleased to tell you that there were no other positive results reported. In the meantime, our housekeeping crew was hard at work deep-cleaning all classrooms and shared spaces. Additionally, air purifiers were placed in every classroom in preparation for the colder weather when opening the windows compromises the heating of the building. "Lemons," you say! We respond, "Lemonade!"

I am pleased to announce that Adath Jeshurun Preschool and Infant Center has once again received Star-4 status as part of the Keystone Stars program. Congratulations to all who contribute to the excellence. Each day, the staff comes together to keep our children engaged, educated, cared for and safe while creatively providing programming that celebrates holidays, milestones, achievements, and life.

Adult Education Is Off and Running Again at AJ!

Rav Shai's arrival at AJ in mid-2019 began a number of new and renewed initiatives. Prominent among these was an effort to re-establish an active program of adult education, facilitated by a new Adult Education Committee, a fundamental component of AJ's New Way Forward. And, with Rav Shai's background as a Jewish educator and scholar, we hit the ground running with a number of course offerings that gained momentum and growing notice both within and outside the AJ community.

Like so much at AJ, and all other communal institutions, that momentum was stalled with the pandemic and our need to close our doors. All AJers—clergy, staff, members—had to learn to incorporate the new reality of virtual interaction. Over the ensuing months, we've done an admirable job and have devised ways of making the virtual experience innovative and meaningful.

With that in mind, the Adult Education Committee is reinvigorated and offering a slate of new opportunities for 5781, all in virtual format! Already underway is Rav Shai's major course offering for the year, "The Six Ws of Judaism." In a series of two consecutive 12-week semesters which began on October 20, AJers and others who are interested in learning — or relearning — the basic foundational



concepts of Judaism have the opportunity to study with each other and Rav Shai, enabling them to better understand, appreciate, and critique our own Jewish world.

By now, we all know the wonderful benefits of learning with Rav Shai, a rabbi with a unique background in the world of academia. In this context, AJ will make news again! For the first time in its remarkable 162-year history, on **Sunday, December 13**, the Adult Education Committee will sponsor **a book launch for Rav Shai's most recent publication** *Coherent Judaism: Constructive Theology, Creation, and Halakhah*. In this new volume, Rav Shai seeks to reconcile traditional tenets of observance with modern concepts inherent in a post-Darwinian, post-Holocaust world. Those attending are eligible to purchase a copy signed by the author and, as an added delight, the event will be followed immediately by a virtual community <u>H</u>anukkah candle lighting. You won't want to miss it!

Also in December, another scholar in our community, American Jewish historian Dr. Reena Friedman, will offer a **program on the life and work of Lillian Wald**, a public health pioneer who launched the field of public health nursing and assumed a leadership role in caring for victims of the 1918 flu epidemic in New York. She was also committed to racial justice, among many other causes. The program will be held on the morning of **December 6**, with specific time to be announced.

As we all know, our rich tradition at AJ is associated with a unique and beloved musical liturgy. And who is more of

an expert in what makes our musical liturgy distinctive and historically significant than Hazzan Glantz? Hazzan plans a program that will delve into that history, much of which was influenced by our emeritus Cantor Charles Davidson, and he will provide many musical examples of what is traditional as well as some of the various innovations he has made during his own tenure. Look for this fascinating program to be offered next spring.

Finally (for now!), over the past several months we in the Jewish community have been challenged to become active in facilitating a greater understanding of our important relationship with members of the black community. Our concern about the issues surrounding the protests in cities throughout the country this past summer evolved, at AJ, in the remarkably successful Signs of Solidarity campaign. But that was just a first step, and the ability to formulate a meaningful, ongoing Jewish response to racism requires elevating our knowledge and awareness through education. To this end, the AJ Adult Ed and Social Action committees plan to co-sponsor a workshop conducted by local religious and community leaders, both Jewish and non-Jewish, to help begin the process. Please be on the lookout for more details to follow.

There's so much to like about what the AJ Adult Education Committee is planning for the current year, and there's more to come. Enjoy!
