

Saturday, April 6: Adult Ed Crime and Consequences Series, Mass Incarceration, with Bob Lankin. Bob Lankin, an activist working to end mass incarceration, will speak at Congregation Adath Jeshurun during lunch, after services. Lankin an expert on the topic has spoken at dozens of venues on the subject of mass incarceration including programs sponsored by the Jewish Community Relations Council, Gratz College, the Pennsylvania Bar Institute, numerous religious institutions, and service clubs. Sunday, April 7: Visual Awe, with Beth Shapiro. With an eye on awe, we'll be inspired by the masterpieces and maquettes of the French sculptor Auguste Rodin at the Rodin Museum. We will also find out why Rodin worked on his "Gates of Hell" for 37 years and learn which famous artists were inspired by him. Tuesday, April 9: Israel 10/7 Resilience Series, The Fifth Question: Passover and Palestine, with Professor Jonathan Zimmerman and Dr. Sion Segal. The master narrative of the Jewish people, rehearsed daily in prayer and annually at the Passover Seder, is the redemption of the Israelites from oppression in Egypt. This year, in a small strip of land adjacent to Egypt, the Israel Defense Forces are fighting against an Islamist terror organization that refuses to acquiesce to Israel's existence. As we retell our story, we are obligated to see ourselves as if we had come out of Egypt. In America and in our families, there is conflict around the question of who is the oppressor and who is the oppressed. Is Hamas the Pharoah who does not recognize Joseph and seeks to eliminate his people? Or, are the Israelis guilty of persecuting the Palestinians by not recognizing their right for a national home or even their basic human rights? Professor Jonathan Zimmerman, a professor of the history of education at the University of Pennsylvania, and Dr. Sion Segal, a psychologist focusing

on conflict resolution, will focus on the dynamics around the seder table. Were the plagues against Egypt collective punishment? Was God's slaying of the firstborn genocide? What should we learn from our common texts, how can we apply those lessons today, and how can we engage one another in a spirit of compassion that avoids the plague of darkness where, according to the Torah, "no one could see his brother"? Saturday, April 20: Antisemitism: Navigating the Post-10/7 Landscape, with Prof. Ayal Feinberg. Prof. Ayal Feinberg will review new data underscoring changes in antisemitism following the terrorist attack of 10/7. He'll will explore what we know about underlying mechanisms through which 10/7-specific antisemitism has manifested—blame, responsibility, and conspiracy. Then he'll close with a discussion on how 10/7 is likely to permanently impact antisemitism and alter the identity of the diaspora moving forward. Sunday, May 5: Shoah Seder. "Throughout the generations, each of us is commanded to see ourselves as if we were in Nazi Europe." On May 5, from 1:30 PM to 3:30 PM, AJ will be hosting its first Shoah Seder. This unique program utilizes the methods of the Pesach Seder and combines them with the history of the Shoah to create an unforgettably powerful experience. Congregation Adath Jeshurun

Established in 1858, our congregation was one of the founding members of the United Synagogue of America. Men and women worship with equal standing in our services which, while grounded in Jewish tradition, seek to respond to the modern intellectual, spiritual, and aesthetic needs of today's congregants. In 2004, our congregational family grew with the addition of Oxford Circle Jewish Community Centre-Brith Israel. Our unique prayer book, *Seder Avodah*, was compiled, edited, and translated by Rabbi Max D. Klein, of blessed memory, who was our spiritual leader from 1910 until 1960. It was extensively revised and reissued under the direction of Rabbi Seymour Rosenbloom in 2008, as part of our 150th Anniversary year, and dedicated by Marvin N. and Mildred W. Demchick.

As members of the Conservative movement, we expect all men to wear a *kippah*/head covering during religious services. Jewish men are further requested to wear a *tallit*/prayer shawl during morning services. Women are also encouraged to observe these practices. Both men and women are required to wear a head covering when ascending the *bima*, particularly when called to the Torah for an *aliyah*. We request that you enter or exit the sanctuary only when the congregation is seated.

If you must have your cell phone with you, please silence it. Smoking is not permitted in the building or on the grounds. Guests are reminded that photography is not permitted on Shabbat.

We offer an audio enhancement system. Please ask an usher for a personal headset and receiver. The systems are to be returned to the ushers prior to leaving the synagogue. Please note that a large-print *Seder Avodah* is also available from the ushers.

We at Adath Jeshurun are proud of our award-winning religious, education, music, and youth programs, and our nationally accredited preschool. Our congregation offers a full calendar of religious, educational, and cultural events through Men's and Women's Associations, Adult Education, Social Action (AJ Acts), L'olam (Judaism and the environment), and B'Bayit (catering) committees.
