All areas of life in Israel were shaken on October 7 and the aftermath of this shock, as well as the continuing war, have deeply affected the art scene too. What is the story that art can tell us about the current reality that we don't necessarily see in the news? In this session we'll briefly look at art from 2023 before October and then dive into the images that were and still are created since. Congregation Adath Jeshurun

Established in 1858, our congregation was one of the founding members of the United Synagogue of America. Men and women worship with equal standing in our services which, while grounded in Jewish tradition, seek to respond to the modern intellectual, spiritual, and aesthetic needs of today's congregants. In 2004, our congregational family grew with the addition of Oxford Circle Jewish Community Centre-Brith Israel. Our unique prayer book, *Seder Avodah*, was compiled, edited, and translated by Rabbi Max D. Klein, of blessed memory, who was our spiritual leader from 1910 until 1960. It was extensively revised and reissued under the direction of Rabbi Seymour Rosenbloom in 2008, as part of our 150th Anniversary year, and dedicated by Marvin N. and Mildred W. Demchick.

As members of the Conservative movement, we expect all men to wear a *kippah*/head covering during religious services. Jewish men are further requested to wear a *tallit*/prayer shawl during morning services. Women are also encouraged to observe these practices. Both men and women are required to wear a head covering when ascending the *bima*, particularly when called to the Torah for an *aliyah*. We request that you enter or exit the sanctuary only when the congregation is seated.

If you must have your cell phone with you, please silence it. Smoking is not permitted in the building or on the grounds. Guests are reminded that photography is not permitted on Shabbat.

We offer an audio enhancement system. Please ask an usher for a personal headset and receiver. The systems are to be returned to the ushers prior to leaving the synagogue. Please note that a large-print *Seder Avodah* is also available from the ushers.

We at Adath Jeshurun are proud of our award-winning religious, education, music, and youth programs, and our nationally accredited preschool. Our congregation offers a full calendar of religious, educational, and cultural events through Men's and Women's Associations, Adult Education, Social Action (AJ Acts), L'olam (Judaism and the environment), and B'Bayit (catering) committees.

In the beginning, each variety of vine and tree brought forth 926 different kinds of fruit. After Cain killed Abel, the vines and trees went into mourning and they only brought forth a single kind of fruit. In the coming world, the vines and trees will once again blossom with a full bounty. (from Tanhuma, Introduction, 158)

The question this midrash answers is about the nature of God's curse on the ground in verses 11 and 12. The Tanhuma imagines God's garden as a colorful cornucopia that becomes washed out from grief in the wake of the fratricide. But there's a message here beyond the horticultural.

Initially, in some idealized past, it was obvious to all that different looking fruits shared the same roots. As the creation story teaches, the fraternity of humanity is the consequence of the paternity of God. We are all, equally, created in the divine image. But very early in our mythical past, something went wrong. Our common root was denied and one brother killed another. Now it is much more difficult to see that all people and all religions share the same root. It looks like each tree produces its own unique fruit that shares little with the fruit of other trees. But it was not always that way, says Tanhuma. Nor will it be that way forever. In the words of the prophet Zechariah, "In that day, the Lord shall be one with one name" (14:9). We will relearn that we all have one Father (Mal. 2:10). Like many different fruits which blossom from a single tree, there are manifold people and religious expressions connected to the same divine root.

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
