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Torah and Triggers

The *Talmud* says that one should always pray in a room with windows.

Some of the medieval commentators suggest that the windows are there so we can peek at the heavens in case we lose focus during prayer and need a shot of awe.

The Shulchan Arukh, the 16th-century code from Yosef Caro in Tsfat, ups the ante: It is preferable for a synagogue to have twelve windows.

Why twelve? It turns out that this ideal comes from the 13th-century *Zohar*. Isaac Luria, the great mystic from 16th-century Tsfat, connects the twelve windows to the twelve tribes of Israel — each tribe had their own view or perspective of God. It would be the height of hubris to think that any single view could exhaust the infinity that is divinity.

Rav Avraham Yitzhak Kook, the first Ashkenazi Chief Rabbi of the Land of Israel, interprets the Talmud to mean that our prayers must be connected to the world we experience outside of the synagogue. Prayer is not a vehicle to separate us from the world, but an interlude to strengthen us for the world.

As fortunate recipients of *Talmud*, *Zohar*, Luria, and Rav Kook, we understand that people can experience the world differently—*but with equal truth*—and those experiences shape their perspectives on God. We needed twelve tribes to help us understand that no single way of being or seeing exhausts what is true.

For those of you who have heard of but couldn't describe "post-modern," the paragraph above is a pretty good description. And that description is both ours and medieval!

As I hunker down to compose four sermons for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, it would be a dereliction of rabbinic responsibility to avoid speaking about the world we see outside the synagogue's windows. As I have stated from my interview weekend, Judaism IS politics in the sense that the Torah and the rabbinic tradition are filled with values that are embodied in specific laws and policies. I'm no expert on U.S. policies — but I do teach Jewish values, and, hence, there will be some political analysis and discussion in my sermons.

The Hazzan and I work hard to make the High Holidays spiritually nourishing, but that does not preclude periods of discomfort. As I will discuss, shul should always be a place of safety, but not always a place of comfort. So when my sermons turn to party politics, as they will, my request is that you not walk away or tune out or suit up for battle.

As I mentioned in my very first set of High Holidays at AJ in 2019, the *Talmud* gets at this idea of multiple truths in their claim that the mutually exclusive prescriptions of the Houses of Hillel and Shammai are *both* the words of the living God. The *Talmud* then explains why, for purposes of practical *halakhah*, the sages usually decided according to the House of Hillel. It's not that they were smarter. It's that the House of Hillel *listened* to Shammai's arguments with an open enough heart to occasionally change their own minds. "Who is wise?" asks *Pirkei Avot*. "One who learns from everyone."

The opposite of being doctrinaire isn't being wishy-washy, it's being self-consciously fallible. Judah recognized he was wrong in his dealings with Tamar. Judah's descendant, King David, realized he was wrong in his dealings with Batsheva and Uriah. Those admissions of fallibility are the Torah's literary manner of showing that fallibility is redemptive since Judah and King David are the forebearers of the messianic age.

As we enter the month of Elul, the month preceding Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, may we use these days to review our ways of being and seeing with both honesty and charity, remembering that no single way contains all that is true.

Program. There's a caricature of Catholicism that, since no one can merit salvation as a result of the stain of Original Sin, there's nothing to do but rely on God's abounding mercy. Like most caricatures, what's true about that is surrounded by layers and layers of fascinating nuance.

For our Selihot program this year, we are blessed to invite our neighbor, author, and longtime college campus minister **Christine Marie Eberle**. Through vignettes, texts, and dialogue, Ms. Eberle and Rav Shai will probe the processes of forgiveness and repentance from their respective traditions and perspectives.



Service. As we announced in the July/August *AJ News*, our Selihot service this year will be **Hush of Midnight**.

Many of you may be very familiar with this world-renowned work: a cantata of Ruth Brin poetry and traditional Selihot liturgy composed and arranged by our own Hazzan emeritus, **Charles S. Davidson**. People who hear it for the first time are swept into the emotional poetry and pleasing rhythms. This choice for Selihot, written by Hazzan Davidson in 1986, has withstood the test of time.



The Hebrew word <code>selihot</code> refers to the collective penitential liturgy, the daily recitation of which commences prior to Rosh Hashanah and continues through Yom Kippur. Designed to set the mood within us for the impending High Holy Days, the focus of the Hebrew liturgy is repentance and renewal. The poetry of 20th-century poet Ruth Brin (1921–2009) is matched in such a way that it allows and encourages us to imagine being "in darkening shade" "on city streets" and "wood and meadows." In the execution of the service the words and music stir us and "take us to far countries of pretended peace."

For those who wish to prepare for the highly participatory service, Hazzan Glantz has scheduled two rehearsals: **September 11, from 3:00 PM to 5:00 PM**, and **September 14, from 7:30 PM to 9:30 PM**. Everyone is welcome, even if they just want to familiarize themselves more with the music, see the rehearsal, and prefer not to sing.

In the Cantor's Corner

Working with young people as they prepare for their b' mitzvah is among my favorite responsibilities.

Of course, every student is unique and they require different approaches. For many I try to motivate them with the "milkshake explanation." Yes, for the lactose-intolerant I can modify to the Silkshake explanation and for the vegans I am happy to use the Almond Breeze Shake example, but it doesn't have as much of a ring to it.

The milk, silk, or almond breeze shake explanation goes like this. Let's say you want to have a shake (gosh, just saying shake is so much simpler). No matter how big a glass you decide upon, if you only put two ounces of milk, silk, or almond breeze in the blender, you'll only have about two ounces to pour into your glass.



So the glass size is your whole shebang. That is, the service, the kiddush, and the celebration. The amount of milk, silk, or almond breeze represents the full amount of study. Then, from time to time, I might simply ask, "How's that milkshake coming?" or "How much did you put in the blender this week?"

Recently I learned a whole new twist on that equation. Thanks to the Mansons (active AJ members), I have now seen how it can be applied well beyond these early teen years. Barry Manson asked me one day, "Can you be a Golem for me?" I learned this was something very important to Barry. You see, Barry and Marty have, for several years already, been putting in the time necessary to co-create videos on meaningful Jewish topics with their grandchildren. I immediately thought, what a creative way to teach Jewish values and history and make positive memories with those you love.

The source for and definition of the Golem is actually irrelevant to this story but seeing as we are here... The word itself occurs just once in the Tanach in Psalm 139. Discussions and iterations of the idea of a physical Golem begin in the Talmud (Sanhedrin 65b) and continue to this

day. The best known is from the late 16th century when Rabbi Judah Loew ben Bezalel sought protection for his community after hearing rumors of an impending pogrom. Rabbi Loew, known also as the Maharal of Prague (a respectful acronym based on his role, title and name), created a humanoid figure from clay — wet earth from the Vltava river. He then animated the creation (brought to life for cinematic effect) by carving *emet*, the Hebrew word for truth, on the Golem's forehead. Perhaps you are now recalling "It's alive!" from *Young Frankenstein*, eh. . . . Frankensteen! In case you were wondering, Transylvania is a mere 758 miles from Prague.

What a way to grab the attention of young people being marketed the newest superhero movies! The Golem, as Loew called the creation, protected the Jewish community with its super strength... until it loses discipline and threatens the wellbeing of the people it was created to defend. Ultimately, Loew must destroy his monster and so, he erases the first letter of *emet*, (*alef*) leaving *met*, meaning "dead." That said, the experience of working on such a project is anything but dead. The memories that the Mansons have created with their grandchildren are very much alive. By working together on these videos, they spend quality, constructive time together, and the result can be enjoyed over and over.

I must say that I was dissappointed to learn that I will not gain an IMDB profile. I have played Buffalo Bill in *Annie Get Your Gun*, Faigin in *Oliver*, and Sky Masterson in *Barnashim v'Chatichot* (you guessed it — that's Hebrew for *Guys and Dolls*). I was Harry Golden in *Only in America* and I played Theodore Herzl in *Dori*, but NEVER have I been a Golem (and probably never again). While my previous roles had more lines and stage time, I will always remember this experience.

This summer, as I prepare for these High Holy Days, I ponder that idea of protection, of super strength and control. The precious people in desperate need of a real protector, across the earth and even next door. I am ever-grateful to the Mansons for helping drive home the lesson of the milkshake. Filling the blender in the form of meaningful time spent with children, grandchildren, friends, or really anyone. The amount of effort put *in* equals the result *out*.

The credit card commercial asks, "What's in your wallet?" I ask, "What's in your shake?" How much milk, silk, or almond breeze are your pouring in and how often?

How full is your spiritual fuel tank or how charged is your Jewish battery cell? As we begin 5783 with all forms of hope, with the desire for dreams to be fulfilled, be they for us or for loved ones, I am suggesting we ask ourselves these questions. ①

Eco-Healthy Childcare Endorsement for AJ Early Learning Center

Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, Relay Day was held at AJ Early Learning Center in Elkins Park, PA on June 8 to recognize the Eco-Healthy Childcare endorsement the center earned from the Children's Environmental Health Network (CEHN). Children 15 months to 5 years old participated in relays and games using recycled materials including water bottle bowling, feed the clown recyclable bottle tops, topple the can tower, and plastic container mini golf, organized by movement teacher, **Jill Slobotkin**. Children's demanding work was rewarded with ice pops and fun was had by all.

Women for a Healthy Environment worked with AJ's retired ELC Director **Anita Block** to achieve the CEHN endorsement. AJ is only the fourth center is southeastern Pennsylvania to earn this commendation.

The Eco-Healthy Childcare endorsement means a lot for the students, families, and faculty at AJ. Through sampling and testing, it is clear the water consumed at AJ is lead-free, which is critical since lead is a contaminant that can cause brain impairment and developmental delays in children. Soil testing around the building where children play, and gardens grow, also shows no evidence of lead. Testing

for radon, which is a colorless, odorless gas that can seep through the foundation and lead to lung cancer, was not detected in the building. AJ uses EPA Safer Choice non-toxic, non-bio accumulative sanitizers and disinfectants to manage the spread of viruses and bacteria and keep the facility clean for everyone.

AJ is a non-smoking facility and has posted anti-idling signs to encourage all visitors/users to turn off their engines. Especially since COVID-19, soft toys are washed regularly, and carpets and floors are cleaned daily to remove particulates which aggravate asthma and allergies. An Integrated Pest Management Program is in place which keeps unwanted pests out with non-chemical means using door sweeps, closed container food storage, and general good housekeeping and site management.

AJ Early Learning Center can now proudly add Eco-Healthy to its Keystone 4-star rating as a state licensed facility to assure families that precautions are in place to keep their children safe and healthy!

During the summer, Rav Shai offered a fascinating three-part series on Jewish Bioethics. Inspired by Rav Shai's *teshuvah* for the Committee on Jewish Law and Standards of the Rabbinical Assembly, the class offered biblical and post-biblical insights on such topics as abortion, euthanasia, organ donation and transplantation, and genetic intervention. That such timely and relevant topics contain concepts upon which the ancients opined was a remarkable and instructive revelation for those who participated.

We have a lot of plans for this coming year. These include:



October 1 (Shabbat Shuva). Ossi Nussbaum, former Jewish Teen Collaborative Director, will discuss the upcoming Israeli elections scheduled for November 1. Please RSVP through the October service sign-up form (link and QR code on page 2.)



November 15, 22, 29, December 6: Fall Scholar Series. Elaine James, Associate Professor of Old Testament at the Princeton Theological Seminary, and Rav Shai will collaborate on an exploration of the Psalms.

Beginning January 11: Rav Shai will offer three seven-week sessions on the basics of Judaism, intended for non-Jews and/or interfaith families. For those interested in taking this further, these sessions will begin to prepare such individuals for ritual Jewish conversion.

January 15, 22, 29. Rav Shai's three-part series on Prayer (tentatively titled "For those who don't know how to pray/For those who pray but don't know why").

Spring 2023 (specific dates TBD). Rav Shai will offer a class exploring Conservative Judaism and interdenominational differences ("Why do we/they do what w/they do and believe what we/they believe?")

Finally, beginning this fall, Hazzan Glantz plans to offer a series called "Bimah Skills, Thrills, and More!," designed to

help you become proficient at skills related to participation in "bimah life." Whether you have never learned the skills or wish to improve and deepen your understanding, these sessions will help you. Hazzan plans three four-week sessions which will focus on traditions that bring us to the bimah, explain the garments and other objects worn and/or observed in Jewish life, and provide an opportunity to learn Torah trope and associated capabilities. No prior proficiency in Hebrew is required. More details to follow, and please be on the lookout for specific dates!

As always, our ongoing partnership with the Orange County Community Scholar Program (CSP) will continue to offer a very diverse range of online programs on bible, history, culture, and entertainment.

This program will look at many of the notable, interesting and more remarkable films that captured different aspects and perspectives of World War II.







Torah Fund has reached a notable milestone — 80 years old! The number 80 is represented by the letter pey, the 17th letter of the Hebrew alphabet. This symbol represents the divine spark of God within the soul.

In 1942, our country was embroiled in a bitter conflict. However, the ladies of National Women's League realized that, despite the hardships of war, the Seminary students had to have a proper place to live and study, and Torah Fund was born! Gas was 15 cents, a car cost \$920, and the average home was \$3,770. The first donation to Torah Fund was \$6.11 the numerical value of the Torah is 611 and our grandmothers, mothers, aunts, and

sisters rose to the occasion and Torah Fund was off to a momentous start.


